COMMON LOON AT THE PATUXENT WILDLIFE RESEARCH CENTER

On April 17, 1987, a Common Loon (Gavia immer) was observed circling over Snowden Pond, Patuxent Wildlife Research Center in Prince George's County for about three minutes and then landing on the pond. The lone bird was seen daily after its arrival by many employees who observed its behavior, photographed it, and made sketches of it. From May 30 to June 1, the loon appeared to be debilitated; it was seen rolling in the water and had difficulty moving through the floating vegetation on the pond. After June 1, the loon was no longer seen and a subsequent search on June 4 located the loon floating dead along an edge of the pond.

During the 46 days the loon was observed at Patuxent, it was never seen in the air after its arrival except for short flights along the water's surface. It was observed diving on numerous occasions and was successful in catching fish which appeared to be largemouth bass (Micropterus salmoides). Snowden Pond is not open to sport fishing and has a fairly large population of bass and sunfish (Centrarchidae). During a one and one-half hour period in the third week of May, the loon caught a minimum of two fish of an average length of 25 cm. It usually took sevento-ten minutes for the loon to swallow the fish. Several observations were made of the loon apparently having difficulty swallowing fish it had caught.

Post-mortem examination of the loon by Patuxent's veterinarian, Glenn Olsen, revealed extreme emaciation and a severe fungal infection throughout its air sacs. Multiple nodules or plaques were found on the surface of the air sacs, especially the caudal thoracic and abdominal air sacs. Histopathology revealed typical granulomatous type lesions with sporulating fungal colonies including characteristic conidiophores.

Samples of the fungus were collected, cultured, and subsequently identified as Aspergillus fumigatus. Small fungal colonies were found on the surface of the lungs, but interior lung passages were not colonized by fungus. All other organs appeared normal. Stomach contents consisted of gravel and numerous parts of 17-year cicadas (Magicicada spp.). The cicadas were commonly seen on the water surface and apparently provided the loon with some nutrition after it was too weak to dive.

Aspergillosis is a common avian mycosis. The causative organism is ubiquitous in the environment with the fungus becoming pathogenic usually under adverse conditions. Previous problems of malnutrition, unhygienic environmental conditions, stress, oil contamination, or immunosuppression (possibly from chemical exposure) can lead to chronic aspergillosis.

Stewart et al. (1952) stated that the Common Loon was an uncommon spring transient at Patuxent. Earliest arrival was April 4 and latest departure was May 15. A maximum of 47 birds was counted at Patuxent on April 25, 1944. The recent sighting is noteworthy because loons have not been seen on the Patuxent impoundments in recent years and because of the bird's eventual death.

SCARLET TANAGER GIVES SUMMER TANAGER CALL

On May 2, 1987 while participating in the annual May Bird Count near Boxiron in Worcester County, Maryland I encountered a male Scarlet Tanager (Piranga olivacea) giving calls of both that species and the Summer Tanager (P. rubra). I was originally attracted to the bird by what sounded like the song of a Summer Tanager. By spishing and giving a whistled call of the Eastern Screech-Owl (Otus asio) I induced a pair of Scarlet Tanagers to approach closely. Both were giving typical Scarlet Tanager calls. Though the tanager doing the singing had stopped, I could still hear calls of both species of tanagers from deeper in the woods. By persistent imitation of the owl call I was eventually able to attract another male Scarlet Tanager in breeding plumage. It perched about 75-100 feet away in full view and I was able to watch it as it called. This single bird alternated the calls of the two species: "picky-tuck, chip-burr, picky-tuck, chip burr" with a slight pause between each call. Not hearing the Summer Tanager's song again I presumed that this bird had been the singer.

Both Scarlet and Summer Tanagers are fairly common summer residents in woods throughout Worcester County and are frequently found in close proximity to one another.

In the ornithological literature I was unable to find any reference to a Scarlet Tanager giving calls of the Summer Tanager.

STATEWIDE BIRD COUNT, MAY 2, 1987

On the 40th Annual State-wide Bird Count 454 observers in 211 parties walked 828 miles and drove 5249 miles in a total 1480 hours. All Maryland counties and the District of Columbia sent in reports with a total of 191,289 individuals of 242

species. The stated purpose of the May Count, to provide each and every member the opportunity to enjoy a day of birding during the height of migration in a cooperative effort to learn more about Maryland birds, was only partially fulfilled. A minor front crossed the northern half of the state and spread rain showers from the west in the morning to the upper Bay by mid-afternoon. The lower Bay had good weather all day, but the pelagic trip reportedly suffered from dense fog. About once every seven years on the first Saturday in May the warbler migration has reached Garrett County ... but not this year. Overall it was a fair day, much better than the sustained cool wind of the previous year.

Two species never before reported on a May Count are included in the table. A Sandhill Crane was seen and heard by Ed DeMoll and Carol Pickett in Little Bennett Park, Montgomery County. Ed Boyd and I observed and photographed a near-breeding-plumage Eared Grebe at North Beach, Calvert County. Although these are included in the table, both of these need further review by the MOS Records Committee. Also subject to review is the Piping Plover that Ed Boyd and I found at Cove Point, Calvert County; this species is rare along the Bay in any season and this sighting may be the first county record. The Orange-crowned Warbler and one of the Lincoln's Sparrows were banded by Margaret Donnald at Adventure Sanctuary; the other Lincoln's Sparrow was banded by Gladys Cole at Towson. White-rumped Sandpipers were documented by Pete Webb et al. on Hart – Miller Island, and the Black-necked Stilts were seen by Harry Armistead at Blackwater where he found them for the first time on a May Count 19 years ago.

Details on unusual birds were received in better numbers than in previous years. Wrens got special attention: all of the accepted Winter Wrens and Sedge Wrens had sufficient details. The only American Tree Sparrow reported had good enough details to change it to Field Sparrow.

