Bulletin No. 2. - April - May

The present season has proved exceptionally favorable to bird life, all of the common species being more in evidence than for a number of years past. This may be due in part to the rather slow steady advance of seasonal changes, until the present hot wave arrived.

1. Nesting and Other Activities

1. Robin; Mar. 12, Noble Road, birds paired; Apr. 25, Noble Road, nest of 4 eggs, incubation begun, in wild cherry 11 ft. up; Apr. 27, nest in elm, 20 feet. up, Adelbert Campus, opposite Physics Lab'y; incubation begun; May 1, nest in elm 20 feet up, Adelbert Campus, opposite Biological Lab'y; incubation begun; May 16, young about 5 days old; May 2, 2 nest each with 4 eggs in maples about 15 feet up, Noble Road, Agnes Herrick and Jean Grigor; May 8, nest on window ledge, next to glass; young 6 days old, Mr. Elliott's, Noble Road, robbed by crow at 4:45 A.M. Crow seen and driven off by Mr. Elliott, but not until it had broken and dropped one egg, and probably eaten another; one was carried off in its bill, and one left in the nest, which was deserted.
2. Meadow Lark; Mar. 12; singing from dawn until near noon; May 10, nest of 4 fresh eggs under old goldenrod stems in field near Noble Road; Jean Grigor.
3. Turtle Dove; April 16, nest begun in old robin's nest in maple close to house, 30 feet.up; eggs Apr. 18-19 about; young hatched May 4 (about), Mrs. Ruedy.
4. Flicker; May 1, nest begun in dead maple branch 18 ft. up Noble Road; May 5, nest finished.
5. Shrike; Apr. 27, nest of 6 eggs in thorn apple near Noble Rd; incubated 3-4 days; May 14, naked young probably 3-4 days old. May 6, nest of 7 eggs in pear 8 ft. up near Stop 6, Mayfield Rd.; May 13 naked young; Jean Grigor and Agnes Herrick.
6. Song Sparrow; Mar. 27, Noble Rd. the only birds singing on coldest days, from dawn to after sundown; Apr. 27 nest of 5 eggs in brush pile, Noble Rd; May 6, nest of 4 eggs, under bank of ditch; Noble Rd.
7. Savannah Sparrow; May 10, nest of 4 eggs on ground near Noble Rd.
8. Screech Owl; Apr. 27, near Noble Rd; bird seen to enter nest-hole at inaccessible point in top of dead ash 4- ft. up; J.Grigor
9. Baltimore Oriole; nest begun in high wind elm 2- ft. up May 11, Noble Rd; site abandoned and new nest built in elm on opposite side of street May 13-15 about.

1. Olive backed Thrush; May 14, one killed by flying against windows of Biological Laboratory.
2. Blackburnian Warbler; May 15, one killed at same point.

June 10 Heard Cuckoo in bank between C. School grounds and
Boulevard. Again on Adelbert College Campus at 1;30 p.m.
Probably Blackbill.

Sept. 2. Pine Warbler – female found dead Noble Road.
