ominating high pressure to the west allowed only a few migrant-dropping storms to penetrate to the coast, where drought conditions set in as the season progressed. In the interior, it was wetter and cooler than average. Despite a relatively mild late winter and early spring that triggered early breeding activity for many species, migration seemed "on-time" or even somewhat delayed, with late records outnumbering early ones. The few substantial coastal "fallouts" reported were from Louisiana April 17-19, Florida April 22 and May 11, and coastwide April 28-29. The most concentrated coastal migration spectacle was at Dauphin Island April 28, where an estimated 50-100 passerines per minute (predominantly Red-eyed Vireos, Scarlet Tanagers, Eastern Kingbirds, and Indigo Buntings) were observed streaming east close to ground over a one hour period (GDJ).

Records of species of "Review List" quality are pending acceptance by the respective state bird records committees. States are indicated only the first time the county/parish is mentioned in the text, except to avoid confusion.

Editor's Note: With new changes on taxonomic order, Field Notes will be reviewing how to restructure our reports. But some in the birding community got the jump on us; the following report reflects the changes adopted by the AOU.

LOONS TO IBIS

Reports of unusual loons included a Redthroated at Millwood L., Hempstead, AR, Mar. 21 (CM); up to five Red-throateds at Guntersville, Marshall, AL, Mar. 25–Apr. 2 (GDJ, DGJ, SWM, PJ, D. Arnold); two Pacifics (Tennessee's 4th record) in Henry Mar. 7 (MG, KAC, C. Sloan); and an alternate-plumaged Pacific in Escambia, FL, Apr. 23 (EC). Two Eared Grebes in

Lauderdale, TN, Mar. 15 (JRW), and one at Dauphin I., Mobile, AL, Apr. 18 (GDJ), were far east. A foray into the Gulf of Mexico off Baldwin, AL, May 23 (GDJ et al.) produced four Wilson's Storm-Petrels, eight-nine Band-rumped Storm-Petrels (4th Alabama record), and three "storm-petrel sp.," all 64–81 mi off Orange Beach. A moribund Band-rumped Storm-Petrel brought to Pensacola Wildlife Rescue Apr. 28 (A. Forster, fide RAD, LD) had been banded in the Azores in 1993 (*Archbold Biological Station)!

American White Pelicans made a good showing in n. Mississippi. Single Anhingas in Lowndes May 2 (J. Jackson), Oktibbeha May 13 (TLS), and Tallahatchie May 26 (FB) were considered unusual for n. Mississippi; a displaying male and a female carrying nest material in Shelby Apr. 5 (JRW), and a pair in Dyer May 24 (M. Welton, JRW, MG), sustained suspicions of breeding in w. Tennessee.

A Tricolored Heron at Millwood L., Howard, AR, was early Apr. 5 (CM); one in Dyer May 25 (JRW) was in an area where breeding occurred last year. A Little Blue Heron and 12 Cattle Egrets seen from an oil platform about 120 mi off Vermilion, LA, May 20 (DNP) were late trans-gulf migrants. Unusually far inland ibis included 80 early White Ibis at L. Millwood, Howard, Mar. 29 (CM); numerous White Ibis sightings in n. Mississippi Apr. 3-May 16; three White Ibis in Shelby, TN, May 3 (JRW); a Glossy Ibis in Oktibbeha May 2 (TLS, MS); one and four Glossys in Lake, TN, May 4 & 28, respectively (WGC); and a White-faced Ibis in Caddo/Bossier, LA, Apr. 3 (PD). A Glossy Ibis in Okaloosa Mar. 4-9 (EC, RAD) was unusual for n.w. Florida.