Unlike the past several summaries I include no charts or graphs of the data, but will hold off for a more complete article. During the past few months a hard look has revealed new insights. As George Robbins wrote in 1969: "Any attempt to study population trends over the years through this State-wide Count must be undertaken with caution, bearing in mind that coverage is not strictly standardized from year to year, and that counts are also affected by weather conditions. In general, the best year-to-year comparisons can be made with permanent resident species, or at least those which are not at the peak of their migration period."

Once again I must thank the individual County Compilers who share the burden in producing this report. This year I would like to offer a special "Thank you" to Fran Pope for organizing the Garrett County Count, Dave Czaplak for bringing the District of Columbia into the fold, Harry Armistead for unflagging support in Dorchester County, and the members of the Southern Maryland Audubon Society for their aid in the lower Western Shore counties.

THE SEASON

Winter Season—December 1, 1986—February 28, 1987 ROBERT F. RINGLER

This winter was mild and dry for the early portion, producing good birding conditions for most Christmas Bird Counts. Though there were some severe snowstorms during the remainder of the season, water remained open in most Coastal Plain areas.

Mid-winter bird counts were done in two counties this year: Howard and Allegany. Results from these counts show interesting differences from the CBCs in those areas. In particular the semi-hardy lingerers tend to be gone in midwinter.

The most notable event of the season was the arrival of small numbers of Common Redpolls throughout the state, most from late January into February. Most were single birds or in small groups and most were seen only one day, though some lingered at feeders for a few days.

Some data from the CBCs are mentioned here, but most are left to the appropriate issue of American Birds.

Loons, Grebes. The only Red-throated Loons reported were 1 at Chesapeake Beach on Dec. 26 (Ringler, Stasz) and on the 27th (Kraus) and 1 at Ocean City on Feb. 28 (Wilson). Common Loons are quite scarce in mid-winter away from the ocean and post-CBC reports this year were 1 at Rocky Gap on Jan. 4 (Twigg), 1 at Point Lookout on Feb. 6 (Wilson), 1 at Loch Raven on Feb. 11 (Simon), 1 flying north off Love Point on Feb. 27 (Grubers) and 1 at Ocean City on Feb. 28 (Wilson). January reports of Pied-billed Grebes included 1 at Piney Run through the 13th (Wright +), 1 on the Potomac at Oldtown through the 14th (Paulus) and 20 on Loch Raven on the 14th (Simon). Even rarer in mid-winter are Red-necked Grebes but Simon found 3 at Loch Raven on Jan. 1 with 1 remaining on the 3rd. Another Red-necked at

PNAS on Feb. 15 (Bryan) was probably a spring migrant.

Gannets, Pelican, Cormorants. There were some very surprising CBC reports of Northern Gannets. On the Crisfield count Wierenga and Ringler saw 1 on the Big Annemessex River and 8 in Pocomoke Sound on Dec. 30, and 2 were seen west of Kent Island on Jan. 4 on the Annapolis CBC (Blom +). More normal were the 200 gannets off Ocean City on the Feb. 14 pelagic trip (Wierenga +). One of the big surprises of the season was the Brown Pelican at Conowingo on Dec. 20-22 (Dale Aulthouse and Robert Fraunfelter) whose photo appears in American Birds (Vol. 41, No. 2, p. 264). Great Cormorants on CBCs were 4 for Ocean City on Dec. 29 and 18 for Point Lookout on Jan. 4. Double-crested Cormorants were among the birds that do not normally winter here but that took advantage of the open water this year. There were 6 at Brandon Shores on Dec. 1 (Ringler). This is a favorite roosting site for cormorants and 1 immature remained there on Dec. 28 (Hammer +). Another Double-crest was seen on the Port Tobacco CBC on Dec. 20, an immature was at Chesapeake Beach on Dec. 26 (Ringler, Stasz), 1 at Hart - Miller on Dec. 28 (Stasz +) and 1 on the Point Lookout CBC on Jan. 4. Wilson estimated 75 cormorants on Cob Point Bar Light, St. Marys County on Feb. 6 but was unable to determine the species.

Herons. Late in Garrett County was a Great Blue Heron at Oakland on Dec. 22 (Thayer); 4 at Seneca on Feb. 1 (John Bjerke) were notable in the Piedmont. Best heron reports of the season were a Great Egret at Upper Marlboro on Jan. 6 (Stasz, Kearns) and another flying over Salisbury on Jan. 14 (M. O'Brien), 2 immature Little Blue Herons with 63 Tricolored Herons at Deal Island WMA on Dec. 26 (J. & M. O'Brien), and a Cattle Egret on the Ocean City CBC on Dec. 29. Wintering Blackcrowned Night-Herons included 22 at Conowingo on Dec. 27 (Kirkwood +) and 32 in Baltimore City on Dec. 28 (Ringler +).

Swans, Geese. Late migrating Tundra Swans were 44 flying over Howard County on Dec. 6 (Solems, Farrell) and 70 flying east over Lander in Frederick County on Dec. 13 (Warfield). Winter Tundra Swans feeding locally included 1800 at Wye Mills on Dec. 26 (Reese) and 4000 at Chestertown on Feb. 11 increasing to 8000 on Feb. 28, probably augmented by spring migrants (Grubers). Other spring migrants included 51 at Cove Point on Feb. 21 (Stasz). A Mute Swan and 6 Snow Geese on Greenbelt Lake on Dec. 3 (M. Livingston) were out of place. An adult and an immature Greater White-fronted Geese remained at Gaithersburg at least through Feb. 22 (Davidson) and 1 was seen at Jug Bay on Feb. 8 (Ann Stone). Other interesting reports of Snow Geese were an adult blue in northern Harford County on Dec. 7 (Ringler, Ricciardi), 10,000 flying over Centreville on Dec. 21 (Ringler), 2 adult whites and an adult blue flying over Rose Haven on Dec. 26 (Ringler, Stasz), an immature in Howard County on Jan. 1 (Wallace), 5000 at Berlin on Jan. 14 (M. O'Brien), 1 blue at Green Manor Turf Farm in Howard County near Sykesville on Jan. 17 (Ludwig) and 6 at Loch Raven on Feb. 8 (Simon, Kye Jenkins). Quite unusual were 5 Brant on the Salisbury CBC on Jan. 4. Winter flocks of Canada Geese included 8000 near Galena on Dec. 26 (Reese) and 1250 on Loch Raven on Jan. 14 (Simon); 2000 flying north over Chestertown on Feb. 22 (Grubers) were migrants.

