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# SIGNIFICANT DECLINE IN CAPTURED LOUISIANA WATERTHRUSHES AT GREAT SMOKY MOUNTAINS INSTITUTE AT TREMONT IN 2003

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Monitoring Avian Productivity and Survivorship (MAPS) is a continent-wide breeding season banding protocol administered by the Institute for Bird Populations (IBP). Started in 1989, MAPS is standardized for the purpose of comparing data across over 500 stations occupying a wide range of habitats. The breeding season is divided into 10 periods and each station opens nets (usually ten 12-m nets) once during each period. Same-size nets are placed at the same location and orientation every banding day through each season, and they are opened and closed at the same time with respect to sunrise. The results are that capture and recovery rates have a high statistical value.

Great Smoky Mountains Institute at Tremont (GSMIT) ran a MAPS station from 2000 through 2006. This paper documents changes in Louisiana Waterthrush (LOWA; *Seiurus motacilla*; Figure 1) numbers observed at the MAPS station through 2005.

GSMIT is located in Walker Valley in Blount County, Tennessee near the northwest corner of Great Smoky Mountains National Park, at an elevation of approximately 427 m (1400 ft). The Middle Prong of the Little River runs south-to-north along the bottom of the valley. Botanically, GSMIT is characterized by a second

growth mix of xeric hardwood and hemlock forest. GSMIT is an educational program which has hosted approximately 5000 people per year for 35 years; there are numerous trails and man ways in the area. Most of this impact is kept away from the river. Besides the river, the study area contains a sewage lagoon, a year-round spring, several buildings, a parking lot, and three trailheads. Within less than one kilometer on either side of the Middle Prong the sides of the valley rise over 300 meters. The approximately 10-ha study area is defined by the location of ten 12-meter mist nets. The nets are 3-50 meters from the Middle Prong of the Little River on the outskirts of the area affected by the educational program, but are secluded enough not to be directly impacted.

Over the seven years of the station's existence 374 birds of 27 species were captured. Louisiana Waterthrush were captured more often than any other species with 194 individuals caught. During breeding season LOWA are also one of the most frequently heard birds in Walker Valley. They are often observed walking along the river's edge, hopping on rocks in the river or singing from low branches overhanging the river. Observers who walk more than a few minutes from the river rarely see LOWA since the steep sides of Walker Valley restrict appropriate habitat to a narrow strip along the bottom of the valley.

In 2003 the first MAPS banding date was 26 May. This day is notable as being one of only three times in station history that no LOWA were caught, and the first time none were caught on opening day. We had only 17 captures of this species the entire 2003 season. The mean capture rate of LOWA for 2000 through 2006, not counting 2003, was 29.5 captures per season (range 21–34) (Super 2006). During the 2003 season there were only 2 recaptures, which may indicate that many birds dispersed early. This is somewhat supported by personal observations that there were not many LOWA heard singing throughout the breeding season. Numbers of other species captured are generally too low for analysis, but no unusual capture patterns were detected other than LOWA. These numbers include non-same day recaptures, as this indicates the overall amount of activity by the species, not just the number of individuals present. Activity is an indicator of whether there are young on the nest, which would necessitate more flights, and reasonably more captures.

It was not possible to determine whether the 11 hatch-year birds captured were produced within the station area, as opposed to along one of the smaller creeks in the area. These creeks are higher on the slope and somewhat less subject to flooding. In support of this hypothesis, we observed that the number of adults captured in 2003, six, was similar to the number of adults captured in years prior to and after 2003 (nine in 2000, seven in 2001, six in 2002 and eight in 2004). The number of hatch-year birds captured in 2003 was low compared to other years (Table 1). These data suggest that reduced breeding success, rather than loss of adults, was the primary reason for reduced captures. Because the author knows of no other station in the area that captures significant numbers of LOWA, comparisons to other stations were not possible.

Louisiana Waterthrushes nest very close to river edges, often under overhanging banks, sometimes within eroded root systems (Dunn & Garrett 1997; Muise, personal observation). According to Brady Matteson (Pers. Comm.) they often nest along small, shallow streams that flow into mountain rivers. They are also known to dig a small hollow in moist soil under an overhang (Harrison 1984). Although no serious nest searches have been undertaken in Walker Valley, two nests were found during other activities. Each was on a small tributary less than 12 m (40 ft) above the Middle Prong, and each was located less than 0.5 vertical meters above the channel of the stream. This is consistent with the above sources.

