GREAT SHEARWATER FOUND IN PARKING LOT: FIRST TENNESSEE RECORD

On 11 August 2005, an injured Great Shearwater (*Puffinus gravis*) was found in the parking lot of the Kenwood Church of Christ in Murfreesboro, Rutherford County, in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina. The bird had a broken leg and was taken for treatment to Walden's Puddle, a rehabilitation center in Nashville.

Denise Weyer, a Walden's Puddle volunteer, emailed me about this bird and sent photos. She asked that I confirm the identification of the bird as a Great Shearwater. I did not examine the bird personally.

The narrow, thin, long black bill with the characteristic nare structure identified this as a shearwater. The combination of bill color, overall chocolate brown upperparts, nearly complete white collar around the neck, dusky belly patch, and small amount of white in the upper tail coverts is not shared with any other species of tubenose.

I have extensive experience with this species as I am a leader and regular participant on Brian Patterson's pelagic trips out of Hatteras, North Carolina, where this species is regular during the warmer months. The shearwater ultimately died. David Vogt prepared this bird as a study specimen, and it is now in the collection of the University of Tennessee, Chattanooga. The photos taken by Denise Weyer were provided to the Tennessee Bird Records Committee and clearly establish the identification of the Great Shearwater.

NOTE: The editors have chosen to include the previously unpublished details of this record due to its historical significance.

2011 TENNESSEE ORNITHOLOGICAL SOCIETY TRADITIONAL SPRING COUNT

The Traditional Spring Bird Count is conducted on dates other than the North American Migration Count date. The individual counts may cover more than one county and more than one day. This year the count total was 201 species. Mild weather was the norm this year with rain only in White County. Temperatures ranged from a chilly 37° F in Cumberland County to a warm 83° F in Overton County.

This year's highlight was a longspur species found on the Knox County count that was thought to be a Smith's Longspur. The bird was found but quickly flushed and could not be re-located for positive identification. Also of note are the 44 Canada Warblers at Elizabethton, a result of increased effort at high elevations.

Minutes of the TOS 2011 Spring Board of Directors Meeting 30 April 2011 Millington, Tennessee

The TOS 2011 Spring meeting was held 29 April – 1 May in Millington, TN, hosted by the Memphis Chapter. Field trips were offered to Meeman-Shelby Forest, Shelby Farms and The Earth Complex.

The Directors meeting was called to order by President Dick Preston at 3:00 p.m. on 30 April. Acting Secretary Donna Ward confirmed that a quorum was met. Van Harris made the motion that the minutes of the fall 2010 meeting be approved as read with the addition of the following statement from the treasurer's report: "Mac McWhirter, treasurer, stated that TOS is in good financial condition." The motion was seconded and carried.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS-AT-LARGE

PRESIDENT: President Dick Preston asked that local chapters enter the information from chapter checklists onto ebird. He announced that 10-12 June will be the dates of the Shady Valley Foray, and the planners are asking for volunteers. He also announced that long-time TOS member Fred Alsop has been awarded the Carter-Patton Conservation Prize. President Preston also noted that the final decision regarding the hunting of Sandhill Cranes in Tennessee has been deferred for two years.

CURATOR: Chuck Nicholson asked chapters to send updates of their posted chapter information and members to submit bird-finding site guides. He stated our website continues to receive many visitors.

TREASURER: Mac McWhirter stated there are 639 members of TOS as of last year, and there has been an increase in membership for the last two years. He also noted that investments have done well. Total revenues - \$35,049.79; Total Expenses - \$23,333.11; Total Assets - \$235,846.58

Gregg Elliot, Chris Sloan, Bill Franks, Chuck Nicholson and Cyndi Routledge. Melinda Welton reported the following:

- December 2010, the committee signed onto a letter in support of the USFS final rule removing Rusty Blackbird from its depredation order and precluding the use of lead shot
- January 2010, wrote a letter to the editor of *The Tennessean* clarifying the TOS position against the hunting of Sandhill Cranes in response to a letter in favor of the hunt by Mike Butler of the Tennessee Wildlife Federation
- Individual members of the committee signed onto a letter of support for the protection of the U.S. Prairie Pothole Region called the Dakota Grasslands Project
- As a member of the Bird Conservation Alliance, TOS signed onto a letter in support of reauthorization of the Neotropical Migratory Bird Conservation Act
- Supported Congressional funding for the Land and Conservation Fund
- Signed on to a letter to the FCC addressing bird collisions with communication towers
- February 2011, signed on to a letter to the Secretary of the Interior asking for the development of a department-wide policy to address feral cat management
- March 2011, signed onto the ABC "Bird Smart Campaign" which supports wind energy that meets mandatory guidelines for mitigating bird impacts
- March 2011, sent a letter to Governor Haslam requesting that future appointments to the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Commission include individuals with a broader interest in wildlife than strictly consumptive
- April 2011, signed onto a letter of the Bird Conservation Alliance to the House Agriculture and Natural Resources Committees expressing strong support for a rigorous scientifically-based solution to the issue of pesticide use

CONSERVATION RESEARCH AND FUNDING: Dick Preston stated no grants were awarded this year, and he hopes to find someone to serve as chair of the committee.

