This might take more work to compile, it would, however, take only half the space to publish It means very little to me as a bander that one person banded 78 House Wrens in one year - it gives no idea of how many were banded by the English that year."

Robert L. Pyle of Washington, D.C., has suggested a much expanded plan for an annual banding summary, which will require more investigation into its possibilities and application: more of this in a subsequent issue of EBBA NEWS.