LOWA are one of the first neotropical migrants to return in spring (Harrison 1984; Stupka 1963; Muise, personal observations). Alsop (1991) lists the return time as the third week of March. The ten-year average return date at GSMIT is 24 March (GSMIT, unpublished data).

One possible explanation for this atypical pattern of LOWA captures is a flood event that occurred 6-8 May 2003. In this period, Walker valley received 16.5 cm (6.51 in) of rain — more than 13% of the entire year's rainfall — with 9.4 cm (3.7 in) falling on 6 May alone. This storm event caused extensive flooding within and around the national park, closing roads, knocking down trees and creating significant erosion. Higher elevations may have received even higher rainfall, which resulted in a surge of the Middle Prong of the Little River to nearly 2.7 m (9 ft) at its crest. During breeding season the river gauge generally reads between 15.2 and 30.5 cm (6-12 in), although it is not uncommon for the gauge to read as high as 61 cm (2 ft) after a rain event. The river periodically gets much higher — 1.2 to 1.5 m (4-5 ft) — outside of the breeding season. However, the river never had such a rise during any of the other MAPS periods during the study.

Although none of the well-camouflaged LOWA nests had been located that year, one can assume the birds were on nests because they had been heard singing for several weeks. Therefore, the flood event may have negatively impacted breeding success of LOWA in 2003. Two nests found in previous years were both on the ground under erosion-exposed roots, and both were next to small tributaries of the Middle Prong. These two tributaries flowed well out of their banks during the May 2003 rain event and would have flooded both of these nests.

A resulting question then was how the birds would fare the following year. During the 2004 season we caught a more typical 33 LOWA (Table 1). It seems that the species recovered. Possibly this is because few or no adults were lost in the flood, or perhaps this is a result of recruitment from other locations that were not hard hit by the flood. To date, no recaptures have been made of birds banded elsewhere, so it is not possible to ascertain how many birds typically come from elsewhere to breed here, though presumably that number is low.

# 2007 UPDATE TO THE OFFICIAL LIST OF THE BIRDS OF TENNESSEE

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The Tennessee Bird Records Committee (TBRC) of the Tennessee Ornithological Society (TOS) maintains the Official List of the Birds of Tennessee (OLBT) and insures that sightings of rare species are accurately and adequately documented for posterity. This report presents the fourth edition of the OLBT and includes all actions by the TBRC through the 2007 round of reviews. Also included in this report is a Review List of species which should be documented and reported to the TBRC if observed within Tennessee.

#### HISTORY OF THE OFFICIAL CHECKLIST

The TBRC (originally known as the TOS Certification Committee) was formed by a resolution at the 1982 TOS Spring Meeting and charged with the duty of compiling the first official list of all the bird species documented to have occurred in the state (Stallings 1982). This first edition of the OLBT was published in 1983 (Nicholson 1983). The committee's requirements for inclusion on the list were the existence of a specimen, photograph, or sound recording of the species or three independent, sufficiently documented reports of the species from within Tennessee. Additional species were included with "Provisional Status" if the documentation of their occurrence did not meet these requirements. Annotations were included to denote species considered extinct or extirpated from the state and introduced species considered to be established within the state. This first edition of the OLBT contained 348 species of which 14 were considered provisional, 4 extinct or extirpated, and 6 established, introduced species (Nicholson 1983).

The second edition of the OLBT was published in 1998 (Knight 1998) and reflected all TBRC actions through 1997. The format of the list and the requirements for inclusion remained the same as those for the original list with the exception that established, introduced species were not specially denoted. The second edition of the OLBT included a total of 390 species of which 20 were considered provisional, 2 extirpated from the state, and 2 extinct (Knight 1998).

