We note with regret the retirement of David W. Johnston as Review Editor, effective after the January, 1968 issue, in view of his increased teaching responsibilities. Since the April, 1964 issue, he had maintained the high standards of our review section. The Editor is personally indebted to him in many ways. As this issue goes to the printer, a new Review Editor has not yet been appointed, because of delays incidental to the setting up of the Editorial Advisory Board.

Type DTX could be described as a 6-meter version of type ATX, or as a tethered and extra-full version of type D. Type JTX could be described as a 6-meter version of type HTX, or as a tethered and extra-full version of type J. They should be useful under conditions where ATX and HTX perform better than nontethered nets. Limited trials suggest the possibility that these 6-meter types may be slightly more wind-resistant than the tethered 12-meter nets.

These prices reflect higher costs in Japan and other increased expenses (*Bird-Banding*, **39**: 75). Therefore these prices are not directly comparable with present prices on other net types (on which an increase is imminent).
