WADER COUNTS AT THE SENEGALESE COAST IN WINTER 1978-1979

Apart from the well-known national parks of the Saloum delta and the Djoudj, very little is known about the numbers of Palaearctic waders wintering on the Senegalese coast. During a visit from 15 December 1978 to 8 January 1979 we noted some important concentrations at various places along this coast. These are given in the Table. (A full report is in preparation for publication in Malimbus, the Journal of the West African Ornithological Society.)

Black-tailed Godwit $\underline{\text{Limosa}}$ $\underline{\text{limosa}}$: one bird with a Dutch ring was caught on Lake Retba.

Dunlin Calidris alpina, Curlew Sandpiper C. ferruginea, Little Stint

C. minuta: the last was most common everywhere, for example,
of 56 waders caught on Lake Retba, 11 were C. alpina, 12
were C. ferruginea, and 33 were C. minuta.

Sanderling <u>Calidris alba</u>. the sandy beaches form an appropriate wintering habitat for this species. We estimated the total number between St. Louis and the Saloum by counting different sections along the coast:

St. Louis - Dakar (150 km sandy beaches):2500 (most important concentrations: 300 at the Senegal delta and 250 before Lake

Retba); Dakar - Saloum (100 km sandy beaches, sometimes very rich in organic materials):3500 (most important concentration: 2000 on a 3km long beach near Joal Fadiouth); Total number: 6000!

Ruff Philomachus pugnax: 36 were caught on Lake Retba, half of them first-year birds.