In 1999, the TBRC produced a third edition of the OLBT which included a status code for each species on the list and annotations to indicate those species which had successfully bred in Tennessee. In addition to the previously used status codes of "Provisional," "Extirpated," and "Extinct," three new status codes were adopted: "Regular" defined as having been reported 9 of the previous 10 years or 30 times in the last 10 years, "Casual" defined as having been reported at least 4 times in the last 10 years, and "Accidental" defined as having been reported less than 4 times in the last 10 years. The list of review species for which

the TBRC requested documentation included all species with provisional, accidental, or casual status as well as any regular species seen outside of its normal range or season. A species was considered to have successfully bred in Tennessee if young were hatched (but not necessarily fledged) from eggs laid in a nest within the state border. Documentation of breeding success was compiled from the *Atlas of the Breeding Birds of Tennessee* (Nicholson 1997) and other published accounts (M.A. Greene, Pers. Comm.). This major update of the OLBT was never published in *The Migrant* and only appeared on the TBRC webpage of the TOS website (www.tnbirds.org). Subsequent updates were made to the online version of the checklist following actions by the TBRC.

## NOTES ON THE CURRENT EDITION

The fourth edition of the OLBT presented herein reflects all TBRC actions through the 2007 round of reviews. Organization of the list follows the taxonomy of the seventh edition of the American Ornithologists' Union Check-list of North American Birds (AOU 1998) and all subsequent supplements through the Fortyeighth Supplement (AOU 2007). The requirements for inclusion remain the same as for previous editions of the list: an existing specimen, photograph, or sound recording of the species or three independent, sufficiently documented reports of the species from within Tennessee. Accepted species are placed on the list with provisional status (denoted by (P)) if these requirements are not met. Species denoted with an asterisk (\*) are documented to have bred within Tennessee in accordance with the classification of "confirmed breeder" defined in the *Atlas of the Breeding Birds of Tennessee* (documented evidence of a nest or young) (Nicholson 1997). Each species on the list is denoted with a status code defined as follows:

- Regular expected to occur every year in appropriate range and season
- Casual occurs with some frequency but not regularly
- Accidental very rare and unpredictable vagrant
- Extirpated no longer occurs within the state
- EXtinct.

The status of each species is determined by the TBRC based on the recent and historical frequency with which the species is reported in Tennessee with emphasis placed on recent trends of occurrence. The primary sources used in this determination are TBRC submissions and the seasonal reports published in *The Migrant*.

The current checklist contains 406 species of which 274 are considered regular, 30 casual, 97 accidental, 3 extirpated, and 2 extinct. Of these species, 182 are known to have bred within Tennessee. Of the 97 accidental species, 13 are further classified as provisional.

This edition of the OLBT was drafted by TBRC members Kevin Calhoon, Phillip Casteel, Dean Edwards (Secretary), John Henderson, Donald Miller, Richard Preston, and Jan Shaw. The committee members would also like to thank Mark Greene, Richard Knight, Charles Nicholson, Chris Sloan, and Michael Todd for reviewing the checklist and species status codes.

#### THE REVIEW LIST

Following the main list is the Review List containing 131 species for which the TBRC requests documentation when seen within the state or outside of their expected range. The Review List includes all accidental species and some of the more rare casual species. Documentation is also requested for some regular species when observed outside of their limited range or normal season. Obviously, the TBRC also requests documentation for any species not currently on the list or any species listed as extirpated or extinct. Finally, the TBRC requests documentation of breeding evidence for any species not currently designated as a confirmed breeder within the state. Report forms and instructions for submission are available online on the TBRC page of the TOS website (www.tnbirds.org).

As a special note, the recent reports of Trumpeter Swan and Whooping Crane in Tennessee represent birds from as-yet un-established reintroduction efforts in northern states. The TBRC encourages everyone to continue documenting such sightings and reporting them to the regional editors of the seasonal reports in *The Migrant*; however, the TBRC will not act on these reports unless these populations should become established and self-sustaining.

