TRAPS AND BAITS Notes by Frank P. Frazier

Random notes, made from a tape recording of the Trapping Session, conducted by former Ebba president Raymond J. Middleton, at the Annual Meeting in Cape May, follow:

- "A trip step trap on a tree, with a limb of the tree coming down towards it, catches all the woodpeckers in the vicinity."
- "I never use gathering cages. I carry a box of bands and band the birds right at the traps" -- Raymond Middleton.
- * "A water drip trap is the best trap ever invented" -- Ralph K. Bell.
- "Catbirds like cooked rice. . . Mockingbirds like oranges. . . Coffee cake crumbs, left overs, apples and raisins are liked by many species"
- "Banders should do a lot of free feeding. It keeps the birds coming around."
- # "Welded wire is much more durable than hardware cloth for making traps.
 . . 1/2" x 1" is best."
- "Paint makes traps less conspicuous -- brown if trap is to be placed on leaves, green if on grass. . .Rustoleum paint is best on galvanized wire traps. It won't flake off like other paint."
