PROCEEDINGS OF THE EIGHTY-FIRST STATED MEETING OF THE AMERICAN ORNITHOLOGISTS' UNION

THE Eighty-first Stated Meeting of The American Ornithologists' Union was held from 12 to 16 August 1963, at The University of Florida, Gainesville, Florida. Business sessions were held on 12 August; paper sessions on 13, 14 (in the morning), and 15 August. A trip to Silver Springs on the afternoon of 14 August and an all day field trip to Cedar Keys and Manatee State Park on 16 August were taken.

Business Sessions

On 12 August, the Council met throughout most of the day; the Fellows met late in the afternoon, and the Fellows together with the Elective Members met in the evening. The Council held a second meeting on the morning of 15 August.

1964 meeting. The Eighty-second Stated Meeting will be held from 31 August to 3 September 1964 at Lawrence, Kansas, by invitation of The University of Kansas.

1965 meeting. The Eighty-third Stated Meeting will be held from 30 August to 3 September 1965 at Columbus, Ohio, by invitation of The Ohio State University, The Ohio Historical Society, the Wheaton Bird Club, and the Columbus Audubon Society.

Awards. The Brewster Memorial Award, by action of the Council, was made to Dr. Ralph S. Palmer, of the New York State Museum, Albany, New York, for his work on the Handbook of North American birds. The citation reads: "The present book is the first of a long-awaited multivolume handbook of North American birds, designed to bring together the various aspects of our knowledge of the subject in a readily available and conveniently organized form. Just as the British handbook has served for many years as a basic reference in its area, it is expected that this one will play the same role in North American ornithology. There can be no doubt that it will become a widely consulted work and that the successive volumes of the series will enhance its usefulness. A cooperative effort such as this sinks or swims with the qualifications of its editor, and it seems fitting to recognize the whole project in the person of its organizer."

Marcia Brady Tucker Awards, enabling young ornithologists of promise to attend the annual meeting, were given by vote of the officers to Alan H. Brush, of The University of California at Los Angeles, and to John D. Newman and Marion J. Phillips, both of The University of Kansas.

Membership. The Secretary reported that 3,493 copies of *The Auk* were being mailed. This figure included all classes of members, subscriptions, and exchanges with other journals. The Secretary's and Treasurer's records showed members by classes, before the elections in this meeting as follows:

There were 288 members added or reinstated since the previous year's meeting and 183 lost, making a net gain of 105.

Finances. The report of the Treasurer appears in full elsewhere in The Auk.

Van Tyne Memorial Awards were made to Roger Evans, graduate student of the University of Wisconsin, for his work on a study of the ontogeny of behavior in young gulls; to Dale Matheson, a high school teacher in South Portland, Maine, for his study on the mesoptyle plumage stage in birds; and to Mrs. Joyce Wildenthal, a graduate student at The University of Kansas, for her studies of Mockingbird songs.

Cyrus Mark, Chairman of the Board of Investing Trustees, reported that the appraised value of the endowment holdings, as of 31 July 1963, was \$203,208.00, which included capital added of \$7,500.00, giving a capital increase for the year of \$18,317.00. Mr. Mark reported: "As we look back over the last two years . . . the stock market rose to an all-time high, declined rather sharply last spring and early summer, and has now returned to the level which prevailed two years ago . . . the performance of the stock section of the merged assets account . . . [was] better than the Dow-Jones industrial average. Assets . . . were divided 37.15 per cent in bonds and 62.85 per cent in stocks."

Beecher S. Bowdish Bequest. A bequest by Beecher S. Bowdish to The American Ornithologists' Union, was previously accepted by a mail vote of the Council. This acceptance was unanimously approved at the meeting. This bequest consisted of "600 shares of General Electric Stock . . . left to The American Ornithologists' Union with the proviso that the income from this is to be paid to his widow, Christabel E. Bowdish, during her

lifetime, and upon her death to the daughter, Constance van Ryder . . . during her lifetime."

Editorial matters. Robert M. Mengel, Editor of *The Auk*, reported that three numbers of volume 80 (416 pp.) have appeared and the fourth (188 pp.) is in press. The mean time from initial receipt to publication for items in nos. 1–3 of volume 80 has been 14 months (6–20) for 16 major papers and 12 months (6–18) for 33 general notes. Dr. Mengel hoped eventually to cut this time lag to 9 and 6 months respectively. Robert M. Mengel, of The University of Kansas, was reelected Editor of *The Auk*.

Ralph S. Palmer, the Editor of the *Handbook of North American birds*, reported that 5,000 copies of Volume 1 were printed, of which 2,800 copies have been sold. A reprinting is expected.

Joseph J. Hickey, Editor of the *Proceedings of the XIII International Ornithological Congress*, expressed hope that the Proceedings would be published between 1 and 15 November 1963.

Robert W. Storer, Editor of the new monograph series reported that two monographs are nearly ready for publication and two others are expected to be ready by the end of the year.

President Austin L. Rand presented in part the report from Victor Cahalane, Chairman of the Committee on Bird Protection, which will appear in *The Auk*.

At the meeting of the Fellows and Elective Members, Austin L. Rand was reelected President, Robert W. Storer was advanced automatically to First Vice-President, Oliver L. Austin, Jr., was elected Second Vice-President; reelected were Lawrence H. Walkinshaw, Secretary, and Robert J. Newman, Treasurer.

Pierce Brodkorb, John T. Emlen, Jr., and Joseph J. Hickey were elected to the Council, for terms expiring in 1966.

Robert M. Mengel was reelected Editor of *The Auk* by the Council. Cyrus Mark, Turner Biddle, and Arlie W. Schorger were reelected to the Board of Investing Trustees, of which Mr. Mark will continue to serve as Chairman.
