## BIRD CALENDAR - 1934 - 30<sup>TH</sup> YEAR

#### Bulletin No. 4 January 26, 1935

Bulletin No. 4 covers the autumn season from September 1 to December 31. During this period 165 species were recorded by members of the Cleveland Bird Club. This is 12 more than were seen during the corresponding period in 1933. Five species were recorded for the first time during the year: stilt sandpiper, rough-legged hawk, short-eared owl, snow bunting, and Lapland longspur. This brings the total list for the year to 224, which is 12 more than the total number observed in 1933.

Twelve people have reported regularly to this calendar during the year besides several others that have sent in miscellaneous migration dates and notes. We would be glad to welcome any new contributors in our district, as the value and accuracy of this calendar is in direct proportion to the number of records submitted.

The following table is of interest not only in giving the number of trips taken each month but also in indicating, although only approximately, further information in regard to these trips. These averages were made after gathering the necessary information from each contributor and will be useful in the interpretation of the bird records that follow.

A total of 363 trips were made by all observers during the year, or approximately one per day. This is not as many as the number of trips, 432, made in 1933.

A few weather statistics are of interest here.

In general, the temperature continued above normal and the precipitation remained below normal – the same relation that held last summer.

The summary of the bird records is presented below in approximately the same manner as in the preceding bulletins. The <u>index of abundance</u> is the average number of individuals of the species observed on all trips for the month multiplied by the percentage of all trips for the month on which the species was recorded. The species are listed in the table in the approximate order of their decreasing abundance. It will be noted that the order of the relative abundance varies from month to month.

Undoubtedly the most conspicuous and abundant bird in the woods during the autumn months is the robin. Here they congregate in large flocks that move slowly through the woods or the individuals fly over one another hunting for food. A natural question is what percentage of these birds were raised in this vicinity and what percentage have come in from the north. The winter mortality in this species must be high to reduce this population and prevent overcrowding of the bird-world the following spring.

Of the birds of the open country, the starling ranks first in abundance. We were somewhat surprised to see that the goldfinch ranked second, even above the song sparrow, and that their numbers tended to increase during the autumn months. This species is somewhat more conspicuous than the song sparrow, but normally both species should decrease in abundance during the autumn as many individuals migrate. The good showing of the bob-white is encouraging, indicating that they have a good breeding season in 1934.

Bird Club members interested in water birds have a good opportunity for their study during the winter, as there is usually some open water in Lake Erie between Gordon Park and Rocky River. On December 22<sup>nd</sup> one observer made the following record for this lakefront; Black Duck (100), Pintail (1\*[sic], Baldpate (25), Lesser Scaup Duck (3100), Golden-eye (6), Buffle-head (2), White-winged Scoter (4), Red-breasted Merganser (75), American Merganser (25), Herring Gull (50), Ring-billed Gull (200), Bonaparte Gull (400), Total 12 species, 3988 individuals.
