10 Years Ago, *The Ohio Cardinal*, Spring 2002, Vol. 25 No. 3 (Bill Whan, Editor), contained these items:

Ohio's first Garganey, was seen 19 to 25 May in Mallard Club Marsh.

One White-rumped Sandpiper was reported.

At least 54 Black Terns were noted in 27 reports from 11 counties.

Elliot Tramer commented that the Northern Mockingbird is now "regular" in the Toledo area.

Twenty-two Golden-winged Warblers were seen in 14 counties.

Four Kirtland's Warblers were documented.

Bill Whan reviewed Smith's Longspur sightings; he noted that there had been no reports since 1991.

20 Years Ago, *The Ohio Cardinal*, Spring 1992, Vol. 15 No. 3 (Rob Harlan, Editor), contained these items:

Snowy Owls were reported at different locations until 01 Apr, 23 Apr, and 17 May. Five Loggerhead Shrikes were reported, in *Adams* (2), *Ashtabula*, *Lucas*, and *Wayne*. At least 28 Golden-winged Warblers were seen.

100 Years Ago, *Bird Bulletin* No. 2, May 1912 (Francis H. Herrick, Editor), included these items. (The *Bird Bulletins* eventually became the *Cleveland Bird Calendar*, which is still published today by the Kirtland Bird Club).

It was "...a cold and protracted spring."

"Chewink, Apr. 1, Wade Park, Dr. Hulme. Apr. 4, Cleveland Hts. Noble Road, * Apr 6, Euclid Ave. Mr. King"

"Brown Thrush, Apr. 10, Cleveland Hts. *"

"Whippoorwill, Apr. 23, Cleveland Hts. *"

"Bob White, Apr. 14, Noble Rd, Mr. Elliot; do, Mrs. Ryder"

(The asterisks refer to this note: "Mrs. Ryder has explored the same territory (vicinity of Noble Road, from Mayfield Rd. to the ridge) daily since the first of March, so that the record for that locality is exceptionally complete. To avoid repitition [sic] entries from this source are usually starred.")
