Do birds think, that is to say, reason after the manner of Human beings? Can it be asserted with authority that at least some birds do reason? What is the difference between instinct and reason? Or is there, physiologically speaking, any difference whatever? Many of us nature lovers have probably been personally observant of various incidents and actions of individual birds as well as of Carnivora, that were so similar to those of the genus Homo, that seemed to us almost impossible for them to be, in the physiological sense, of different origins.

The writer's attention has only recently been called to two or three rare and astonishing incidents. A week or two ago – in the last days of the month of May, Mr. Cooper, a member of the faculty of the Cleveland School of Art, and an experienced observer of birds, put some hardtack in the feeding-box at his home in East Cleveland, which was 'attacked' almost immediately by a Bronzed Grackle. After many vain efforts to crack the hard piece of bread, so that he could eat it, he picked it up (apparently deliberately) in his beak and walking to the nearby pan of water dropped it in and let it lie in the water until it was soft; then he ate the entire piece. When Dean Henry Turner Bailey (from whom the writer received the story) told Mrs. Bailey about Mr. Cooper's Grackle, she remarked that she also had more than once seen Grackles (seemingly deliberately) drop hard pieces of bread into the water-pan, and then eat them after the bread had become soft.

Dean Bailey himself was an eye-witness of an even more remarkable incident not many days ago, at his own feeding-box. He was watching a "bunch" of English Sparrows, thickly clustered around the feeding-box, and busily feeding as, perhaps, only sparrows can feed. Suddenly a male Grackle lighted on the box close behind the busy sparrows and for a few seconds observed them intently in silence; then he walked up closer to them and gave one of the sparrows a savage peck on the back of the head. The sparrow keeled over on his side, and the Grackle pecked him in the head again, in order to "finish" him completely. Then in a jiffy, the Grackle ate the Sparrow's brains – cleaned out the small brain-pan entirely. The following morning Mr. Bailey found nothing of the sparrow-carcass left but the wing and tail feathers. The Grackle had devoured the sparrow as completely as a Sparrow Hawk might have done!

The following list, though not quite so long as the corresponding Bulletins of the two or three years preceding, contains several birds which are not recorded in those bulletins. On the whole, fewer water-birds, especially ducks, have been reported this spring than usual:
