# Nature Education and the War

The conservation of natural resources is vital to the national and international war program. The primary productive powers of our continent are dependent upon the maintenance of biological balance. Man's need of nature increases in direct ratio with the stress of his human relations. The chief problems of war remain within ourselves. Never was there a time when it seemed more urgent that our people utilize those outlets for relaxation of tension, peace and sanity of mind, health of body and spiritual contentment which an understanding appreciation of nature affords. Promotion of such human conservation through nature education is a wartime contribution of the first order.
