## CAMP AGASSIZ

At Glen Alpine in the Lake Tahoe  
Forest Reserve, California

**OPENED JUNE 15th**

The camp is in Glen Alpine, a famous glacier gorge in the Sierras, six miles southwest of Tallac; elevation 6,700 feet above sea level. The camp site is on high ground a few hundred yards from the beautiful Modjeska Falls, amid a luxuriant grove of pine and fir trees. Within eight miles of Camp Agassiz are a dozen peaks from eight to ten thousand feet high, on whose sides lie eternal snow fields, and there are 44 lakes, of which 30 contain trout—eight different kinds. Is there such another region in the world?

*To enjoy the mountains, and all that is in them, to protect the forests and the game, to explore and make accessible for others the wild places, is the aim of Camp Agassiz.*

The camp affords unexcelled opportunities for hunting, fishing, and natural history study. It is a place where one may do things, healthful things out of doors, and have more distinct occupations—there are 14—than can be found the world over.
