

THE PURPLE MARTIN COLONY **REGISTRY PROGRAM NEEDS** YOUR HELP

In January of 1987 the Purple Martin Conservation Association was created as an international nonprofit organization dedicated to the conservation of the Purple Martin (Progne subis) through scientific research, state-of-theart wildlife management techniques, and public education. Its own research program is active within the martin's North, South, and Middle American breeding, wintering, and migratory ranges. In the future, if assets allow, it also plans to award annual grants-inaid to others for ornithological research on the Purple Martin. Starting this fall, the P.M.C.A. will begin publishing a bimonthly newsletter, The Purple Martin Update, for the education and enjoyment of its members.



In an effort to coordinate the management efforts of North America's numerous martin landlords, the P.M.C.A. has established the Purple Martin Colony Registry. This program is seeking the help of all persons in locating and registering a majority of the martin colonies in North America in preparation for several projects designed to help this Blue-Listed "Species of Special Concern," including a continent-wide nestrecord card scheme.

If you know of someone who has a martin colony or is trying to attract one, or if you are interested in starting a colony yourself, please write to the P.M.C.A. You can further assist by looking for martin houses or gourds in peoples' yards during your travels. If you locate some, please try to obtain the mailing addresses from either the street & house numbers, rural mailboxes, phone books, or by stopping to ask.
