

Persons interested in birds are invited to join the American Ornithologists' Union. Dues are \$35 per year; student memberships are \$18. Membership is \$18 for persons in all countries except the United States, Canada, Israel, Japan, Australia, New Zealand, and the following Western European countries: Iceland, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Denmark, Germany, The Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg, France, the United Kingdom, Ireland, Switzerland, Austria, Italy, Spain, and Portugal. All members receive the Auk and North American members receive a bimonthly Ornithological Newsletter. Subscription price to institutions is \$60. A Life Membership is \$1,050, paid in one sum or four annual installments of \$262.50. Gifts of any amount for the Endowment Fund are welcome and should be sent to the Treasurer. The following major donation categories are recognized: Sponsor (\$1,000), Patron (\$3,000), Benefactor (\$10,000), and Guarantor (\$25,000).