WATERFOWL

Twelve Black-bellied Whistling-Ducks in Vermilion Mar. 7 (R. Greig), nine in S. Cameron Mar. 29 (DPM), one there Apr. 26 (CL, HJ), and four in St. Charles May 2 (PY) were away from the known breeding area at Lacassine N.W.R. Four Fulvous Whistling-Ducks in Lake May 14 (WGC, N. Moore) represented the 2nd record for w. Tennessee

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and the first for spring. Other Regionally or locally rare waterfowl reported: up to 19 "Lesser" Canada Geese in Oktibbeha Feb. 6-Mar. 13 (TLS); a male Eurasian Wigeon ın Lake Apr. 6 (WGC); two far-inland Mottled Ducks in Chicot, AR, May 2, and one May 31 (D&C Simons); two male Cinnamon Teal in Caddo Mar. 2 (PD), and one in Lake Mar. 18 and Apr. 2 (WGC); a male Oldsquaw in Walton, FL, Mar. 14 (M. Rose), six in Escambia Mar. 18 (P&B Tetlow, RAD), a female in Prairie, AR, Mar. 14, a male there Mar. 28 (both K&LN), a wintering male in Jefferson, LA, to Mar. 15 (M. Seymour, fide PY), and two females in Marshall Mar. 25 (GDJ, DGJ); an inland Surf Scoter in Lauderdale, AL, May 2 (TMH, IG); a Black Scoter in Pulaski, AR, Mar. 14-21 (K&LN et al.), one at Dauphin I. Mar 27-29 (GDJ, DGJ et al.), and three in Cameron Apr. 30 (C. Witt, J. Weckstein).

Highlights of late-lingering waterfowl included the latest ever Greater Whitefronted Goose for Winston, MS, Apr. 12 (TLS); 11 Snow Geese in Shelby May 15 (GP); two Gadwall, a pair of Am. Wigeon, and an Am. Black Duck in Dyer/Lake (WGC); a Gadwall, a male Am. Wigeon, six male N. Shovelers, a N. Pintail, a pair of Green-winged Teal, and a Ring-necked Duck in Tallahatchie/Quitman (WMD, FB), all May 28; five Green-winged Teal in Tallahatchie/Quitman May 30 (JRW); two Ringnecked Ducks in Livingston, LA, May 27 (IPK, GS); seven Greater Scaup at Kirby Pocket, TN, Apr. 21 (WGC); and an area record-late Red-breasted Merganser in Webster, MS, May 3 (TLS, MS).

A N. Shoveler with eight young in *Shelby* May 17 (MTOS) provided Tennessee's first confirmed breeding record. Two suspicious eggs in a Wood Duck nest in *Escambia* Feb. 13, removed and incubated under a setting chicken, hatched into Hooded Mergansers. In the same area Mar. 24, a Wood Duck box housed a female Hooded Merganser on 12 eggs. These represent the first breeding records for n.w. Florida (C. Davis, *fide* RAD). Five Ruddy Ducks (including 2 pairs) in *Lonoke*, AR, May 23 (LY), and 3 pairs (including courting male) in *Shelby*, TN, May 30 (JRW), suggested breeding.

HAWKS TO CRANES

An Osprey in Lake Mar. 1 (WGC) was very early. A Swallow-tailed Kite in Noxubee Apr. 26 (PWe) was an area first, and the 3rd for n Mississippi. A pair of White-tailed Kites noticed May 9 were accompanied by a juvenile near Holly Beach, Cameron, May 24 (JPK, KF, DR), providing one of few con-

firmed Louisiana breeding records; another pair was a few miles away during April (KF, SWC, DLD). A Mississippi Kite in Colbert May 15 (TMH, JG) was the 2nd for n.w. Alabama. The species was more plentiful than usual in the 7-county Oktibbeha area, with 7 sightings including an early record Apr. 26 in Noxubee (PWe) and a first for Webster May 30 (three birds; TLS, MS). Successful reintroduction efforts in w. Tennessee since 1988 may have accounted for 100 concentrated at President's I., Shelby, in mid-May (MG, JRW, fide MGW).

A Bald Eagle nest found in Dyer (WGC) Mar. 15 represented a county first. Five Cooper's Hawk nests and "numerous" other adults located in lower Plaquemines late February-May 18 (AP) were a surprise. Only w. Tennessee's 2nd record, a Swainson's Hawk was at Reelfoot L. Apr. 25 (MG); one in Jefferson Davis, LA, May 26 (PEC) was in an area where breeding is suspected; and 21 in Little River May 3 (CM) was a high number for Arkansas. A pair of Crested Caracaras in Calcasieu, LA, Apr. 24-25 (AS, CL et al.) were suspected of nesting. A Peregrine Falcon about 120 mi off Vermilion May 20 (DNP) presumably was a very late trans-gulf migrant.

Rarely detected in the Region, a Ruffed Grouse was heard drumming in Jackson, AL, Mar. 22 (GDJ, PJ). A Black Rail was observed at Dauphin I. Apr. 17-18 (C. Snow, MWR et al.). A Yellow Rail was glimpsed in Cameron Apr. 17 (SWC). Two King Rails in Lauderdale May 6 (SWM, DJS, JTG) were unusual for extreme n.w. Alabama. Two Virginia Rails in Lake Apr. 1 (WGC) were early. An adult with a chick in w. Fayette May 11 onward (P. Gaboury) confirmed breeding in w. Tennessee; one-two birds in Tallahatchie May 22-28 (FB) were very late and suggested breeding. Two Soras in Natchitoches, LA, May 18 (CL, HJ), and one in Cameron May 31 (PW), were exceptionally late so far south. Up to three Purple Gallinules in Tallahatchie May 3-14 (JRW, FB, WMD, G&SK) were locally noteworthy, as was a Com. Moorhen there Apr. 17-May 31 (FB et al.). Reports of Sandhill Cranes included four in Lafayette, MS, Mar. 9-23 (G&SK, WMD); eight lingering in Rapides, LA, to Mar. 22 (R. Breedlove), and a very late bird in Lowndes Apr. 18 (JPa, D. Watson).

SHOREBIRDS

A Piping Plover in *Caddo/Bossier* Apr. 18 (PD) was a first for n.w. Louisiana in spring; another was inland in *Lafayette*, MS, Apr 19 (WMD) Single Pipings in *Cameron*

May 9 & 16 (JPK) were relatively late. An Am. Oystercatcher in Baldwin Apr. 19 (GDJ, DGJ et al.) was a rare local visitor Alabama's 7th inland record of Blacknecked Stilt also provided the first confirmed breeding record: a pair copulating May 16 and a nest with 2 eggs May 21 in Colbert (DJS et al.). The 14 in Livingston May 27 (JPK, GS) suggested breeding in the Baton Rouge area. Inland Am. Avocets included six in Hempstead Apr. 26 (CM), nine in Panola, MS, May 21 (WMD); and one in Caddo/Bossier May 27 (PD). Reports of inland Willets were fewer than last year Eastward-straying Upland Sandpipers included an early five in Shelby, TN, Apr. 1, one there Apr. 19 (JRW), 13 in Baldwin Apr 27 (GDJ, DGJ), and two in Oktibbeha May 9 (TLS, MS). Very rare in Arkansas, and late, a Whimbrel was in Clark May 26 & 28 (G. Golden, D&DH, CM et al.). Scarce in s.e. Louisiana, a Long-billed Curlew in Lafourche Mar. 1 (BMM, RDP, PW, GG) may have wintered locally; another was found there Apr. 18 (BMM, CS).

Northwest Florida's 5th Hudsonian Godwit was in Okaloosa Apr. 22 (RAD et al.), Mississippi's 5th record was of two in Tallahatchie May 10 (FB, G&SK), and one was in Colbert, AL, May 10-12 (GDJ, DGJ, m.ob.). Seldom seen away from the coast in spring, two Marbled Godwits were in Calcasieu Apr. 24 (CL, HJ), and one was in Shelby May 26 (D. Young). Inland Ruddy Turnstones included a new Tennessee high of 28 in Dyer/Lake May 18 (WGC), four in Caddo/Bossier May 22, one there May 27 (PD), one in Howard May 24 (CM), and a new Arkansas high of 26 in Benton May 25 (DC, MM, JP, T. Brooks). Sanderlings in Caddo/Bossier Apr. 18 and May 9 (PD) represented spring firsts for n.w. Louisiana.

Baird's Sandpipers, generally scarcer in spring, were widespread in small numbers Single Stilt Sandpipers in Colbert May 3 (GDJ) and in Oktibbeha May 14 (TLS) were locally rare for spring. A Buff-breasted Sandpiper in Okaloosa Apr. 9 (RAD) provided only the 3rd n.w. Florida April record Two female Ruffs were found, both relatively late: Shelby, TN, May 10-16 (JRW) and Mobile May 17-19 (B. C. Garmon, m.ob.; 4th Alabama). An Am. Woodcock in Caddo May 19 (PD) furnished a first local May record, and suggested breeding. A locally rare Wilson's Phalarope was in Okaloosa Apr. 22 (RAD). A Red-necked Phalarope was in Mobile May 22 (G. E. Hill, GDJ, PJ) and four 81 mi off Baldwin May 23 (GDJ et al.); another was located in Benton, AR, May 21–22 (MM, JP, S. Gibson)

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JAEGERS TO TERMS

Pomarine Jaegers were identified from shore off Cameron Apr. 19 (DLD, SWC) and on the beach there May 9 (DPM, ph. PW, PY); one was off Dauphin I. Mar. 28 and another 81 mi off Baldwin May 23 (both GDJ et al.). Laughing Gulls continue to appear well-inland in small numbers, with 8 records scattered across n.w. Louisiana, n. Mississippi, and w. Tennessee Mar. 18-May 27. One or two Franklin's Gulls in Panola Apr. 2-May 16 (WMD, G&SK), one in Colbert May 6 (SWM, DJS, JG), and one in Lake May 7 (WGC) were farther east than normal. A first-winter Iceland Gull in Benton Mar. 7 (MG et al.) would provide a first for w. Tennessee and one of few records for the Region. Becoming almost expected in coastal Louisiana, Lesser Black-backed Gulls were at Jefferson/St. Charles Mar. 7 (PY) and in Cameron May 6 (GB, v.t. PC) and May 24 (ph. JPK, DR, KF); more surprising were different individuals Mar. 8 (SWM et al.) & 25 (GDJ, DGJ, D. Reynolds) inland in Marshall. A Glaucous Gull in Baldwin Apr. 18-26 (B. Blakeslee, B. James, RAD, GDJ) and a Great Black-backed Gull in Lafourche Mar. 28 (ph. BMM, PW, CS, CK) provided the only reports.

Three Com. Terns in Quitman May 16 (G&SK) and four there May 26 (FB) were noteworthy inland; up to 2300 were estimated on Cameron beaches May 9 (JPK, DR, KF et al.). Five Forster's Terns in Benton Mar. 7 (KAC, MG, CAS) were the earliest ever for Tennessee. A Sooty Tern was an onshore treat in Cameron May 6 (DP, GB, PC), and a Black Tern there Mar. 17 (GJP) was early.

