CUYAHOGA VALLEY NATIONAL PARK SPRING CENSUS, MAY 18, 2013

This was the latest spring census except for that held on May 19, 2012. Fifty-eight observers in 20 teams counted 5797 individuals of 136 species. These were the most observers ever and included two visiting birders from California. The species count equaled those of 1999 and 2007 and was the third-highest after the 145 we found

in 2010. The total individual count, however, was low compared to those of recent years.

The single Sandhill Crane was the first for a Spring Census. Sora was missed for the first time since 2000. Tufted Titmouse and Hooded Warbler set new count records. Where no comments are made in the table, the numbers are within normal historic ranges.
