Genera are also briefly characterized. Besides being one of the most beautiful, it is one of the most definitive and comprehensive works on this group. **Birds of the Early Explorers in the Northern Pacific.**—Theed Pearse. 1968. Centennial of Canadian Confederation Project. (distributed by Grey's

Publishing Co. Ltd., 9831 3rd St., Sidney, B. C.) 275 p. \$7.50 (hardbound).—In this volume, the author has compiled all remarks by early North Pacific explorers referring to bird life, from the first explorations to 1830. As far as possible, these observations are connected with present day nomenclature. Recognition of this remarkable contribution by a man in his tenth decade and an Honorary Member of the Cooper Ornithological Society was given in a resolution passed by the Society at the 40th annual meeting in Tucson, April 1969.