Dabbling Ducks. Lingering Wood Ducks were 1 at Loch Raven on Dec. 20 (Kaestner +), 1 near Oldtown on Dec. 27 (Paulus), 4 in DC on Jan. 1 (Czaplak), a female at Gaithersburg on Jan. 6 (Bonham), 1 on Lake Whetstone, Montgomery Village on Jan. 6 (Theresa Krueger), a drake in Howard County on Feb. 10-22

(Wallace) and 2, perhaps early spring migrants, at Remington Farms on Feb. 22 (Grubers). At Jug Bay the 500 Green-winged Teal on Dec. 5 had been reduced to 20 on Jan. 16 (Mumford +) while 200 remained at Blackwater on Dec. 31 (Wilson). Stasz found 11 Green-wings at Cove Point on Jan. 3, none there on Feb. 1 and 16 on Feb. 21 when ducks begin returning to ponds that have been frozen during the middle of the winter. Unusual inland Green-wings included 1 at Thurmont and 9 at Piney Run on Jan. 15 (Ringler) and 1 on Lake Elkhorn in Columbia on Jan. 27 (Orgain). High counts of American Black Ducks were 1000 at Jug Bay on Feb. 6 (Ricciardi, Beaton), 250 at Piney Run on Jan. 1 (Ringler) and 252 on Loch Raven on Jan. 1 (Simon). Highs for Mallards were 400 at Piney Run on Jan. 1 (Ringler), 287 at Loch Raven on Jan. 6 (Simon) and 300 at Jug Bay on Feb. 6 (Ricciardi, Beaton). Interesting reports of Northern Pintail were 10 at Jug Bay on Dec. 27 and Jan. 16, and 12 on Feb. 6 and Feb. 22 (Mumford +), 2 at Loch Raven on Dec. 29 (Simon), 400 at Cove Point on Jan. 3 and 50 on Feb. 21 after the thaw (Stasz), 4 at Piney Run through Jan. 13 (Wright +), 400 flying south at Assateague on Jan. 24 (Klockner, Wierenga), 9 at PNAS on Feb. 15 (Bryan) and 5 at Triadelphia on Feb. 21 (Ludwig); the late February birds were probably spring migrants. Quite rare this season was a female Blue-winged Teal at Sandy Point on Jan. 4 (Wierenga +). Locally high counts of Northern Shovelers were 115 at Hart - Miller on Dec. 28 (Stasz +), 25 at Piscataway on Jan. 11 (Nistico) and 8 at Druid Lake in Baltimore on Feb. 6 (Ringler). High counts of Gadwall were 77 at Hart - Miller on Dec. 28 (Stasz +), 10 at Jug Bay on Jan. 9 (Mumford, Ricciardi, Beaton) and 23 in Baltimore City on Jan. 11 (Ringler). A drake Eurasian Wigeon was at West Ocean City on Dec. 29 (George & Henry Armistead +) and 1 was at Edgewater in Anne Arundel County for about 2 weeks from Feb. 23 (Helen & John Ford +). American Wigeon flocks included 13 at Wye Mills on Dec. 26 (Reese) and 123 at Loch Raven on Jan. 3 (Simon).

Diving Ducks, Interesting reports of Canvasbacks were 9 in Columbia, with 1 on Lake Elkhorn and 8 on Wilde Lake on Dec. 7 (J. Solem, Farrell), 150 near Merkle WMA on Jan. 1 (Kearns), 1000 on Piscataway Creek on Jan. 11 (Nistico), 300 at Cove Point on Feb. 1 and 226 at North Beach on Feb. 3 (both Stasz) and 218 at West Ocean City on Feb. 28 (Wilson). There were few wintering Redheads with 1 at Georgetown Reservoir on Jan. 1 (Hilton), 5 at Gaithersburg on Jan. 3 (M. & P. O'Brien), 15 on Loch Raven on Jan. 6 (Simon), 4 in DC on Jan. 30 (Czaplak) and 1 on the Potomac at Hughes Hollow on Feb. 8 (David Mehlman). Ring-necked Ducks were more plentiful with 140 at Georgetown Reservoir on Dec. 14 (Czaplak), 51 at Gaithersburg on Dec. 25 (O'Briens) with 17 there on Feb. 22 (Davidson), 320 on Loch Raven on Dec. 29 (Simon), 27 on Centennial Lake at Columbia on Jan. 15 (McClures) and 170 at PNAS on Feb. 22 (Bryan). Some of the late February birds are likely northbound migrants. There were 3 Greater Scaup at Conowingo on Feb. 13 and 2 on Feb. 14 (Blom +). Flocks of Lesser Scaup included 316 at St. Marys City on Feb. 6 (Wilson), and 500 in Langford Bay and 1000 off Northwest Point on the Chester River on Feb. 11 (Grubers). Stasz saw a female King Eider at North Beach on Dec. 15. Notable reports of Oldsquaw were 500 at Calvert Cliffs on Feb. 1 (Stasz) and 90 at Point Lookout on Feb. 6 (Wilson). Most of the scoter reports came from St. Marys County with a Surf Scoter at PNAS on Jan. 5 and 11 (Bryan) and 7 Surf and 7 White-winged Scoters at Point Lookout on Feb. 6 (Wilson); Stasz counted 156 Surfs at Cove Point on Feb. 1. Also at PNAS were 192 Common Goldeneyes on Jan. 24 and 146 Buffleheads on Jan. 11 (Bryan). On the Potomac at Cumberland there were 3 Common Goldeneyes on Feb. 1 (Ringler) and 7 Buffleheads on Jan. 28 (Paulus). Stasz saw 180 goldeneyes and 150 Buffleheads at Cove Point on Feb. 1

