in Florida during the past 10 to 15 years, therefore we suspect these recent records are indicative of a real increase in this European vagrant in Florida. Local observers have a good opportunity to document the early history of this species in Florida, but we urge careful study before identifications are decided upon. Both of us have witnessed erroneous identifications when observers attempted to distinguish between the Lesser Black-backed Gull and the Great Black-backed Gull (Larus marinus), which definitely is increasing as a winter resident in Florida.
