## MORE DEAD BIRDS ON HIGHWAY By Bruce Adams

I read with great interest in the July-August issue the article by Geoffrey Gill on a crecord of birds killed on a highway near his home. Two years ago, during the summer months of 1956, I made a similar record. About 4 days a week I traveled by bicycle along a tw-mile portion of Route #129 near my home in Connecticut. This portion of road was about 1/3 residential area, 1/3 woods and 1/3 open field area.

Unlike Mr. Gill, none of the 13 birds I found were banded, either by myself or others. I notice that though Robins were at the top of his list, (96 out of 209 birds) I had only 3 out of 13. I am also perplexed about the number of Chestnut-sided Warblers I found, and why this species was the only warbler, except for one Black-and-White. The list totals 13 birds of 15 species and is as follows:
