It is based not only upon the observations of the author herself, but upon those also of Mr. Vernon Bailey, Dr. E. W. Nelson, Mr. A. Brazier Howell, and others. It includes, in fact, a summary of all previous ornithological work in the Santa Rita Mountains.

One hundred and ninety-eight pages (estimated).

Supplementary to Grinnell's "Bibliography of California Ornithology" (Pacific Coast Avifauna no. 5, 1909). It continues the work from the date upon which the first installment ends, and includes also many titles that were omitted from the earlier publication. Details of style conform closely with the first installment, so that the two Avifaunas, numbers 5 and 16, will make a uniform whole. There is no duplication of entries. There were 1,785 titles listed in the first installment; there are 2,129 in the second, a total of 3,914 in the two parts. The two, together, are indispensable to a student of North American birds.

Of the first installment, Dr. J. A. Allen, in review, remarked: "It is safe to say that this is the most important contribution to the bibliography of North American ornithology since the Couesian contributions of 1878-1880 set the high standard here closely followed."
