Southeastern Coastal and Estuarine Birds: A Conference-Workshop will be held 11-13 September 1981, near Georgetown, SC, at the Field Laboratory of the Belle W. Baruch Institute for Marine Biology and Coastal Research, University of South Carolina. The meeting will focus on a total ecosystem approach and will assemble past and present federal, state, and academic researchers from Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, and Florida in an attempt to determine levels and directions of current research. Anyone who has or is working on coastal and/or estuarine species in the region is invited to present original research results, either as a conventional or poster presentation. Preliminary results and presentations by graduate students are especially welcome, as are presentations concerning avian prey bases, avian competitors, etc. We hope the conference will serve as an information exchange as well as a forum on current coastal and estuarine bird research.
