A keen observer has written a factual and entertaining account of sharing an eagle's nest—how the nest is built and what stimulates an eagle to feed a younger chick first. A nesting eagle, feeding the author's fingers as though they were an eaglet, taught her the different stimuli that cause either partial swallowing and regurgitation of small bits of food, or the direct feeding of large chunks.

Hunting techniques are described in her adventures in training and conditioning an injured eagle so it could fend for itself in the wild. Here, too, is a warm and fascinating account of a very special kind of communication between scientist and wild bird that has no connotation of a mistress-pet relationship.

Beautiful pen and ink sketches by Deann De La Ronde illustrate the Wisconsin woodlands where the eagles have flown free on the wind, and the campsites and hunts shared by a woman with rare empathy and her wild charges.



The Auk welcomes original articles and short notes, not published elsewhere, containing significant new knowledge about birds, or new interpretation of existing knowledge. Address all articles and notes intended for publication and all books intended for review to the editor.

Suggestions to contributors.—Submit all MSS in duplicate. They must satisfy the following minimal requirements: MSS should be typewritten, double-spaced (especially tables and "literature cited"), on one side of numbered sheets of standard $(8\frac{1}{2} \times 11 \text{ in.})$ bond paper, with at least one inch margins all around. Tables (which should be unruled) and legends should be typed on separate sheets. Drawings should be in india ink on good board or drafting paper and lettered by lettering guide or the equivalent. Photographs should be clear, of good contrast, on glossy paper. Illustrations should allow (with particular regard to lettering) for reduction to their final width (usually $4\frac{1}{2}$ in.). Illustrations larger than $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ in. are not acceptable and should be reduced photographically to that size or smaller. Designate top of each illustration and identify (on the back with soft pencil) by author's name, title, and figure number.

Titles should be short and descriptive. MSS should follow the conventions of form observed in articles, general notes, and reviews in *The Auk*, with minor variations, since 1965. Avoid footnotes. If more than 5 works are cited, references in text should relate to a terminal list of "literature cited" (*include no titles not cited*). Where critical matter is cited from longer papers, indicate the pertinent pages, e.g. (Lack, 1947: 96-97). Citations in text should be parenthetical, e.g. (Lack, Darwin's finches, Cambridge, England, Cambridge Univ. Press, 1947: 96-97) or (Auk, 79: 208, 1962). Verify all citations from original sources unless impossible, in which case so indicate. For abbreviations in a terminal list of references, authors should use forms stipulated by the Style Manual for Biological Journals (Washington, D. C., Amer. Inst. Biol. Sci., 1964). In other matters of form *The Auk* frequently relies on the dicta of the GPO Style Manual.

For bird weights and measurements use metric units. Other measurements should be in the form usual to the discipline of the paper as practiced in the United States. The 24-hour clock (08:00 and 20:30) and "continental" dating (1 July 1968) are preferred. Scientific and (if any) vernacular names of birds should be given upon first mention thereof and should follow the A.O.U. Check-list (1957) or the appropriate equivalent unless departures are explained and defended. Articles more than 10 pages long should include a summary that should not exceed 10 per cent of the length of the article.

Proofs of all articles and notes will be sent to authors. Reprints of articles, notes, and other items are to be paid for by the author. These must be ordered from Allen Press Inc. on the blanks sent with the proof.
