#### Request for Assistance in Alberta

In 1991 the Alberta Bird Atlas Project will be in its final year of collecting data on breeding birds. Birders are invited to participate in Alberta in "our big push to fill in all the gaps".

Assistance would be appreciated anywhere in the province, but volunteers are particularly needed to take part in remote area trips to Alberta's north country and mountainous areas Familiarity with boreal bird species, as well as wilderness survival skills are essential. In many of the remaining blocks, canoeing experience would be desirable.

In northern Alberta, June and July are the key months for atlas work. Vol-

unteers for such northern work should be able to commit at least one week to road-accessible blocks and 10 days for fly-in blocks. If you have shorter periods of visits available, there will be many squares in southern Alberta on which assistance would be helpful. Atlassers who worked on blocks in northern Ontario are particularly encouraged to visit Alberta and reacquaint themselves with the boreal forest bird fauna.

Travel assistance, lodging and support can be provided within Alberta. Financial assistance with other travel or living expenses may be available.

## Ecotourism and Conservation of Natural Areas Conference

The Sierra Club will host an international symposium on ecotourism and the conservation of natural areas, November 27–31, 1990, in Miami Beach, Florida.

The conference will bring together conservationists, travel industry personnel, scientists, and public policy makers to develop guidelines, and define research needs for ensuring that tourism in such vulnerable areas as wetlands and rainforests, can meet its potential for providing sustainable economic return through resource protection. Such tourism may contribute to the destruction of these resources if incorrectly carried out.

The symposium will focus on developing nations, with the emphasis on "how to" information and case studies derived from other countries including the United States.

The conference, which is being coordinated by Association of Wetlands managers, to appeal particularly to tour operators and ecotourists, landowners and nonprofits, scientists, protected area planners, and general interest, is also sponsored by the United States Environmental Protection Agency and International Expeditions; also World Wildlife Fund, Conservation International, and the Nature Conservancy. ## Birders Mobilize to Aid Research on Migrant Birds

At a recent symposium on neotropical migrant birds hosted by the Manomet Bird Observatory in Massachusetts, Latin American scientists delivered an eloquent plea for help: a lack of binoculars and other basic research tools is frustrating the efforts of local research and conservation groups to identify the habitats crucial to their wintering migrant birds and to educate the Latin American public on conservation issues.

In response, the Manomet Bird Observatory and 18 Massachusetts bird clubs have formed the MBO/Mass. Birders' Forum to help protect migrants and their habitats by establishing links with research, conservation, and education groups in Latin America. The Forum's initial project is to collect used binoculars from birders through their clubs for distribution to Latin American groups. Future projects may include sending field guides, ornithological reference books, and funds for research.

### 1991 International Piping Plover Census