DOVES TO HUMMINGBIRDS

Eurasian Collared-Doves were reported from several new sites in Louisiana, Arkansas, Mississippi, and Alabama, highlighted by Arkansas's first successful nesting in Prairie from Apr. 19 on (H&MP, K&LN). A White-winged Dove in Shelby Apr. 25 (GP) would furnish a long overdue first for Tennessee. One in Rapides May 9 (J. Johnson) was well inland, one in Okaloosa Apr. 22 (RAD) was well east, and one about 120 mi off Vermilion May 20 (DNP) was late or marooned. Some of a wintering flock of up to 31 in residential Orleans, LA, remained into early April (PY), with a separate sighting Apr. 5 (DPM); up to three at Grand Isle, Jefferson, Apr. 18-May 25 (BMM, RSB et al.) were late and suggested breeding. Inca Doves continued to expand in s.w. and w.c. Arkansas, with reports from Columbia, Little River, and Scott (S.S. Lacy, C. Dodson,

K&LN, DA, CM). In Louisiana, first parish nests were located in *St. Landry* May 13 and *Lafayette* May 26–27 (ph. B. Fontenot). A Com. Ground-Dove in *Carroll*, MS, Mar. 15 (PB), two in *St. Charles* Apr. 10 (PY), and one in *Cameron* Apr. 17 (SWC, DLD) were locally rare winter-spring visitors.

Two to three Groove-billed Anis wintering e. in Escambia remained to Apr. 21 (v.t. D&A Norfolk, fide RAD); one was late in Cameron Apr. 26 (BMM, CS). A Shorteared Owl in Marshall Mar. 15 (GDI, DGI) was a rare visitor; one in Grenada Mar. 21 (FB) was the locally latest ever. Single Chuck-will's-widows in Plaquemines Mar. 3 & 5 (AP) had likely wintered. A wintering Whip-poor-will and a Buff-bellied Hummingbird in Iberville, LA, remained to Mar. 7 and Mar. 4, respectively (DLD, SWC). A wintering Calliope Hummingbird in Nashville remained to Apr. 1 (fide FCF). An ad. male Rufous Hummingbird in Winston Mar. 16-19 (F. Weaver) represented the 5th area record. A female Ruby-throated Hummingbird in Cameron May 30 (PW) was late for the immediate coast.

FLYCATCHERS

Reports of Olive-sided Flycatchers, a scarce migrant, included relatively early records in Caddo May 4 (PD); Cameron May 6 (one) & 10 (two; PEC); Clark, AR, May 9 (D&DH, W. Green); and three in Shelby, TN, May 9 (MTOS). One in Cleburne, AL, May 16 (TLS, MS), and two in Lauderdale, TN, May 24 (JRW, m.ob.) were well east. Seldom reported in Arkansas in spring, a Yellow-bellied Flycatcher was in Washington May 17 (MM); one in Jefferson May 25 (GDJ) was rare and tied the record-late date for

Alabama. A female Vermilion Flycatcher in Howard Mar. 29 (CM, D. Harrington, K&LN) was only the 2nd for Millwood L. After a Brown-crested Flycatcher was banded and photographed in lower Plaquemines in late February, at least one to two unbanded birds were sighted to Mar. 23 (AP). A mini-invasion of Couch's/Tropical Kingbirds occurred late in the period, with records from Cameron May 3 (PEC, * LSUMNS) and May 24 (ph. JPK, DR, KF), and from Mobile May 22 (4th Alabama; SWM). Mentionable W. Kingbird records were two late birds in Caddo May 20 (CL), a nesting pair in Pulaski May 30 (2nd Arkansas nest record; K&LN, LY, B. Sheperd), one well northeast in Tipton, TN, May 23 (P. Hertzel, JRW), and four in lower Plaquemines Apr. 10-May 12 (AP). A Gray Kingbird drifting W to Grand Isle Mar. 28 (ph. BMM, PW, CS, CK) was the only "mainland" report. Scattered Scissor-tailed Flycatchers detoured E with three at Grand Isle (PW et al.) and one in lower Plaquemines (AP) Apr. 10; one in St. Mary, LA, May 9 (RSB); one in Bolivar May 9 (N&JC Herbert); one in Shelby, TN, May 11-15 (F. Avant, GP); two in Lauderdale, TN, May 24 (JRW et al.), and one exceptionally far east in Escambia May 11 (2nd area May record; RAD, LD).