Hooded Mergansers were well represented, with 51 at Piney Run on Dec. 24 (M. & J. O'Brien), 16 on Deep Creek Lake on Dec. 27 (Thayer), 47 on Loch Raven on Jan. 3 (Simon), 5 on the Youghiogheny River on Jan. 6 and 2 on Feb. 24 (Thayer), 6 in DC on Jan. 29 (Czaplak), 1 at Cove Point on Feb. 1 and 4 there on Feb. 21 (Stasz) and 1 on the Potomac at Cumberland, Jan. 28 through Feb. 12 (Twigg +). Simon found 45 Common Mergansers at Loch Raven on Jan. 1, and at Jug Bay there were 7 on Feb. 6 and 25 on Feb. 22 (Mumford, Ricciardi, Beaton); an early migrant was at Piney Run on Feb. 12 (Wilkinson). A single flock of Red-breasted Mergansers at Hart - Miller on Dec. 28, estimated at 925 birds (Stasz +), was a record count. Also notable were 18 at PNAS on Jan. 5 (Bryan), a female on the Youghiogheny River in a snow storm on Jan. 22 (Thayer) and 26 at Calvert Cliffs on Feb. 1 (Stasz). High local counts of Ruddy Ducks were 4000 at Brandon Shores on Dec. 1 (Ringler), 58 at Denton on Dec. 10 (Hewitt), 5500 at Hart - Miller on Dec. 28 (Stasz +), 5000 on Back River on Jan. 13 (Klockner), 1320 at Bushwood Wharf in St. Marys County on Feb. 6 (Wilson), 3000 on the Patuxent at the mouth of St. Leonard Creek on Feb. 7 (Stasz) and 126 at PNAS on Feb. 8 (Bryan).

Vultures, Ospreys. High counts of Black Vultures were 25 at Alpha Ridge Landfill near Marriottsville on Jan. 31 (Blom, Wierenga) and 15 together with 210 Turkey Vultures at Tanyard on Dec. 4 (Engle). With open water late into the season, Ospreys lingered in the state and 3 were found on the Ocean City CBC with 1 at Porter Creek (M. O'Brien), 1 at Ayers Creek (Davidson) and 1 in Ocean City (Jay Sheppard, Roger Clapp). Inland, single Ospreys were seen at Gaithersburg on Dec. 21 (Wayne Sieck) and Columbia on Jan. 3 (Sandy Goulsby).

Bald Eagles. Bald Eagles continue to proliferate at all seasons. This year's midwinter eagle count during the first two weeks of January tallied 6 adults and 8 immatures on the Lower Susquehanna, 24 adults and 13 immatures at Aberdeen Proving Ground, 13 adults and 16 immatures in the Blackwater area and 12 adults and 36 immatures in the Crisfield region (fide Jack Abbott). Other observations of Bald Eagles included a pair of adults over Rock Creek Park in DC on Dec. 6 (Czaplak), 10 at Conowingo on Dec. 7 (Ringler, Ricciardi), 1 immature over northeast DC on Dec. 20 (Czaplak), 2 at Loch Raven on Dec. 25-27 and Jan. 21 (Simon), an adult at West Friendship in Howard County on Jan. 23 (Anne & Ken Hart), 18 at Blackwater on Feb. 7 (Gregory Inskip) and 2 immatures at White Marsh in Baltimore County on Feb. 25 and 27 (Resch). In Prince Georges County the abundance of eagles was proven by an adult at Rocky Gorge on Dec. 27 (Davidson), 11 immatures on the mudflat at the mouth of Broad Creek near Fort Washington on Dec. 31 (Henry Bielstein) and 16 on the ice off the National Colonial Farm on Jan. 31 (David Mozurkewich).

Buteos, Golden Eagles, Falcons. Czaplak noted a pair of Red-shouldered Hawks on a nest at the National Zoo on Feb. 7 (Czaplak). On Feb. 13, Reese saw an adult Red-shoulder at St. Michaels, where the species is rare in winter. The last fall migrant Red-tailed Hawk was at Monument Knob on Dec. 7 (Sam Shoemaker). Reports of Rough-legged Hawks were 2 at Bestpitch on Dec. 8 and 1 there on Feb. 16 (Garland), 1 at Lilypons on Dec. 14 (M. Swick), a light-phase bird near Crumpton, Queen Annes County on Dec. 26 (Reese), 1 along I-270 between Routes 85 and 80 in Frederick County on Jan. 4 (Paul Fritz) and 1 on the C&O Canal near Oldtown on Jan. 13 (Paulus). Reports of Golden Eagles outside of CBCs were an immature at Great Oaks in Kent County on Jan. 26 (Floyd Parks) and 3 at Blackwater on Feb. 7 (Gregory Inskip). Single Merlins were noted throughout the season at Concord, Caroline County (C. Scudder), 1 near Denton on Dec. 20 (Droege +), 1 on

Assateague on Jan. 24 and Feb. 8 (Klockner, Wierenga) and 1 at PWRC, Feb. 17 through March 10 (Klimkiewicz). Paul Mocko was surprised by seeing a Peregrine Falcon perched on a goal post at RFK Stadium in Washington during a Redskins game on Dec. 28. Another Peregrine was seen at Tanyard on Feb. 14 (Wilbur Engle).

Partridges, Grouse, Turkeys. The Chukar seen by Glenda Weber near Parkville in Baltimore County on Dec. 23 probably had escaped from a local game farm. A first for Harford County was a flock of 6 Ruffed Grouse seen by Larry Fry along the Susquehanna River on the Rock Run CBC on Dec. 27. Paul Fritz saw 6 Wild Turkeys near Pennyfield on Jan. 9 and 38 were recorded on the Allegany County mid-winter count on Jan. 31.

