BILL SAVELL'S In the last issue of EBBA News (Vol. 29, No. 5, p. 198)
RECOVERIES entitled "Three Recoveries in One Day" Bill Savell told
of finding three banded birds (two dead and one trapped)
on July 27, 1967 and one more on July 18, 1967. Reports on these have
been received from the Banding Office and are as follows:

Black Skimmer 534-77833 found dead near Somers Point, N.J. - banded by Gilbert Cavileer as a young bird in the same area August 15, 1967.

Black Skimmer 534-97129 trapped near Longport, N.J. - banded by Fred Mears near Stone Harbor, N.J. July 3, 1964.

Double-crested Cormorant (badly decomposed, not a loon as originally believed) 498-09806 found dead near Ocean City, N.J. - banded by C.R. Kury as a young bird at New Harbor, Maine on June 28, 1966.

The above are the three July 27 birds; also, the Laughing Gull found trapped in a mussel shell (and released) July 18, 1967 had been banded by New Jersey Fish & Game Commission as a young bird at Stone Harbor, N.J., on June 27, 1964.

In addition, Bill reports a new recovery: a banded Semipalmated Plover which was the only bird caught while he was trying to net shore-birds near Stone Harbor, N.J. on August 30, 1967 - this bird had been banded by R.D. Benedict near Cape May, N.J. on September 5, 1965.