TN-BIRD MONITOR: Wallace Coffey sent the following report: The listserv continues to be very active with more than 600 subscribers posting an average of 2200 messages each year. It has been shown to be a valuable tool for disseminating timely information to the birding community on issues such as the Sandhill Crane hunt, and is a major source of bird records for The Season report for *The Migrant*.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD: Dick Preston stated there are no nominations for this year. He added that the Mockingbird pin given to recipients of the award is no longer available, and a new type of momento may be needed.

OLD BUSINESS:

Dick Preston noted that TOS and the Virginia Society of Ornithology will host a joint meeting in Johnson City on 18-20 May 2012.

Constitution Committee: Committee Chair Susan McWhirter proposed the following amendment to the TOS constitution, as had been published in *The Tennessee Warbler*. Other members of the committee are Danny Gaddy and Richard Connors.

Article V, Section 6 currently states, "The Secretary shall keep minutes of the meetings, attend to official correspondence, prepare notices of meetings, and work to create interest in the activities of the Society." The committee proposes that "prepare notices of meetings, and work to create interest in the activities of the Society" be deleted and this addition be made: "The Secretary shall submit to the President a rough draft of the minutes 30 days following the meeting. A final draft of the minutes is to be submitted to the President and posted on the web site at least 30 days prior to the next meeting, with copies made to be presented to the Board of Directors at the next meeting." Melinda Welton seconded, and the vote was unanimous to accept this change.

Article VI – Committees: Section 1, after the sentence, "The President-Elect shall be chosen from that division of the state whose turn it will be to receive the Presidency for a full two-year term," and proposed adding the following sentence: "If after extended search no candidate can be found from that division, the Nominating Committee may seek a candidate from another division of the state, making every effort to follow the succession of the divisions." Virginia Reynolds seconded, and the vote was unanimous to accept this change.

NEW BUSINESS:

Dick Preston expressed the importance of funding a TOS representative to attend meetings of the American Bird Conservancy when issues of vital importance to Tennessee are on the agenda. Virginia Reynolds made the motion that TOS reimburse \$300.00 to Melinda Welton as part of her expenses for attending the ABC conference. Ron Hoff seconded, and the motion passed.

Dick Preston stated that Rick Knight asked that TOS consider sponsoring a statewide effort to update the results of the initial atlas project.



Dick Preston stated he plans to ask the Chattanooga Chapter to host the Fall 2011 meeting. During the annual banquet the business meeting was held. He also detailed the changes to the Constitution. A motion was made and seconded to accept the changes, and the motion passed.

THE SPRING SEASON

Richard L. Knight, Editor



1 March - 31 May 2011

Both temperature and precipitation were well above normal this spring. A very active weather pattern brought frequent severe weather events. Storms spawning large hail and tornados hit several areas across the state. Near-record flooding occurred along the Mississippi River and elsewhere creating additional waterbird habitat. Storm fronts in late April caused a fallout of notable shorebirds, mainly in the western half of the state.

At least two species of 13-year periodical cicadas made their synchronous mass emergence in May and June, primarily in Middle Tennessee. Their loud calls made hearing bird song difficult at times, but they provided an abundant short-term food source for birds.

West Tennessee produced three notable rarities: White-faced Ibis, Prairie Falcon, and White-winged Dove. Mid-state highlights included Mississippi Kite(s) at Nashville and Bachman's Sparrow in Wayne County. Also, a back-road survey covering 51 miles in western Putnam County on 20 May for Cerulean Warblers produced good tallies of other breeding Neo-tropical migrant birds. East Tennessee birders found a Purple Gallinule, Whimbrel, and lingering Tundra Swans and Long-tailed Duck. There were several record or near-record early arrival dates established this season.

Two sightings this spring involved birds that had been color-marked in Canada: a Piping Plover at Old Hickory Lake had been banded in Saskatchewan a decade earlier and a Great Egret at Fort Loudoun Lake had been marked with colored wing-tags in Ontario last year. Congratulations to the keen observers who spotted these marked individuals.

WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION - - This spring was marked by extreme weather conditions. March was close to normal, but April and May had higher than normal temperatures and rainfall that reached record or near record levels throughout the region. The Mississippi River crested just inches below the all-time record flood level at Memphis and caused major flooding throughout the western counties as tributaries backed up. Violent thunderstorms had adverse effects on birds and birders alike. Many traditional hotspots were flooded or access limited due to road closures. Shorebird numbers were very good, as were long-legged waders.

