THE ANNUAL MEETING Ramsey, New Jersey, April 12-13, 1958

COUNCIL MEETINGS

Matters dealt with at the Business Meeting of the Council on April 12 in the Municipal Building, Ramsey, N.J. twelve members being present and President Fluck pre-

siding, included: The approval of the Minutes of the previous meeting; the Traasurer's Report (which appears elsewhere in this issue); reports of committees and the re-appointment of Frank P. Frazier to serve as EBBA NEWS editor for another year. The Registration Fee for the annual meetings, commencing in 1959, was raised from 50ϕ to \$1.00. An amendment to the Constitution was presented and passed as follows: that the retiring President be automatically retained on the Council for a period of two years.

A letter was read from Dr. Charles Elake in which the Council was advised of the intention of southern banders to form a southeastern chapter of EBBA. The Council passed a motion that it approved the formation of such a chapter within EBBA and offered any assistance possible to the new organization.

An impromptu meeting of the new Council was held during the Sunday Field Trip, nine members being present and President Low presiding. President Low appointed a committee to prepare a report on the purpose, aims and organization of a National Council of bird banding associations: Mrs. Dickerson, Mr. Frazier, and Mrs. Dater, chairman. The committee was directed to report to the Council prior to the October meeting of the A. O. U. in New York in October, at which meeting there is to be an informal gathering of representatives of the other banding groups.

ANNUAL MEETING and ELECTION OF OFFICERS After reading and approval of the minutes of the previous meeting, and of the Treasurer's Report, President Fluck called for the report of the Nom-

inating Committee, Orville Crowder, chairman. The nominating committee proposed Seth H. Low for president. Mrs. Eleanor Dater was nominated from the floor. In the election which followed, Seth H. Low was elected president. The remaining officers and members of the Council proposed by the nominating committee, there being no further nominations, were elected unanimously. They are:
