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MINUTES OF THE 2007 FALL TOS DIRECTORS MEETING

Manchester, Tennessee 3 November 2007

The Tennessee Ornithological Society (TOS) 2007 Fall Conference was held at the Ambassador Inn of Manchester, TN on 2-4 November 2007. It was hosted by the Highland Rim Chapter. Field trips were offered to: Arnold Engineering & Development Center (AEDC), Woods Reservoir, Old Stone Fort Archaeological Park, and Short Springs State Natural Area.

The Directors Meeting was called to order by President Richard Connors at 4:30 p.m. The minutes from the spring 2007 meeting, held on 5 May 2007, were distributed and approved with one minor revision, as corrected.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Mac McWhirter reported that all the TOS investments have been moved to the Vanguard Funds, with about 55 percent in the prime money market and the rest spread about equally among other Vanguard stock funds.

Curator/Web Page Report: Ron Hoff advised that, if anyone has any *Migrants* that are not needed anymore, TOS would like to have them. For example, Ruth Luckado is planning to soon donate her many years of *The Migrant* to the TOS Curator collection for future re-distribution as needed. Ron has all back issues archived at his home, with some of the older ones being pretty rare. He keeps at least five originals of all back issues. He distributes copies, rather than originals, for issues with five or less remaining original issues.

In May, Chuck Nicholson recorded about 14,000 hits on the TOS web site. Tennessee's "Important Bird Areas" site is now accessible via the TOS web site. He

requested that TOS members submit descriptions of their favorite birding sites to aid birding visitors and locals alike.

Migrant Editor's Report: Chris Welsh urged members to write articles about their research and other items of interest for *The Migrant*. Information from the Bird Records Committee would be very beneficial, especially if there are good pictures to go with them. Pictures are encouraged for all articles. There will be a full listing of all TOS members in the December 2006 issue, which will be available soon. *The Migrant* CDs are still available at \$5.00. At the suggestion of Ron Hoff, the group gave Chris a "hearty applause" for his work as *Migrant* editor.

Tennessee Warbler **Newsletter Editor Report**: Theresa Graham could not be present, but Richard Connors reported that she is still serving while waiting for someone to replace her as editor.

Bird Records Committee Report [Dean Edwards, Mark Greene, John Henderson, Kevin Calhoon, Don Miller, Jan Shaw & Phillip Casteel (alt.)]: Dean Edwards (e-mail kde@utk.edu) advised Mark Greene will replace Dick Preston, whose term is expiring. Dean Edwards is to return for a second term until 2010 and will continue as committee Secretary. The committee has reviewed 30 records this year, with 27 accepted and 3 rejected. New state records were received for: Cackling Goose (7 records), Greater Shearwater (post-Katrina sighting in Rutherford County), South Polar Skua (post-Katrina sighting on Pickwick Lake) and Black-throated Sparrow (observed by many in Lincoln County). A full records report will be submitted to *The Migrant* during the winter of 2007-08.

The Committee has developed a revised list of the birds of Tennessee.

Dean Edwards will soon submit to the TOS web site: Committee historical information, guidelines for species documentation, and the status of species documentations in Tennessee. Archived committee documented records, currently stored at UTK, have limited access. They are therefore to be made available online as time permits over the next few years.

The above Committee members were accepted by voice vote of the Directors.

Conservation Policy Committee (Melinda Welton, Bob Hatcher, David Vogt, Dick Preston, Van Harris, Chuck Nicholson): Co-chair Bob Hatcher reported on the following Committee activities since the 5 May 2007 Directors Meeting:

• Heart of the Cumberland Initiative: TOS sent many letters and made many phone calls in support of an appropriation for purchase of at least 124,000 acres on the Cumberland Plateau. A one-time \$82 million appropriation was approved in the final 2007 Tennessee State Budget. Some of these 124,000 acres will be purchased directly and added to Frozen Head, others will include a 10-year timber lease to Lyme and then will revert to the state. Areas that are especially sensitive will have conservation easements governing sustainable forestry practices and public access.

These "special management zones" include a huge amount of prime Cerulean Warbler nesting habitat. TWRA will eventually have management oversight over most of this land. Details will be in the December issue of *The Warbler*. Scott Somershoe, State Ornithologist, advised that he has been a participant in upgrading the abovecited 124,000 acres to an even higher acreage.

- Legal Protection After Bald Eagle Delisting: After earlier comments by TOS, on 28 June 2007 Secretary of the Interior Dirk Kempthorne announced the removal of the Bald Eagle from Threatened status. Even though the Bald Eagle will no longer be listed as threatened under the Endangered Species Act, it will receive special protections under the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act (BGEPA). "Disturbance" of Bald and Golden Eagles is prohibited by the Act, even in Alaska, where they were never listed. "Disturb" in the Act is summarized as: PROHIBIT-ING: "agitating a Bald or Golden Eagle, causing, or likely to cause: (1) injury, (2) decrease in productivity, or (3) nest abandonment"
- TOS to be represented at Sustainability Conference: Richard Connors will be representing TOS at a 2007 Summit for a Sustainable Tennessee. This conference is being sponsored by The Tennessee Environmental Council and Tennessee Conservation Voters and will be held 15-17 November in Nashville. The primary goal of the summit is to "help create, prioritize and advance a statewide sustainability agenda and action plan." Bird conservation objectives will now be part of this agenda.
- Proposed USFWS Rule Authorizing Native Americans to Utilize Non-Eagle Feathers & Bird Parts for Religious Purposes: The Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act allows the USFWS to provide controlled distribution of eagle feathers and parts to Native Americans. Other federal laws and policies have set the stage for extending this to non-eagle bird species. The USFWS now intends to prepare an environmental assessment for a possible proposed regulation for the legal acquisition by Native Americans of non-eagle feathers for religious/spiritual use.

The following are the four major recommendations of 11 submitted by TOS:

- 1) No live native non-game birds are to be allowed to be taken from the wild via hunting or other methods,
- 2) Sources of native non-game U.S. birds are to be from federally- and state-permitted bird rehabilitators, or the equivalent, that are agreeable and authorized to participate.
- 3) Provide the native non-game bird feathers and other bird parts with same eligibility for receipt as required for eagle feather and part recipients.
- 4) Provide high deterrent penalties for all persons, including those intended to benefit by the proposed rules, for unlawfully possessing, transporting, using, or selling the feathers or parts of federally protected bird species.
- TOS on Steering Committee for Habitat Conservation Plan for the Cumberlands: Melinda Welton will represent TOS on the Steering Committee that is preparing the first Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP) for Tennessee. Resource users, landowners, conservationists, and state and local government entities will be involved in developing this plan. The purpose of the plan is to protect multiple threatened, endangered, and high conservation concern species by proactively

planning their conservation needs into development and other land use activities while respecting private property rights.

• Scott's Gulf Land Acquisition: Thank you letters are being prepared to Senators Corker and Alexander and to Representative Lincoln Davis for helping to obtain Forest Legacy funding for 2,000 acres in Scott's Gulf. A letter will also go to Governor Bredesen thanking him for the \$500,000 matching funds from the Conservation Heritage Trust Fund for this project.

Further details for each activity will be in the December 2007 issue of *The Warbler*. The above Committee members were accepted by voice vote of the Directors.

Conservation Research and Funding Committee (Scott Somershoe, David Pitts, Chuck Nicholson): Richard Connors advised that this committee has not been active since key members of the committee moved out of state (Charlie Muise, Linda Zemple, and Joel Keebler). He wants to reactivate the committee and will appoint two additional persons to add to the above three members before the TOS Spring meeting.

Publications Committee (Theresa Graham, Chris Welsh, Wallace Coffey, Chuck Nicholson, and Richard Connors): Richard Connors advised he will serve on the Committee as an ex-officio member. Chuck Nicholson, Chris Welsh and Wallace Coffey also agreed to serve. Richard Connors reported that Theresa Graham has agreed to remain on the committee until a replacement is found for her as editor of *The Warbler*, for which Richard has a lead for a good possibility. The above members were accepted by acclamation.

Finance Committee (Ron Hoff, David Trently, Danny Gaddy, and Richard Connors as ex-officio member): Richard Connors advised that Ron Hoff and Danny Gaddy have agreed to continue on the committee. He will contact David Trently to confirm his continuation. During the discussion of liability insurance under "Old Business," Richard also accepted Mac McWhirter's volunteer service on the committee concerning this issue. The members were accepted by acclamation.

Collateral Materials: Donna Ward reported she has some decals, birder visitor cards, etc. available. She and Mac McWhirter also have *Migrant* CDs available for \$5.00 each.

TnBird Listserve: Wallace Coffey advised there are approximately 600 subscribers to TnBirds. The Directors commended Wallace for administering TnBirds as an excellent communications outlet for birders. Wallace advised that participants should be aware that the system may archive submitted messages anywhere from instantaneously up to approximately 24 hours, for a variety of reasons. Richard Connors accepted Wallace's recommendation that someone be appointed to assist and back up Wallace as TnBird Manager. Wallace advised he will provide a recommendation for this.

OLD BUSINESS

TOS Insurance: Mac McWhirter has talked to three or four risk management specialists concerning liability insurance for non-profit organizations such as TOS. There is a need for liability insurance for Directors and officers to carry out official TOS business for publications, personal injury, etc. that may stem from perceived copyright infringement, libel, slander, defamation, mismanagement of funds, or anything related to normal duties of directors and officers at the state and chapter levels. There is also a need for general liability insurance similar to homeowners insurance. It provides liability protection related to bodily injury, property damage, etc. It would be for protection of TOS members performing regular sanctioned activities of TOS, including the state and chapter levels of volunteer participation, such as hike leaders, tour drivers, etc. An annual premium of \$2,000 to \$2,500 would include personal injury coverage for \$1 million liability, or more, for each of the Officers/Directors and General Liability insurance. This would cover duly authorized TOS publications, hikes, field trips, bird counts, etc. However, liability insurance would not cover persons guilty of intoxication, etc, resulting in damage, bodily injury, etc. Mac recommended that the TOS Finance Committee, as well as Wallace Coffey, review these options. Mac advised that "release forms" can be used for awareness purposes concerning possible dangers, but they usually don't carry legal status in court.

NEW BUSINESS

Winter meeting dates and place: Danny Gaddy recommended that the TOS winter meeting avoid conflict with the Sandhill Crane weekend, which TWRA has proposed each year on Saturday and Sunday of the Martin Luther King holiday weekend, which will be 19-20 January in 2008. Richard advised it might sometimes be done in conjunction with Sandhill Crane Weekend. Richard proposed the winter meeting be held at Paris Landing State Park on Saturday 9 February 2008, pending his confirmation of available facilities there. If so, he will make necessary arrangements for lodging, a meeting room, and field trips.

Memorial Day Weekend Foray: David Vogt recommended that TOS members keep their calendars open for a possible Memorial Day weekend foray, possibly to be sponsored by the Chattanooga TOS and Cherokee National Forest.

2008 Spring Meeting: Dick Preston reported that the 2008 Spring Meeting will be held 25-27 April at Shelby-Meeman State Park near Memphis. Full details are to be published in the next issue of *The Warbler*. Advance registration is requested due to two different choices of meals, which need to be ordered in advance.

ABSTRACTS FROM THE 2007 TOS FALL SYMPOSIUM

First documented American Woodcock nest in Weakley County: the 30th Tennessee county with a confirmed woodcock nest

Relatively little is known about the reproductive biology of American Woodcock in Tennessee, primarily because nests are notoriously difficult to find. In 1977, woodcock nests had been reported from 12 Tennessee counties; in 1987, the total was 14 counties; and, in 1997, following completion of the *Breeding Bird Atlas*, the total was 29. In 2005 I studied a woodcock nest in Weakley County, apparently the 30th county with a confirmed woodcock nest. The nest was on a timber farm that was mostly clear-cut in 1999 and replanted with pines in 2000. The four eggs in the nest hatched on 23 March. Assuming a 20-22 day incubation period, the first egg was laid on 26-28 February. The eggs were similar in size and mass to those from other parts of the range; mean length was 38.75 mm, mean width was 29.40 mm, and mean mass was 14.65 g on the day prior to hatching. On 10 of 13 visits to the active nest an adult, presumably the female, flushed from the nest. On two of those 10 occasions the departing adult defecated on the nest, apparently in response to being startled not in an attempt to protect the eggs by deterring predators as occurs in some waterfowl. The 2005 nest site was not used for nesting in either 2006 or 2007.

A New Approach to Breeding Season Point Counts in Tennessee

Point count bird surveys were conducted at the Tensas River National Wildlife Refuge in northeast Louisiana in summer 2003 - 2004. Using point count data, we compared breeding densities of 23 Neotropical migrant and resident species across three silviculture treatments, i.e. uncut forest, thinned forest stands, and stands thinned with 1-3 acre clear cuts. From 2003 - 2004, we also assessed capture rates of birds through mist-netting on the aforementioned treatments which ranged from 0 to 14 years post-harvest. We found significantly higher densities of early-successional species that prefer an open forest canopy and thick understory in harvested stands, while we found higher densities of mature, closed canopy forest species in stands

with no timber harvest. Banding data showed significant and valuable patterns in capture rates relating to time since the stand was harvested. In order to make effective and appropriate forest management decisions for birds in Tennessee, we must have a greater understanding of how timber management affects bird populations across the state. Thus, I plan to modify point count routes in Tennessee to ask the same type of questions related to types of timber management and time since timber harvest. I will present a basic outline for the modified approach including collecting vegetation data and the expected results.

Ten Years of Fall Banding at Whigg Meadow, Cherokee National Forest, Monroe County, Tennessee

Whigg Meadow is a high elevation (1490 m) clearing located in the Unicoi Mountains in Cherokee National Forest. Bird banding activities have been conducted here yearly during the month of September from 1998 through 2007. During this period a total of 9189 net hours have been accumulated and 9422 individuals of 72 species have been banded for a cumulative capture rate of 103 birds/100 net hours. Annual capture rates have varied from 38 birds/net hour in 1998 to 225 birds/100 net hours in 2002. The five most frequently captured species are Tennessee Warbler, Swainson's Thrush, Dark-eyed Junco, Black-throated Blue Warbler, and Magnolia Warbler. During the 10-year study period, seven of the 3833 Tennessee Warblers banded at this location were recaptured on the site in subsequent years.

Challenger Opens Doors for Eagles and Wildlife

Challenger is a Bald Eagle that never learned to feed himself in the wild, but he has opened many doors for eagles and wildlife nationwide. Since 1989, he has served

as an educational ambassador with the American Eagle Foundation of Pigeon Forge, Tennessee. He has free-flown during the National Anthem at about 115 university and professional sporting events. He has flown during the opening ceremonies of approximately 145 major conferences. This includes five World Series games, three NFL All-Pro games, national championship NCAA football and basketball games, and delisting ceremonies for the Bald Eagle. This exposure has greatly increased public awareness and support of Bald Eagles. It has also significantly influenced Congress to provide programs and funding benefiting eagles and other wildlife. This includes annual State Wildlife Grant Programs and an endowment fund "nest egg" of up to \$10 million for nationwide eagle projects.

2008 TENNESSEE FALL BIRD COUNTS

This year this summary reports on *all* of the Tennessee Fall Bird Counts, including traditional Fall Counts *and* the Fall North American Migration Counts (NAMC) typically held on the 3rd Saturday in September, which this year was the 20th. The enthusiasm for doing the Fall NAMC separate from the traditional Fall counts seems to have waned a bit, and it didn't seem to this compiler to be worth generating two different reports. This year 182 observers on 14 counts logged over 555 party hours to find 63,400 individuals representing 185 species (Table 1). Typical for Fall counts, early winter arrivals and late-lingering migrational breeders added notably to the species totals. The weather was fairly benign for the most part. Although there was a large differential in the temperatures (from 38 to 95° F), most counts had little or no precipitation and light winds.

Some of the more interesting species found this season included Black-bellied Whistling-Duck, Snow Goose, Ruffed Grouse, Wood Stork, Virginia Rail, Sora, Laughing Gull, Forster's Tern, Black-billed Cuckoo, Whip-poor-will, Rufous Hummingbird, Bank Swallow, Canada Warbler, Vesper Sparrow, and 575 Bobolinks on the Elizabethton count. Merlin, Fish Crow, and Bewick's Wren were notably absent from the compilation.

Davidson County – 20 September; 0700-1200. Weather: mostly cloudy and calm; 63-79° F. Count highlights included Pectoral Sandpiper and Blue-winged Warbler. Observers: Kevin Bowden, Richard Connors, Camille Crenshaw, Susan Hollyday,

Elizabethton – 27 September; 0515-1900. Weather: cloudy, patchy fog, light rain in early morning and late afternoon; winds light and variable; 55-71° F. This was the 39th consecutive Fall Count at Elizabethton. The count area includes Carter County and parts of adjacent Johnson, Sullivan, Unicoi, and Washington Counties. The average number of species for the last 20 years is 124, and the all-time high count was 137 in 1993. Notable highlights included Ruffed Grouse, Bald Eagle, 4 Peregrine Falcons, Caspian and Forster's terns, 6 species of vireos, Bank Swallow, Marsh Wren, 23 species of warblers, and 575 Bobolinks. Highlights included all possible woodpeckers, all possible vireos, Sedge and Marsh wrens, all possible thrushes, Golden-winged and Orange-crowned warblers, Lincoln's Sparrow, and Orchard Oriole. Notable misses included Northern Bobwhite, Black-crowned Night-Heron, Eurasian Collared-Dove, Barred Owl, Common Nighthawk, and Baltimore Oriole. Montgomery County – 20 September; 0700-1215. Weather: mostly sunny with a few clouds; 61-76° F. The count area was entirely on Fort Campbell grounds. Polk County – 4 October; 0005-2020. Weather: mostly clear. The count area was the Conasauga River Valley. Only hourly counts were made between 0005-0640. Count highlights included Barn Owl, Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Loggerhead Shrike, Brown-headed Nuthatch, Marsh Wren, and Grasshopper Sparrow. 

