NOMINEES FOR C.O.S. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Nominating Committee appointed by the Board of Directors, consisting of Thomas R. Howell (Chairperson), Keith L. Dixon, and Robert D. Ohmart, proposes for election in 1982, for three-year terms on the Board of Directors: *Cynthia Carey*, *David A. Manuwal*, and *Kenneth E. Stager*. The three retiring Directors are Carl E. Bock, Martin L. Morton, and Robert B. Payne.

Dr. Carey is Assistant Professor of Biology in the Department of E.P.O. Biology at the University of Colorado in Boulder. Her primary research interest is environmental physiology. She has been a member of the Society since 1969. Dr. Manuwal, Associate Professor of Biology in the Biological Sciences Division, College of Forest Resources, at the University of Washington, Seattle, is a new member of the C.O.S. His primary research interests are behavior and population ecology. Dr. Stager is Curator Emeritus of Birds at the Los Angeles County Museum of Natural History. His major research interests are taxonomy and distribution, and olfactory sense in birds. He has been a Society member since 1935, and has served previous terms on the Board of Directors, as President of the Board of Governors, and as President of the Southern Division.

AMERICAN ORNITHOLOGISTS' UNION

At the Ninety-ninth Stated Meeting of the A.O.U. held at the University of Alberta, Edmonton, Alberta, the following actions were taken:

1) The Brewster Memorial Award was offered to William T. Keeton, deceased, for his contributions to our knowledge of animal migration.

2) The Coues Award was given to Amos Ar (Tel-Aviv University) and to Charles Paganelli and Hermann Rahn (State University of New York at Buffalo) for their contributions to our knowledge of the physiology of avian eggs.

3) James R. King continues to serve for the second year in his term as President. Thomas R. Howell continues to serve for the second year in his term as President-Elect. Frank B. Gill was elected to a one-year term as Vice President. Dennis M. Power was elected as Secretary. Kenneth P. Able was elected as Treasurer. John A. Wiens was re-elected as Editor of *The Auk*. Mercedes S. Foster was re-elected as Editor of the *Ornithological Monographs*.

4) Elected to the class of Fellow were: Kenneth P. Able, Dennis M. Power, and Ralph W. Schreiber.

WILSON ORNITHOLOGICAL SOCIETY AWARDS

Fuertes Awards are available to all ornithologists although graduate students and young professionals are preferred. **Nice Awards** are intended for independent researchers without access to funds and facilities available at colleges and universities and thus are restricted to amateurs including high school students. Any type of research may be funded by both Fuertes and Nice awards.

Stewart Awards are available to any applicant for ornithological research, especially studies of bird movements based on banding and analysis of recoveries and returns and investigations in economic ornithology.

One Fuertes Award of at least \$100.00, one Nice Award of \$100.00 and one or more Stewart Awards of \$200.00 each will be made. Interested applicants should write to Carl D. Marti, Department of Zoology, Weber State College, Ogden, Utah 84408. Completed applications must

be received by 1 March 1982. Decisions will be announced at the 1982 Annual Meeting of the Wilson Ornithological Society to be held 6-9 May 1982.

SURVEYS OF SYSTEMATIC RESOURCES

The Division of Environmental Biology of the National Science Foundation (NSF) is evaluating how the Systematic Biology and Biological Research Resources programs might better serve the systematic biology community in the U.S. Two surveys, developed by the Association of Systematics Collections (ASC) under contract with NSF, will gather data concerning the physical resources available to researchers and demographic information on systematists.

The first survey, which was distributed in November, 1981, requested information regarding the management, the financial resources available for support, the services provided, and the future needs of systematic collections. The second survey, to be mailed in July, 1982, will collect data on individual systematic biologists.

All curators and collection managers now have an opportunity to contribute to the development of the long-term policies and goals of NSF. To assure that they will be able to offer further comment, a preliminary report of the survey results will be presented at the ASC meeting in May, 1982. INTERNATIONAL OSPREY FOUNDATION

A new organization, *The International Osprey Foundation, Inc.*, has been formed to study the problems of restoring Osprey (*Pandion haliaetus*) numbers to a stable population, make recommendations to enhance the continued survival of the Osprey, and initiate educational programs. The objectives of TIOF are:

1. To promote the study and preservation of the Osprey and other raptors throughout the world.

2. To establish and maintain lines of communication between those studying Ospreys whether on an amateur or professional level.

3. To create a working bibliography on Ospreys.

4. To develop a program of public education publicizing the ecology and status of Ospreys.

Based on Sanibel Island, Florida, TIOF monitors the thirty-odd Osprey nests on the island and manages an ongoing artificial nesting program which The Fund for Animals, Inc. established on the island in 1976.

TIOF is creating a computerized list of Osprey researchers in order to foster communication among those doing similar research throughout the world. Another major project is the creation of a working bibliography on Ospreys similar to that produced on Bald Eagles by Lincer, et al., 1979.

Membership in TIOF, a non-profit organization, is open to anyone with an interest in Ospreys. Membership categories are: Individual \$10, Family \$15, Sustaining \$25, Supporting \$50, Contributing \$100, Donor \$250, Life

THE CONDOR

Policy on repetitive publication of research results. It is axiomatic in science that a primary research paper must describe previously unpublished work. Furthermore, the same results should not be reported in different forms in the hope of gaining additional publications from them. Duplicate publication of the same date *can* aid the progress of science when truly different points are to be made or new information allows reinterpretation of previously published data. In many cases, however, this practice is merely repetitious and wasteful of journal space (which costs more than \$100 per page). It is an editor's responsibility to decide whether specific duplications are useful or wasteful. These decisions must be based on information supplied by authors.

Accordingly, when a manuscript is submitted to *The Condor*, its author must inform the Editor of the extent to which data in the manuscript have been used in other papers that are published, in press, submitted, or soon to be submitted elsewhere.

This policy is not intended to prevent authors from using the same data in more than one publication when there are compelling reasons to do so. Its purpose is merely to make explicit the fact that authors are expected to disclose overlaps between manuscripts because such information is essential to editorial decision-making.

Information for contributors. Instructions about manuscripts and other material to be submitted to this journal are given on pages 132–133. We urge contributors to prepare their work according to *Condor* style and specifications, however minor or idiosyncratic these may seem. Doing so will hasten publication, save money and effort, and help the editorial staff.
