Five years and four months: No. 515-41159: July 25, 1951 to November 8, 1956, when it was caught on a fishing line and released, at Conch Key, Florida; this bird was reported found dead on November 20, 1956 15 miles north of Marathon, Florida.

BANDS FOR HUMMINGBIRDS Ralph K. Bell of Clarksville, Pa. writes: "With the increasing use of mist nets, more banders will be catching and attempting to band Hummingbirds. Old and worn size 0 or 1 bands are the best to use, as they are thinner and easier to read. Most stations will have some of these, taken from casualties or dead birds. Mold the cut-down band (leaving three legible numbers) around a 3" safety pin or wire of equivalent size. Then reopen with a penknife to place on the Hummingbird.

"Even by cutting the band down as close to the three numbers as possible, the band may still be too wide: the Hummer may not be able to open its hind toe properly due to the width of the band. Cut off two corners of the band as illustrated 123 in such a way as to give room for the hind toe: the toe fits in the notch created by removing the two corners. The band should be filed down with a nail file to make sure there are no sharp edges."
