ON THE COVER

Will Russell, who was *Birding* magazine's first Field Identification Editor several years ago, has a legendary grasp of subtleties. His attention to detail may cause other birders to shake their heads on occasion—like the time, at an Asian migrant trap, when Will spent half a day just comparing supercilium patterns of two warbler species—but it pays off, too.

Case in point: December 14, 1997, at Lake Patagonia, Arizona. When an apparent Ash-throated Flycatcher popped out of the scrub, Russell noticed immediately that the edges of its secondaries looked the wrong color. This minor detail (occupying, at most, a few square millimeters) led him to examine dozens of other points, and he soon concluded that this was no Ash-throated—it must be a Nutting's Flycatcher (Myiarchus nuttingi). This Mexican and Central American species had been virtually unknown north of the border, with the only non-controversial prior record dating from 1952. Fortunately, Russell's bird turned out to be holding a winter territory. It remained in the area for some three months, to be enjoyed by hundreds of visiting birders.

One who visited was Larry Sansone, from Los Angeles, a photographer well known for his stunning bird portraits. On January 1, 1998, Sansone got the year off to a good start by taking the photograph that graces our cover. Park, Warren Harrington and his Swift
Audubons® found themselves between

a rock and a hard place.

Getting to the nesting place of the elusive black faced lbisbill by bus and elephant back was the easy part. Spotting the bird among the millions of grey stones of the Kosi River by the town of Ramnagar was another thing. The lbisbill is the same color and shape as the stones around it. A worthy challenge to any birder.

But once again the incredible resolving power and the bright crisp image of Warren's Swift Audubons separated bird from stone. Warren's life birds now stand at 2,985 including the Lammergeir or bearded vulture, another "really nice bird". (Rumors that the ominous cough in the bushes close by was anything more than a stork-billed Kingfisher with a bad cold have been greatly exaggerated).
