This is the old Government Sparrow trap simplified and improved. Made from No. 2 hardware cloth. Made in two sizes: one 10 by 14 by 28 inches for the larger birds up to Bob-white; and one. 8 by 12 by 24 inches for the birds from sparrow size down. These are ideal for flock feeding species but not quite so safe for the birds as the door-type traps. Large size, \$5.00. Small size, \$3.50. F.O.B. Clayton.

New W. B. B. A. Government Sparrow Trap

The advantages of the Government Sparrow Trap are many. It is always set, and when birds come in flocks will trap them to the limit of its capacity.

Our trap is strongly made of hardware cloth, with a bottom of the same material to the inner chamber, so that birds are perfectly safe from the attacks of hawks, cats and other predatory animsals.

The dimensions are 10" x 14" x 28"; the low height makes it difficult for birds to injure themselves by flying up from the bottom of the trap and striking their

heads against the top.

W. B. B. A. Two-compartment Trap

This trap, measuring $7\frac{1}{2}$ " x 8" x 10" is divided into two compartments, each provided with a drop door and automatic treadle. Adjustable feet are attached so that the trap will rest firmly on any approximately plane surface. The trap is very strong, being welded throughout, and is painted with a good green enamel.
