NOMINEES FOR THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Nominating Committee appointed by President L. Richard Mewaldt, consisting of Thomas R. Howell (chairman), William H. Behle, and Ralph J. Raft, rendered its report in October. It proposes to the Cooper Ornithological Society electorate for three-year terms on the Board of Directors of the Cooper Ornithological Society: *Barbara Blanchard DeWolfe*, University of California at Santa Barbara; *Harold F. Mayfield*, Waterville, Ohio; and *Francis S. L. Williamson*, Smithsonian Institution's Chesapeake Bay Center for Environmental Studies, Edgewater, Maryland. These nominees are proposed to replace retiring Directors Oliver P. Pearson, Ralph J. Raft, and Robert W. Storer, who may not succeed themselves. (paperbound; in French). Available from the Bibliothèque centrale of the museum, 38, rue Geoffroy-Saint-Hilaire, Paris (5^e), France. Price not given.

Handbuch Der Vögel Mitteleuropas.—edited by Günther Niethammer (Band 2) and Urs N. Glutz von Blotzheim (Band 3); revised by Kurt M. Bauer and Urs N. Glutz von Blotzheim. Band 2. Anseriformes (1. Teil) 1968. 532 p. Band 3. Anseriformes (2. Teil) 1969. 503 p. Akademische Verlagsgesellschaft, Frankfurt am Main, West Germany. Prices: DM 48.50 for each part, if part of subscription for whole set; otherwise DM 57 each (hardbound, in German).—These are the second and third parts (of 11) of this revised version of Niethammer's classical work. Part 1 is available from the same address (price: DM 40.80 or 48.00). Its comprehensive treatment of the groups (field identification, detailed descriptions, taxonomy, ecology, behavior, etc.) makes the series of far more than regional interest.

Birds of Prey in the Field. A Guide to the British and European Species.—Roger Harkness and Colin Murdoch. 1971. H. F. & G. Witherby, Ltd., 15 Nicholas Lane, London, E. C. Y. 208 p. 2.25 pounds sterling (clothbound).—This is a nicely turned-out little guide, illustrated with a large number of black-and-white sketches and drawings and a number of photographs of varying quality. Species accounts give information on natural history, as well as descriptions. Owls are not included.

Studies of Bird Hazards to Aircraft.—1971. Canadian Wildlife Service Report Series, No. 14, Ottawa. 105 p. \$1.25 (paperbound).—This publication contains eight separate articles by various authors; five of them concern bird migration, without particular reference to aircraft.

Natural History of the Swainson's Warbler.—Brooke Meanley. 1971. North American Fauna Series, no. 69. 90 p. \$0.50 (paperbound). Available from the U. S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife or the Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C.—A standard natural history account of this warbler of the southeastern U. S.

The Hawks of New Jersey.—Donald S. Heintzelman. 1970. New Jersey State Museum (Cultural Center, Trenton, N. J. 08625), Bull. 13. 103 p. \$2.00 (paper covers).—This report contains a few general sections (including one on rare and endangered species) and an account on the identification and natural history of each species.

The Pine Barrens: A Preliminary Ecological Inventory.—Jack McCormick. 1970. New Jersey State Museum (Cultural Center, Trenton, N. J. 08625), Report 2. 103 p. \$3.00 (paper covers).—This report contains information on many aspects of the ecology of this interesting area, including an annotated list of birds.

Evolution of Diving Adaptations in the Stiff-tail Ducks.—Robert J. Raikow. 1970. Univ. California Press, Berkeley. 56 p. \$2.50 (paperbound).—A scholarly treatment based mainly on anatomical analysis of the hind limb and tail.

Identification Guide to European Passerines.—Lars Svensson. 1970. Naturhistoriska riksmuseet, Stockholm. 208 p. (paperbound). Available from Naturhistoriska riksmuseet, Museiavdelningen, 10405 Stockholm, Sweden, for 15 skr.—This small (10 × 18 cm) volume gives, in English, details of the basis for identification in hand of 177 species and 33 sub-species.

Ecological Isolation in Birds.—David Lack. 1971. Harvard Univ. Press, Cambridge, Mass. 404 p. \$12.00 (hardbound).—The subject is explored in a series of chapters dealing with a large variety of different groups of birds in different parts of the world (e.g., one on Eurasian tits, one on a series of African studies, another of North American examples). A final chapter presents general conclusions.
