Terns, with their highly social breeding systems and their propensity to choose fragile nesting areas, are particularly vulnerable to human interference, direct and indirect, as Dennis Minksy and Peter Trull illustrate in their reports. We encourage you to carefully consider the issues raised in Wayne Petersen's article.