Rails. Clapper Rails on CBCs were 2 for Ocean City on Dec. 29 and 2 for Point Lookout on Jan. 4. Single King Rails on CBCs were heard in Fishing Creek Marsh for the Jug Bay count on Dec. 26 (Droege, Stasz, Ringler) and seen on Assateague for the Ocean City count on Dec. 29 (Blom, Julie Simpson). On the Denton CBC 2 Virginia Rails were heard along the Tuckahoe River on Dec. 20 (Don Meritt, Steve Ford) and for Jug Bay 11 Virginias and 8 Soras were heard in Fishing Creek Marsh on Dec. 26 (Droege, Stasz, Ringler).

Gallinules, Coots, Crane. Wintering Common Moorhens were 1 at Point Lookout on Jan. 6 (Howard Youth) and 1 at Big Mill Pond in Worcester County on Jan. 29 (Doug & Chandra Bruce). Early winter counts of American Coots were 127 on Deep Creek Lake on Dec. 12 (Skipper), 400 on Loch Raven on Dec. 20 (Simon) and 71 at Piney Run on Jan. 1 (Ringler). Roland Limpert reported seeing a Sandhill Crane on Kent Island about Feb. 18.

Shorebirds. Rare on a CBC were 2 Semipalmated Plovers in Crisfield harbor on Dec. 30 (Ringler, Wierenga). The high mid-winter report of Killdeer was 200 at Jug Bay on Jan. 16 (Mumford, Beaton). There were 28 American Oystercatchers seen on the Ocean City CBC on Dec. 29, and later in the winter 12 at Ocean City on Jan. 25 (Klockner) and 17 on Feb. 28 (Wilson). Wintering Greater Yellowlegs were 1 at Fort McHenry seen on Jan. 11 (Ringler) through Feb. 16 (Wilkinson), 2 at Blackwater and 1 at Assateague on Jan. 14 (M. O'Brien) and 1 at Tanyard on Feb. 9-10 (Engle). A Red Knot was seen on Assateague for the Ocean City CBC on Dec. 29 (Blom). Unfortunately unidentified were the 2 dowitchers seen on the Crisfield CBC on Dec. 30. Interesting reports of Common Snipe were 1 at Rising Sun on Dec. 7 (Fogleman), 27 at Tanyard on Dec. 27 (Reese, Terry Allen), 75 at Jug Bay on Jan. 3 (Mumford +), 2 at Conowingo on Jan. 3 (Blom), 1 near Town Creek in Allegany County on Jan. 31 (Paulus), 3 in Howard County on Feb. 6 (Solem, Farrell) and 1 at Oldtown on Feb. 20 (Paulus), the latter perhaps a spring migrant. Reports of American Woodcock were 1 displaying at St. Michaels through Jan. 7 (Reese), 1 at Patuxent River Park on Jan. 9 (Kearns), 1 near Cresaptown in Allegany County on Jan. 31 (Ringler), 1 at Cypressmede in Howard County on Feb. 11 (Michele Wright), 1 calling in St. Marys County on Feb. 13 (Droege), 1 in DC on Feb. 15 (Czaplak), 1 in southern Prince Georges County on Feb. 15 and 1 on Nassawango Creek in Worcester County on Feb. 16 (both by Droege) and 2 at Flag Ponds Park in Calvert County on Feb. 21 (Stasz). Woodcock in mid or late February probably represent spring migrants.

Gulls. Reports of lingering Laughing Gulls included 36 at Brandon Shores and 10 in Curtis Creek on Dec. 1 (Ringler), 3 at the Naval Research Lab in DC on Dec. 19

(Czaplak), 1 at Jug Bay on Dec. 19 (Ricciardi, Beaton), 1 at Sandy Point on Dec. 21 (Klockner), 6 at Chesapeake Beach on Dec. 26 (Ringler, Stasz), 4 at the Bowie landfill on Dec. 28 (Woody Martin) and 15 at Upper Marlboro on Jan. 2, where the last 1 was seen on Jan. 13 (Stasz). Up to 5 Little Gulls were seen at Ocean City on Feb. 7-8 with 3 adults and 2 immatures (Ben Yokel.+). The only report of Common Black-headed Gull was 1 at Back River on Feb. 14 (Kaestner +). Interesting reports of Bonaparte's Gulls were 1 in DC on Dec. 11 (Czaplak), 1 immature at Denton on Dec. 20 (Droege), 1 at Lake Elkhorn on Jan. 24 (Orgain +), 400 at Calvert Cliffs on Jan. 24 (Droege), 300 flying south at Assateague on Jan. 24 (Klockner, Wierenga) and 1 in Montgomery County at Triadelphia on Feb. 21 (Ludwig).

High local counts of Ring-billed Gulls were 1200 at Piney Run on Dec. 6 (Ringler +), 300 at the Frederick landfill on Jan. 15 (Ringler), 101 at Cumberland on Jan. 20 (Twigg), 7000 at Conowingo on Jan. 23 (Blom), 1500 on Druid Lake in Baltimore on Feb. 6 (Ringler), 97 on the Potomac at Oldtown on Feb. 8 (Paulus), 2500 near Easton on Feb. 9 and 4000 on Feb. 19 (Reese), 206 on Loch Raven on Feb. 11 (Simon) and 160 at North Branch on Feb. 14 (Kiddy). Highs for Herring Gulls were 800 at Piney Run on Dec. 6 (Ringler +), 80 on Loch Raven on Dec. 25 (Simon), 500 at the Frederick landfill on Jan. 15 (Ringler), 20,000 at Conowingo on Feb. 13 (Blom) and 2000 in DC on Feb. 14 (Czaplak); 1 flying down the Potomac near Oldtown on Dec. 27 (Paulus) was rare for Allegany County. The only report of Thayer's Gull was 1 immature at Upper Marlboro on Jan. 14 (Stasz). A second-winter Iceland Gull was seen at Bowie on the Dec. 28 CBC and again on Feb. 14 (Woody Martin). Other reports of Iceland Gulls were a first-winter bird at Upper Marlboro on Jan. 5 (Stasz), 2 first-winter birds at Conowingo on Feb. 14 and single first-winter and adult birds there on Feb. 21 and 25 (Blom, Garland +) and a first-winter bird at the Tidal Basin in DC on Feb. 28 (Czaplak).

