Fourth International Workshop on Feeding Ecology of Waterfowl

This follows the three earlier meetings on shorebird feeding ecology held alternately in Durham and Liverpool. Although the title of the meeting has been widened to Waterfowl, waders will remain very well represented. The meeting will be held at Edge Hill College, Liverpool, from 9 - 12 April 1979. The total cost for the three days of the meeting, including full board, is likely to be about £25. Local organization is being handled by Dr. W. G. Hale, Dept of Biology, Liverpool Polytechnic, Byrom Street, Liverpool L3 3AF, from whom details may be obtained. The themes to be discussed at the meeting are as follows:

- (1) Breeding in relation to food supplies (to include both timing of breeding and breeding success).
- (2) The adaptive significance of migration in relation to balancing the energy budget (to include timing of migration, choice of route, choice of food).
- (3) How far can food selection be "explained" by profitability theory (to include discussion of costs and benefits associated with feeding on particular types of food, and emphasizing switches in diet in winter).

It is hoped that major contributions will be forthcoming from North America, Holland and Scandinavia as well as from the British Isles.

First notice: Symposium on Birds of the Sea and Shore, November 1979, University of Cape Town.

Organised by: The Southern African Seabird Group, The Western Cape Wader Study Group and The Cape Bird Club

A five-day symposium, consisting of three days of formal sessions and two days of excursions, will be held at the University of Cape Town, South Africa during 19 - 23 November 1979. The theme of the symposium will be "Birds of the sea and shore" and papers will be given on seabirds and waders, both inland and coastal. Excursions are planned for an offshore seabird breeding island, Langebaan Lagoon and a seawatching cruise.