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# 2006 TENNESSEE FALL NORTH AMERICAN MIGRATION COUNTS

Compiled by Ron Hoff 282 Hackworth Ln. Clinton, TN 37716

This report summarizes the 7th consecutive Tennessee Fall North American Migration Count (NAMC), which is always held on the 3rd Saturday in September as part of the International Migratory Bird Day (IMBD), an event designed to draw attention to migrating birds. Only 5 counties were censused this year. Seventy-five observers logged 187.42 party hours in finding 157 species and 22,893 individual birds (Table 1). This equals 122.1 birds/party hour. Northern Pintail, Least Bittern, Virginia Rail (all found on the Greene County count), and Connecticut Warbler were new species for this count, bringing the all-time species total to 216. The weather was warm to hot with no precipitation and little or no wind. Temperatures ranged from 51-92° F. Other unusual species found on this year's count included Barn Owl, Whip-poor-will (only the second record on this count in 7 years), Olive-sided and Alder Flycatchers, Horned Lark, Lincoln's Sparrow, and Baltimore Oriole. Species appearing in record high numbers were: American Black Duck, Wild Turkey, Eastern Screech Owl, Great Horned Owl, Barred Owl, Pileated Woodpecker, Eastern Wood-Pewee, Eastern Phoebe, Eastern Kingbird, White-eyed Vireo, Yellow-throated Vireo, Tree Swallow, White-breasted Nuthatch, Carolina Wren, Eastern Bluebird, Gray-cheeked and Swainson's Thrushes, Gray Catbird, Goldenwinged and Hooded Warblers, Eastern Towhee, Northern Cardinal, and Indigo Bunting. Species appearing in all-time lowest numbers included Pied-billed Grebe, Spotted Sandpiper, Great Crested Flycatcher, Black-throated Green and Yellowthroated Warblers, Scarlet Tanager, and Brown-headed Cowbird. The totals for "observers," "parties," "miles by foot," "hours owling," and "feeder observers" were also the highest ever.

# 2006 TENNESSEE TRADITIONAL FALL BIRD COUNTS

Compiled by Ron Hoff 282 Hackworth Ln. Clinton, TN 37716

This summary reports on the fall bird counts that are held on a date other than the third Saturday in September, which is the annual date for the Fall North American Migration Count (NAMC). This year 174 species and 36,292 individuals were tallied (Table 1). This translates into 116.4 birds/party hour. Typical for fall counts, early winter arrivals and late-lingering migrational breeders added notably to the species totals. The weather was generally mild to warm for the counts in September but colder for counts in October, with temperatures ranging from 32-86° F. Several counts experienced some rain and wind. Count highlights included Eared Grebe, American and Least bitterns, Northern Goshawk, Merlin, Peregrine Falcon, Northern Saw-whet Owl, Whip-poor-will, Olive-sided, Least, Great Crested, and Scissor-tailed Flycatchers, Loggerhead Shrike, Warbling Vireo, Purple Martin, Golden-winged Warbler, and Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrow. Notable misses included Bank Swallow, Brown-headed Nuthatch, and Dickcissel.

## COUNTY SUMMARIES

Elizabethton - 30 September; 0600-2030. Weather: partly cloudy with late afternoon showers and winds S at 5-20 mph; 37-71° F. The count area includes Carter County and parts of adjacent Johnson, Sullivan, Unicoi, and Washington Counties. The average number of species for the last 20 years is 123.8 and the alltime high count was 137 in 1993. Aside from Killdeer, no shorebirds were found. Nineteen species of warblers were seen, but overall numbers seemed low. A good variety of raptors occurred. Swallows were more numerous than usual at this date, with 4 species and a record high count of Tree Swallows. Notable misses were Northern Bobwhite, Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Barn Owl, and shrike. Best finds were Northern Goshawk at Roan Mountain and Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrow in Shady Valley. Also notable were Eared Grebe, American & Least Bittern, Merlin, Northern Saw-whet Owl, Philadelphia Vireo, Sedge & Marsh Wrens, and Wilson's Warbler. Knoxville – 24 September; 0615-1935; 2315-2350. Weather: overcast with showers; a cold front passed through in the late afternoon; 6 inches of rain the previous day; 62-75° F. Highlights included 10 Cooper's Hawks, Peregrine Falcon, American Golden-Plover, Olive-sided and Least Flycatchers, and Orange-crowned and Wilson's warblers. Notable misses included Wild Turkey, Northern Bobwhite, Bald

Lebanon – 14 October; 0600-1700. Weather: clear, breezy start, with wind dying down later; 32-65° F. Participants were unable to census birds at Boxwell Scout Camp, so waterfowl counts were low. Diversity was increased by including a wetland on the East side of Laguardo and lagoons at Hickory Flats WMA (Canoe Branch Rd.). # THE FALL SEASON

1 AUGUST - 30 NOVEMBER 2006

Temperatures this season were near normal to slightly above normal, being most notably warmer in November. Rainfall varied from below average in West Tennessee to above average in the eastern end of the state. Unlike several recent years, little or no effects of tropical systems were felt in the state this season.

