

### W. B. B. A. GOVERNMENT SPARROW TRAP

The advantages of the Government Sparrow Trap are many. It is always set, and when birds come in flocks will trap them to the limit of its capacity.

Our trap is strongly made of hardware cloth, with a bottom of the same material to the inner chamber, so that birds are perfectly safe from the attacks of hawks, cats and other predatory animals.

The dimensions are  $10'' \times 14'' \times 28''$ ; the low height makes it difficult for birds to injure themselves by flying up from the bottom of the trap and striking their heads against the top.
