
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verbenas or abronias and other acres were flaming with the yellow annual encelias. Insect life fairly swarmed and birds, especially Leconte thrashers and mockingbirds, were more numerous than before or since. I found eight Leconte's nests on one trip near Palm Springs and saw many of the birds. The next three years were dry on the desert and I saw only six nests, though frequently in their territory. Mr. Oberholser is well known to the readers of this magazine, as the author of a valuable series of critical papers on ornithological subjects. His work may be said to have begun with "A Description of Two New Subspecies of the Downy Woodpecker" which appeared in 1895, followed in 1896 by "A Preliminary List of the Birds of Wayne Co., Ohio. Perhaps his best-known revisions are: "A Review of the Wrens of the Genus Thryomanes" (1899) and "A Review of the Larks of the Genus Otocoris" (1902). Mr. Oberholser is responsible for a long list of papers, which, for the most part, have appeared in *The Auk*, and in the Proceedings of the U. S. National Museum.
