banding is done in Michigan, Illinois and Arkansas.

In addition to banding large numbers of adult and immature blackbirds such year, many volunteer banders are participating in the Cooperative Redwinged Blackbird Nestling Program sponsored by the Patuxent Wildlife Redwinged Center. In 1961, cooperators banded over 3,200 nestlings. Each patuxent biologists band appreximately 1,000 nestlings. Because of the habitat in which nests most often are built, the banding of nestlings involves considerable effort; but it provides the best information on the origin of specific populations.