THE FALL SEASON

1 AUGUST - 30 NOVEMBER 2008

Although temperatures were near normal to slightly above normal for most of the season, the second half of November turned decidedly cooler. Rainfall departures were again in a deficit. Rain associated with the remnants of tropical storm Fay passed through East Tennessee on 25-26 August grounding a few southbound transcontinental migrants, mainly shorebirds and terns, in parts of the two eastern regions.

Waterfowl were highlighted by continuing Black-bellied Whistling-Ducks and a Mottled Duck in Shelby County, plus a good flight of Surf Scoters in East and West Tennessee. Shorebird numbers and diversity were again good, including Avocets and Buff-breasted Sandpipers in three regions plus Piping Plovers and Red-necked Phalaropes in two regions. Other waterbird notables included a Brown Pelican, a flock of seven Roseate Spoonbills, two Long-tailed Jaegers, and a Sabine's Gull in West Tennessee, plus a sizable flock of Franklin's Gulls in East Tennessee. Noteworthy among raptors were Goshawks in opposite ends of the state, a Swallow-tailed Kite in Greene County, an early wave of Rough-legged Hawks in the upstate part of the two eastern regions, and multiple reports of Merlins and Peregrines from every region.

The songbird migration seemed to be near average, with a few early and late dates. Among these, a Philadelphia Vireo at Chattanooga in mid-August was remarkably early, while November reports of Barn Swallows in two regions were quite late. Banders in the mountains seemed to have another good year for thrushes and warblers. A significant incursion of Pine Siskins was underway by season's end, but there were few other boreal irruptives. Other outstanding finds included Calliope Hummingbird, Varied Thrush, "Audubon's" Yellow-rumped Warbler, and Claycolored Sparrow.

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HIGHLAND RIM AND BASIN REGION — The four month fall season produced mixed weather conditions. The average temperatures for August and October were relatively close to normal. September, on the other hand, was three degrees above normal, but balanced by a similar below normal mean temperature in November. During the late summer and fall, rain was hard to come by in Middle Tennessee. Nashville had deficits between 50% and 75% for three of the four months. Only in October, traditionally the driest month of the year, was there greater than normal precipitation.

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CUMBERLAND PLATEAU / RIDGE & VALLEY REGION — Regional temperatures were normal to slightly above normal for most of the season, except that the latter half of November was colder than usual. Although August received an average amount of rain, precipitation for the period as a whole was below average again, with September being the driest month in the Chattanooga region while October was the driest month in the Tri-cities area. Two or three light snowfalls occurred in late November in some northerly areas. Following poor production last year due to the late freeze and prolonged drought, many plants responded to better conditions this year with bumper crops of seeds, fruits, nuts, or cones. This provided ample food supplies for many birds and other wildlife.

There were 25 species of shorebirds found at Upper Douglas Lake (including Rankin Bottoms) during the late summer and autumn, while at least 19 species were found at Kingston Steam Plant. Most of the shorebird habitat at Brainerd Levee was covered with vegetation and no shorebirds were recorded there. The water level at Standifer Gap Marsh was very low, providing good shorebird habitat. In other areas, many farm ponds remained low or dry.

Three sightings of Rough-legged Hawk in late November indicated a significant and early movement of a species that is normally very rare in East Tennessee. Another boreal irruptive, the Pine Siskin, staged its largest flight in several years. However, only a few Purple Finches accompanied them. Rarities this season included Swallow-tailed Kite, Calliope Hummingbird, "Audubon's" Yellow-rumped Warbler, and Clay-colored Sparrow.

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EASTERN MOUNTAIN REGION — Average daily temperatures were above normal in September (+2.6 degrees) and below normal in November (-3.0 degrees). Drought conditions continued in the region, with precipitation three inches below normal for the period.

Banding operations for song birds were conducted at three locations in the region this fall. After ten seasons, the banding station at Roan Mountain was discontinued. The banding operation for hawks and owls on Big Bald Mountain completed its fifth year. A great catch at this station was an adult Northern Goshawk. This station also does migration counts of hawks and vultures (Table 1). The number of hawks was down this year, even though the number of observation hours was up (250 hours vs. 193 hours last year). Below are summaries for each banding station:
