He also writes: "I use chick feed, bread, sunflower, canary and millet seeds for bait. For some birds I use suet. I only operate 4 traps. Thanks to my pupils, I have been able to band a few unusual birds. The three owls were all brought to school by pupils last year. Not included on the list above is another screech owl brought to me last month by a pupil. They also bring in bands of birds found dead."
