Part I:

This volume contains life histories of 40 species of birds of Central America belonging to the higher families of song birds—the finches, tanagers, troupials, wood warblers, and honeycreepers. The book consists of 448 pages. A group of four tanagers is shown in color and all other species are represented by line drawings. Thirty-two photographs show nests and habitats of tropical American birds.

PART II:

This second, and larger volume of 593 pages, deals with vireos, thrushes, wrens, gnatcatchers, jays, swallows, and flycatchers. There are 59 species given special attention and each is beautifully illustrated by Eckelberry, who has met and sketched most of them in the field. There is a strikingly colored frontispiece showing three of the lesser known tyrant flycatchers. For each family of birds there is a summarizing chapter drawing comparisons between species and characterizing the life history patterns of the family as a whole. The volume is especially valuable for its extensive coverage of the wrens and tyrant flycatchers which are so richly represented in tropical America.
