- 2) Birds per dollar comparison makes us look even better. For example, we expect that they will get about 400 species on their Panama tour for a cost of \$4.57 per species. We expect about 475 species on our tour for a cost of \$2.93 per species.
- 3) Birding conditions are part of what you pay for. We think small groups allow participants to see more birds, and we average 7 participants per group. The other agency advertises "small groups," but states that they take up to 20 per group. With the lower rates available for larger groups, you would expect them to cost less instead of far more.

When they have a 10 a.m. flight their itinerary reads, "Transfer from hotel to airport." On a BIRD BONANZAS tour we usually provide participants who desire a few hours of birding from daybreak until we head to the airport. In other words, we provide more excursions, drive more miles and offer you more birding time. We also provide more expert leaders.

We want you to get more for your money, and any way you analyze it, you'll see that you get more for your money on a BIRD BONANZAS tour.

Steller's Eider is a breeding bird of arctic Eurasia and western arctic North America, moving southward in winterto Scandinavia, the Kuriles and Aleutians; accidental in Japan, Québec, Maine, Massachusetts, England and Germany