Lesser Black-backed Gulls have become so widely and frequently reported that it almost is unnecessary to enumerate them all; however, I believe it is still worthwhile. One on the Denton CBC at the mouth of the Tuckahoe River on Dec. 20 (Steve Goodbred, Jr. & Sr.) was the first for Caroline County. An adult was at Eastern Neck on Dec. 21 (Floyd Parks +) for the Lower Kent CBC. An adult at Hains Point on Dec. 25 (Hilton) was a familiar returnee. An adult at Chesapeake Beach on Dec. 26 (Ringler, Stasz) was new for the Jug Bay CBC and 2 were seen there through Jan. 25 (Kraus). There were 3 Lessers for the Triadelphia CBC on Dec. 27. Another familiar bird was the 1 near Berlin on Dec. 27 (Paul Lehman, Shawneen Finnegan). At Conowingo Blom and others reported 1 adult on Dec. 27 and 2 on Jan. 8, Jan. 10, and Feb. 14; a third-winter bird on Jan. 17, Jan. 23 and Feb. 21; a second-winter bird on Jan. 17 and Feb. 12; and a first-winter bird on Jan. 17 and 23. There were 2 adult Lessers at Fort McHenry on Dec. 28, and at least 1 there throughout the season (Ringler +). A first-winter Lesser was seen on the Annapolis CBC on Jan. 4 over Chesapeake Bay south of the Bay Bridge (Blom +). A third-winter bird was at the Frederick landfill on Jan. 15 (Ringler), an adult at the Alpha Ridge landfill in Howard County on Jan. 31 (Blom, Wierenga), a thirdwinter bird at Upper Marlboro on Feb. 2 (Stasz), a fourth-winter bird at Blackwalnut Point on Feb. 8 (Davidson) and 3 adults and a first-winter bird at the Tidal Basin on Feb. 14 (Czaplak).

Single first-winter Glaucous Gulls were at the Alpha Ridge landfill in Howard County and the Frederick landfill on Jan. 15 (Rngler), at Chesapeake Beach on Jan. 24-25 (Kraus) and at Upper Marlboro on Jan. 28 (Stasz). Inland were 8 Great Black-

backed Gulls at Piney Run on Jan. 1, and 13 at the Frederick landfill on Jan. 15 (Ringler). Upriver, Great Black-backs numbered 225 at Conowingo on Jan. 17 (Blom +) and 255 at DC on Feb. 19 (Czaplak). A very poor count of only 20 Black-legged Kittiwakes was found off Ocean City on the Feb. 14 pelagic trip (Wierenga +).

Terns, Alcids. In Calvert County Stasz noted the last Royal Tern at North Beach on Dec. 5, the last Common Tern at Chesapeake Beach on Dec. 10 (extremely late for this species) and the last Forster's Tern at North Beach on Dec. 14. Also seen on the Feb. 14 pelagic trip were 2 Dovekies and 6 Atlantic Puffins (Wierenga +).

Doves, Owls. Paulus counted 217 Mourning Doves in one flock along the C&O Canal near Oldtown on Dec. 27. The only Common Barn-Owl reported was seen at the National Zoo on Feb. 21 (Czaplak). A Snowy Owl was seen on Assateague by park personnel shortly before the Ocean City CBC and another was photographed by Keith Harvey at Hillsmere Shores near Annapolis in early January. CBC reports of Long-eared Owls were 6 for Triadelphia, found near Laytonsville, on Dec. 27, 2 for Ocean City on Dec. 29, and 2 for Point Lookout on Jan. 4 (M. O'Brien). Other Long-ears were 1 at Rising Sun on Dec. 29 (Fogleman), 1 at Back River on Feb. 7 (Resch) and Feb. 14 (Kaestner +) and 2 at the National Arboretum from Feb. 16 through March 1 (Czaplak). Reports of Short-eared Owls outside of CBCs were 1 at Rising Sun, Dec. 20 through Jan. 4 (Fogleman +), and 1 in Baltimore on Feb. 16 (Wilkinson). Wintering Northern Saw-whet Owls were 1 at Back River on Dec. 26 (Resch), 1 on the Triadelphia CBC on Dec. 27, 1 on Assateague on Dec. 29 with 2 there on Feb. 8 and 1 through the end of the season (Wierenga +), 1 found dead near Madonna in Harford County on Jan. 4 by Robert Van Trigt, 1 at Hughes Hollow from Jan. 8 through Feb. 26 (Garland +) and 2 there on Feb. 14 (Janet Anderson) and 1 at the National Arboretum, Feb. 16 through March 6 (Czaplak).

Flycatchers, Larks, Swallows. Ray Kiddy found 1 Eastern Phoebe on the C&O Canal at North Branch on Dec. 13 and 2 on the canal between Spring Gap and Oldtown on Dec. 20. Another phoebe was at Jug Bay, Dec. 27 through Jan. 16 (Mumford, Beaton). The high phoebe count for CBCs was 16 for Ocean City on Dec. 29. Other phoebes were 1 at Oldtown on Jan. 2 (Paulus) and 1 in Howard County on Feb. 6 (Solem, Marcia Krishnamoorthy). The largest flocks of Horned Larks noted were 400 in southern Frederick County on Jan. 12 (M. O'Brien) and 200 at Hereford on Jan. 31 (Kaestner). A Tree Swallow at Nolands Ferry on Dec. 7 (Warfield) was a late migrant, but 150 on the Crisfield CBC on Dec. 30 were probably attempting to winter; 1 at Assateague on Feb. 8 (Klockner, Wierenga) is more difficult to place.