A paucity of strong frontal activity in the late season, in combination with the overall mildness at that time, resulted in generally low numbers of waterfowl. However, the three scoter species and Long-tailed Duck made a good showing in both West and East Tennessee. Long-legged waders were in good numbers. A Wood Stork in the Ridge and Valley was particularly noteworthy given their low numbers near the Mississippi River. Shorebirds did pretty well, at least at some of their usual hot spots. The fall hawkwatch at Soddy Mountain was joined by expanded hawk migration monitoring at Big Bald Mountain (see Table 1). The passerine migration received little comment, although the three mountain banding stations had a good season. Boreal irruptives were very scarce. A mixed breeding pair of a Western Kingbird and a Scissor-tailed Flycatcher in Shelby County was quite unusual.

Notable rarities this season included Western Grebe, White-faced Ibis, and jaeger sp. in the Western Coastal Plain. A Mottled Duck and an Inca Dove in the Ridge and Valley were extraordinary. A Swallow-tailed Kite in the Mountain region was noteworthy. A Mississippi Kite in Maury County and a Bewick's Wren in Jackson County were among highlights in the Highland Rim and Basin region.

WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION — This was a dry autumn, with temperatures around normal. Fall migration seemed less than spectacular, with the number of unusual sightings seemingly fewer than in most recent years. Henry County, however, produced observations of several noteworthy species, such as Cackling Goose, all three scoters, Pacific Loon, four species of grebes, an unidentified jaeger, and six species of gulls. A White-faced Ibis in November in Lake County was of interest. A mixed pair of a male Western Kingbird and a female Scissor-tailed Flycatcher, which produced five hybrid young, was noted in north Memphis, while pure pairs of both species were also breeding in Shelby County.

Although highs did not reach the century mark, the mean monthly temperature was over four degrees above normal. November was also somewhat warmer than usual, while the two middle months had typical temperatures. 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CUMBERLAND PLATEAU/RIDGE & VALLEY REGION — For much of the season temperatures were near normal, except that November was rather mild. Rainfall was slightly above average for the season as a whole. Heavy rains from a stalled front from 31 August to 5 September (possibly aided by moisture from Tropical Storm *Ernesto* going up the East Coast) raised the water level of Douglas Lake over two feet, inundating recently exposed mudflats at Rankin Bottoms during the peak of shorebird migration.

A "mystery grebe" present for about a week in mid September at Eagle Bend Fish Hatchery led to some debate. Most who saw the bird or photos of it thought that it was a Horned Grebe, but others felt that it was an Eared Grebe. Longlegged waders and shorebirds made another good showing at Rankin Bottoms this season. A lingering Wood Stork was notable there. Twenty-five species of

shorebirds were found at Rankin this season, with a one day max of 700 individuals of 17 species (not counting numerous Killdeer) on 1 September. Kingston Steam Plant also produced some good shorebirds, but no big numbers. The shorebird habitat at Brainerd Levee was flooded for most of the period.

Two mega-rarities were found this season, a Mottled Duck in Jefferson County and an Inca Dove in adjacent Hamblen County. With only a very few records each in West Tennessee, both were rather unexpected in the eastern end of the state. Also of interest were two albino Red-tailed Hawks in the northeast corner of the region. One had been present for more than a year. Boreal irruptives were very scarce, with only a single report for each of the three most regular species (a nuthatch & two finches). A significant nocturnal flight of thrushes was witnessed in Greene County.

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**EASTERN MOUNTAIN REGION** — Daily temperatures were above normal for the period, averaging about two degrees warmer than usual. Precipitation was above average for the period by about four inches with most of the extra rainfall coming in August and September.

Banding operations for songbirds were conducted again at three locations in the region this fall. In addition, a raptor banding operation and a raptor migration count (see Table 1) were conducted at Big Bald Mountain. Tennessee Warblers and Swainson's Thrushes were banded in good numbers this year. Ovenbird numbers were higher than normal. Six Hermit Thrushes banded on Roan Mountain still had juvenile plumage indicating they were locally hatched. Summaries for each banding station follow.