HIGHLAND RIM AND BASIN REGION - - Temperatures for the spring season in the Nashville area were relatively normal in March, but in April and May they provided a roller coaster ride, exemplified by a high temperature swing of over 30 degrees during a period of just three days in May. By the end of May high temperatures were similar to those during the mid-summer months. Precipitation in March and May was near normal, while April was very wet, having nearly double the typical rainfall. Fronts continually pushed through Middle Tennessee during April and early May, making for excellent migrant fallout conditions. In particular, a nice selection of unusual shorebirds was found at "Snow Bunting Peninsula" on Old Hickory Lake.

CUMBERLAND PLATEAU / RIDGE & VALLEY REGION - - Following a mild February, each of the three spring months had warmer than normal temperatures. Rainfall was above average each month, especially in March and April when some areas received double the normal amount. Some severe thunderstorms produced large hail or tornados, both rather rare in the eastern end of the state. The principle Hamilton County wetlands were too full to provide much shorebird habitat for most of the season.

A Hooded Merganser hen with four young represented a rare breeding record in East

Tennessee. Two new nesting sites for cormorants add to the growing population. A Great Blue Heron nest with small young on 12 March was considerably earlier than the published early date for nestlings given in the Breeding Bird Atlas. Regional rarities included Roughlegged Hawk, Purple Gallinule, Common Moorhen (two reports), Black-necked Stilt, Whimbrel, and Lark Sparrow. A new county was added to the list with records of Fish Crow. Dickcissels were reported from six widespread counties, which was well above average.

EASTERN MOUNTAIN REGION - - Average daily temperatures were above normal for all three months. Precipitation was also above normal for each month in the period, amounting to about 5.5 inches above normal rainfall for the season.

Good breeding records were recorded for Hampton Creek Cove, near Roan Mountain. A Black-billed Cuckoo nest with young was documented there. A female Blue-winged Warbler with a nest at this location was the first breeding record for this species in northeast Tennessee. Interestingly, its mate was apparently a Golden-winged Warbler.

The first Unicoi County record for Henslow's Sparrow was in a very small opening in a forested area at the base of Unaka Mountain, a most unusual place to find this species. Some very nice photos documented this record. Also in Unicoi County, a flock of Red Crossbills attended a feeder for nearly a month, allowing good looks for several birders.

INSTRUCTIONS TO AUTHORS

The Migrant records observations and studies of birds in Tennessee and adjacent areas. SUBMISSIONS: The original and two copies of the manuscript should be sent to the Co-Editors: Susan McWhirter, 1760 Rayburn Walling Rd., Rock Island, TN 38581 snmcwhirter@gmail.com or Martha Waldron, 1014 Murray Hill Lane, Memphis, TN 38120 martha.waldron@gmail.com. Manuscripts that have been published in other journals should not be submitted.

MATERIAL: The subject matter should relate to some phase of Tennessee ornithology. It should be original, factual, concise and scientifically accurate.

STYLE: Both articles and short notes are solicited; recent issues of *The Migrant* should be used as a guide in the preparation of manuscripts. Where more detail is needed, reference should be made to the *CBE Style Manual*; this book is available at many public libraries and from the Council of Biology Editors, Inc., 111 East Wacker Drive, Suite 3200, Chicago, IL 60601-4298.

COPY: Manuscripts should be double-spaced with adequate margins for editorial notations and emailed in Word.docx. Tables and figures should be prepared on separate sheets with appropriate headings; see CBE Style Manual for examples of appropriate form for tables. Photographs intended for reproduction should be sharp with good contrast on glossy white paper. Weights, measurements, and distances should be in metric units. Dates should be in "continental" form (e.g., 16 March 1997). Use the 24-hour clock (e.g., 0500 or 1900).

NOMENCLATURE: The scientific name of a species should be given after the first use of the full common name in the text. The scientific name should be italicized and in parentheses. Names should follow the *A. O. U. Check-list of North American Birds* (seventh edition, 1998, or supplements).

TITLE: The title should be concise, specific and descriptive.

ABSTRACT: Manuscripts of five or more pages should include an abstract. The abstract should be less then 5% of the length of the manuscript. It should include a brief explanation of why the research was done, the major results, and why the results are important.

LITERATURE CITED: List all literature citations in a "Literature Cited" section at the end of the text. Text citations should include the author and year.

IDENTIFICATION: Manuscripts including reports of rare or unusual species or of species at atypical times should include: date and time, light and weather conditions, exact location, habitat, optical equipment, distance, behavior of bird, comparison with other similar species, characteristic markings, experience of observer, other observers verifying the identification and reference works consulted.

REPRINTS: Reprints are available to authors on request. Billing to authors will be through the TOS treasurer. Request for reprints must be made well in advance of printing.

SEASON REPORTS: Observations that are to be considered for publication in "The Season"section should be mailed to the appropriate Regional Compiler. Consult a recent issue of *The Migrant* for the name and address of the compiler.