Crows, Nuthatches, Wrens. Michael O'Brien estimated 25,000 American Crows and 400 Fish Crows on Jan. 8 at Rockville. Reese estimated 1000 unidentified crows near Galena on Dec. 26. A Common Raven at the Frederick landfill on Dec. 27 (Keith Van Ness) was out-of-place, but 1 on Sideling Hill on Jan. 28 (Wilkinson) was more likely. Wilson found 3 Brown-headed Nuthatches at St. George Island in St. Marys County on Feb. 6. Dan Audet discovered a House Wren at Triadelphia on Dec. 29 for the CBC. On the Jug Bay CBC of Dec. 26 there were 11 Marsh Wrens counted in Fishing Creek Marsh (Droege, Stasz, Ringler) and on the Elkton CBC there were 4 (Charles Gant, David Shock).

Gnatcatchers, Thrushes. Single Blue-gray Gnatcatchers were found on the Jug Bay CBC on Dec. 26 (Fred Fallon), on the Baltimore Harbor CBC at Back River on Dec.

28 (Resch); and at Conowingo the bird previously reported in the fall remained through Jan. 17 (Blom +). Reese counted 67 Eastern Bluebirds near St. Michaels on Feb. 21. A mixture of meandering winter flocks and possible early spring migrants of American Robins were 30 at Mountain Lock in Washington County on Feb. 1 (Ringler), 60 at Thompson Corner in St. Marys County on Feb. 6 (Wilson), 25 in Chestertown on Feb. 6 (Grubers), 30 at Cove Point on Feb. 7 (Claire Johnston), 2 south of Ocean City on Feb. 15 (John Bjerke) and 55 in DC on Feb. 16 (Czaplak). One of only a handful of records for Maryland was a well-described Varied Thrush at a feeder in Bethesda on Feb. 1 (Elizabeth & Henry Allen, John Pond).

Mimids, Pipits, Waxwings. Rare for mid-winter, a Gray Cathird was at St. Michaels on Jan. 15 (Reese). Stasz found a Brown Thrasher at Cove Point on Feb. 1. Wintering reports of Water Pipits were very few but included 24 in Carroll County at Liberty Reservoir on Dec. 3 (Wright), 3 at Cove Point on Feb. 1 (Stasz) and 1 at Sandy Point on Feb. 1 (Laura Gaudette). Stasz estimated 230 Cedar Waxwings at Upper Marlboro on Jan. 9 and 135 at Cove Point on Feb. 1.

Shrikes, Vireo. Bob Folker saw an immature Northern Shrike on Kent Island on Jan. 6. A Loggerhead Shrike was found on the Denton CBC on Dec. 20 (Fred Fallon, J.E. Arnold) and 1 was at Lilypons at least from Dec. 6 (Osenton) through Jan. 20 (Wright). A surprise for the Port Tobacco CBC was a Solitary Vireo near LaPlata on Dec. 20 (Dan Audet, Paul Jung).

Warblers. The only Orange-crowned Warblers of the season were 1 found on the Ocean City CBC by Bob Whitcomb and 1 at Flag Ponds, Calvert County on Jan. 3 (Stasz). The 4 Cape May Warblers seen on CBCs on Dec. 20 was a shocking coincidence as Czaplak found 3 in DC and Roberta Fletcher found another at Denton. Only 3 Yellow-rumped Warblers were found on the Allegany County mid-winter count, showing that this semi-hardy species retreats from that part of the state for the winter. Farther east Wilson saw 15 Yellow-rumps at Hughes Hollow on Feb. 2 Czaplak also found a Pine Warbler at Hains Point for the DC CBC. Interesting reports of Common Yellowthroats were a male in Swan Creek, Harford County on the Rock Run CBC (Kirkwood, Ringler) and 1 at Jug Bay on Jan. 9 (Mumford, Ricciardi, Beaton). Occasionally seen during December in Maryland, a Wilson's Warbler was found by Paul DuMont on the 21st at Hughes Hollow on the Seneca CBC.

Sparrows. American Tree Sparrows on the Eastern Shore and the southern part of the Western Shore are becoming quite rare. This winter there were 3 at Cove Point on Jan. 3 (Stasz), 2 at Jug Bay on Jan. 9 and Feb. 6 (Mumford, Ricciardi, Beaton), 2 at Indian Head on Jan. 27 (Polly Hancock), 1 at Denton on Jan. 28 (R. Fletcher, Nuttle), several at Point Lookout on Feb. 2 (George Jett), 12 at Fenwick in Charles County on Feb. 15 (Nistico) and 1 at Federalsburg on Feb. 23 (Glime). Wintering Chipping Sparrows included 1 at the National Zoo on Jan. 25 (Czaplak) and 1 at Remington Farms on Feb. 15 (Grubers). A Vesper Sparrow at Rockville on Jan. 1 (M. O'Brien) was a rarity for that date. An adult Lark Sparrow remained at a feeder near Crownsville from Jan. 30 through March 5 (Marty Barron +). Wilkinson found 1 Savannah Sparrow wintering in southern Frederick County on Jan. 24. Rare in mid-winter were 2 Sharp-tailed Sparrows at Cornfield Harbor on Jan. 4 (John Hupp, Theresa Duffey). Michael O'Brien estimated 200 Song Sparrows and 100 Swamp Sparrows at Lilypons and 75 White-crowned Sparrows in surrounding southern Frederick County on Jan. 12. There were 3 immature White-crowned

Sparrows at a feeder near Pocomoke City from December through the end of the period (Doug & Chandra Bruce).

Longspurs, Snow Buntings. The high count for Lapland Longspurs in southern Frederick County was 25 on Jan. 12 (M. O'Brien) and 2 were still present on Feb. 23 (Garland). A single Lapland Longspur was in the Bradenbaugh area of Harford County on Jan. 24-31 (Kirkwood +) and 2 were at Hereford on Jan. 31 (Kaestner +). Wright found 3 Snow Buntings at Liberty Reservoir in Carroll County on Dec. 12 and 5 on Dec. 19. Another 3 Snow Buntings were reported on the Catoctin CBC on Dec. 21, 65 were on Assateague on Dec. 27 (Paul Lehman, Shawneen Finnegan), 9 in southern Frederick County on Dec. 28 (Warfield), 7 there on Jan. 24 (Wilkinson +) and Feb. 1 (John Bjerke) and 1 remaining on Feb. 23 (Garland), 135 at Hart – Miller on Dec. 28 (Stasz +), 26 on Assateague on Jan. 14 (M. O'Brien), 1 at Bradenbaugh on Jan. 27-28 (Kirkwood +) and 1 at Hereford on Jan. 31 (Kaestner +).

