With this issue we say farewell to one of our longtime Regional Editors who has, for 23 years, kept birding's faith by submitting 91 consecutive seasonal reports to *Audubon Field Notes* and *American Birds*. Frances Williams, venerable Editor of the Southern Great Plains Region, has inspired generations of budding Texas birders with her enthusiasm, energy, and unambiguous honesty. She has been skilled at portraying multiple perspectives of the avian life in her region throughout these decades in a straight-spoken and historically accurate manner. The sheer volume of her work stands as a testimony to her constant involvement with and loyalty to *American Birds*.

Back in 1965, when she submitted her first column to *Audubon Field Notes*, who could have guessed that she would be so prolific, versatile, and such great fun to read. Her reports were always based on careful observation and intimate knowledge of her region and they contain fascinating insights and analyses. Beyond this, she is a thinker, a prober, a generous supporter, and always quietly formidable. Thank you very much, Frances, for your balanced, admirable, high standards. Our cheers and fun wishes for success in each of your new projects. Believe me, you'll be a mighty tough act to follow!

Our Regional Reports are always struggling for a larger scope of reference and toward that end we've decided to restructure the configuration of several regions at this time. The overall strategy is straightforward and the end result should enhance the effectiveness of the reporting network.

The Southern Great Plains and South Texas regions' boundaries have been altered. We have decided to establish all of Texas as a single region with Greg Lasley and Chuck Sexton as its editors. Their tireless enthusiasm and superb reporting style ensures that the new Texas Region will continue to be fascinating reading.

Joe Grzybowski, who has already enlivened the pages of *American Birds* with an impressively written Changing Seasons (Volume 41, Number 5, Winter 1987), and "History and current population status of the Black-capped Vireo in Oklahoma" (Volume 40, Number 5, Winter 1986) has agreed to author the new Southern Great Plains Region, which now includes Nebraska, Kansas, and Oklahoma.

As promised in my last editor's note, we offer you now a solution to what has become known as "the Northeastern Maritime Region Problem."

Beginning with the Winter 1988 issue (Volume 42, Number 5) there will be two regions in the northeast. The new Canadian Atlantic Provinces Region will include Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Newfoundland, and the French Overseas possessions of Saint Pierre and Miquelon.

Editors for this newly established region are clearly premier field birders. The Winter Season report will be authored by Ian A. McLaren. The Spring Season's editor will be Blake Maybank. Our topnotch veteran editor, Bruce Mactavish has consented to author both the Summer and Autumn seasons reports.

We feel that this newly constituted team will breathe vital life into the Canadian Atlantic Provinces Region and we enthusiastically urge all contributors to support the team by communicating with each editor promptly.

With our help, the new Canadian Atlantic Provinces Region should anticipate holding its head high in the august company of the old master regions.