Blackbirds. A female Yellow-headed Blackbird was at Rising Sun on Dec. 28 (Fogleman). The few reports of Rusty Blackbirds included 10 at Jug Bay on Jan. 16 (Mumford, Beaton), 25 near Oldtown on Jan. 17 (Paulus), 3 at Cove Point on Feb. 1 (Stasz) and 6 at Back River on Feb. 14 (Kaestner). Czaplak estimated 200 Brown-headed Cowbirds in DC on Feb. 13.

Redpolls. There was nearly a score of reports of Common Redpolls, with most scattered from late January through February. Most were of very small numbers and only a few reached the Eastern Shore. In Anne Arundel County there was a female seen at Sandy Point on Dec. 6 (David Mozurkewich), 1 at a feeder on Gibson Island for about a week through Jan. 4 (Mr. & Mrs. Benjamin Cadwalader) and 1 at a feeder in Annapolis on Feb. 21 (Harold Wierenga). In Harford County 1 was at a feeder in Churchville on Jan. 19 (Spike Updegrove +) and 3 at a feeder in Darlington on Feb. 26-27 (June Vaughn +). One was at a feeder in Laurel Grove, St. Marys County on Jan. 26-31 (Runkles). In Allegany County there were 2 at a feeder in Cumberland on Jan. 28, 3 on Feb. 10 and 1 through Feb. 24 (Kiddy), and 2 more at another feeder near Cumberland on Feb. 12 (Simons). In Carroll County there were 2 at a feeder in Woodbine on Jan. 31 (Sharleen Sterner), a male at Eldersburg on Jan. 31 (John Hattrup), 1 at a feeder near Sykesville on Feb. 1 (Dave Harvey) and a male at a feeder near Winfield on Feb. 7 (John Corey). Peter Osenton saw a flock of about 40 redpolls near Ellicott City on Jan. 31 and 1 other was seen in Howard County on Feb. 27 (Frances Ehlers). In Prince Georges County 1 was banded at PWRC on Feb. 1 (Klimkiewicz). In Talbot County 1 was at a feeder in Bozman on Feb. 10 (Esther Burns). In Baltimore, 5 were at the feeder of John & Peg Barber on Feb. 13-24 and they banded 2 of them. In Caroline County 4 were at a feeder in Concord on Feb. 14-25 (C. Scudder). In Worcester County 1 was in Ocean City on Feb. 14 (Klockner).

Other Finches. Few flocks of Purple Finches were noted, but 50 were at Glenn Dale on Feb. 9 (Bob Davis) and 25 at Chestertown on Feb. 23 (Grubers). The only crossbill report was of a single White-winged Crossbill at a feeder in Denton on Feb. 19-21 (Ruth Jones). Pine Siskins were common throughout the winter, including more than 1000 banded at PWRC during the course of the season (Klimkiewicz). Flocks that were reported included 25 at Golden Hill, Dorchester County on Dec. 26 (O'Briens), 25 at a feeder in Timonium on Jan. 6 (Kaestner), 30 at a feeder in Howard County on Jan. 12 (Frances Ehlers), 50-60 at a feeder on Bray Hill, Garrett County on Jan. 16 (Skipper), 40 near Pocomoke City on Jan. 22 (Doug

& Chandra Bruce), 135 on the Allegany County mid-winter bird count on Jan. 31, 40 at Bethesda during the period preceding Feb. 2 (David Horne) and 45 at a feeder in Laurel on Feb. 9 (Wierenga). Stasz saw about 150 American Goldfinches at Flag Ponds, Calvert County on Feb. 21. Evening Grosbeaks were rather scarce, even in western Maryland where only 94 were recorded on the Allegany County count on Jan. 31. On the Eastern Shore there were 4 at a feeder in Denton on Jan. 2 (C.T. Fletcher) and 15 at Chestertown on Feb. 23 (Grubers).

BOOK REVIEW

A BIRDWATCHER'S COOKBOOK

Erma J. Fisk. 1987. W. W. Norton & Co., New York. Black and white line drawings, index, 272 pp. \$15.95.

I'm not sure this book is of value to either birdwatchers or cooks, but it does give the impression it was fun to write. This collection of recipes is tied together only by a rambling commentary and the improbable assumption that all birdwatchers will find them appealing. The author, who has two other books in print, has combined her long cooking career with her birdwatching, and has clearly enjoyed the mix.

She starts with a "Warning" section that is seven parts long, but most of it concerns the difficulty of planning meals for birdwatchers, who may jump up and dash out at the ring of a phone. The "Introduction" covers much of the same ground. Her most entertaining advice concerns when to serve these offerings: lunchtime on Christmas Count day; breakfast at Dorothy Mendinhall's banding station; or after searching for parrots in Belize. She has added notes about a few of her favorite birdwatchers; those who have sampled her impromptu feasts after a hard day in the field. These include Chan Robbins and Gladys Cole, who introduced her to the joys of Maryland crab cakes while working at the banding station in Ocean City.

Not surprisingly, birds make an appearance in a few of the recipes: roast chicken, guinea fowl, and the improbable sparrow pie. With the exception of the latter, most of the recipes in this collection are fairly conventional. She also has a closing chapter that covers feeding birds, as opposed to feeding on them.

You won't want to carry this book with you on your next extended birding foray. After all, who wants to cook when there are birds to look at, and Chan Robbins' advice on birds is far more valuable than his advice on crab cakes. But it is a nice addition to your cookbook shelf, and the price is reasonable. All of the author's royalties have been pledged to the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology.