VIREOS TO PIPITS

A wintering White-eyed Vireo in Winston remained to Mar. 4 (TLS). A Yellow-throated Vireo in Orleans Mar. 14 (DPM) was early, and a Blue-headed Vireo there May 19 (PY) was late. A strong eastward movement of Warbling Vireos included eight+ in Calcasieu and Cameron Apr. 18–19 (SWC,

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DLD, PEC). A territorial bird in *Lauderdale*, AL, May 31 (SWM) was in an area where the species was first noted in 1994. A Philadelphia Vireo reported in lower *Plaquemines* Mar. 14 (AP) was almost certainly a winterer; individuals in the *Oktibbeha* area Apr. 29 and May 1 (TLS, MS) furnished only the 4th–5th spring records.

A estimated 1700+ Red-eyed Vireos at Dauphin I. Apr. 28 provided a new Alabama high (GDJ). Northwest Florida's 5th **Yellow-green Vireo** was studied in *Escambia* May 11 (RAD, H. Barbig). Black-whiskered Vireos were discovered at Grand Isle Apr. 18 (AS, ph. PW et al.) & 19 (PW, ph BMM et al.), and five were in lower *Plaquemines* Apr. 19–May 2 (AP).

Tree Swallows were early in Putnam Mar. 6 (SJS) and Shelby, TN, Mar. 13 (VBR), and late in Cameron May 10 (PY) and Caddo/Bossier May 15 (PD). Early Cliff Swallows were in Lowndes by Mar. 11 (K. Kimmerle) and in Caddo (JT) and Shelby, TN (CHB, GCP, VBR) by Mar. 21 . Several pairs of Cave Swallows returned to last year's Cameron nest site; Alabama's 11th was in Baldwin Apr. 11 (GDJ, DGJ et al.). Red-breasted Nuthatches tarried to Apr. 18 ın Baton Rouge (J.V. Remsen), Apr. 24 in Oktıbbeha (TLS), May 2 in Lafayette (J. Burkepile), and to May 5 in Madison, AL (GDJ, DGJ). A Brown Creeper lingered in Shelby, TN, to May 9 (B&FP). A wintering Rock Wren in White, AR, remained to Mar. 30 (K&LN). A singing Bewick's Wren was a rare sight in Escambia Mar. 21 (L. Case, EC, C. Ascherfeld, fide RAD). A Blue-gray Gnatcatcher in Noxubee Mar. 13 (TLS) was earliest-ever there. Seldom encountered in n.w. Arkansas, a Veery was in Benton May 9 (MM). A Swainson's Thrush in DeSoto May 25 was latest ever for n.w. Mississippi (WRP, VBR), and Hermit Thrushes in Calcasieu (M. Johnson, K. Whittum) and Oktıbbeha (TLS) Apr. 23 were late so far south. A fledgling Am. Robin in Lafayette, LA, was an early surprise Apr. 5 (PEC). An Am Pipit in Caddo May 9 (CL, L. Raymond) was exceptionally late for Louisiana.

WOOD-WARBLERS

A Nashville Warbler at Grand Isle Apr. 4 (BMM, CS), and six in Mississippi Apr. 25–May 3 (G&SK, TLS) were e. of normal. Infrequently detected away from the immediate coast, Cape May Warblers were observed in *Orleans* Apr. 18 (J. O. Coulson), *Shelby*, TN, May 3 (CHB), and *Noxubee* May 29–30 (TLS, MS); a wintering male in *Caddo* remained to Mar. 1 (T. Davis). Fourteen Cape Mays in lower *Plaquemines*

Apr. 19-May 7 (AP et al.) furnished an excellent season total for a single area. A rare "Audubon's" Yellow-rumped Warbler in Cameron Apr. 11 (PEC, GB) could have been a migrant or local winterer. Accidental in Mississippi, a Black-throated Gray Warbler in Jackson Mar. 12 (L. Jacobson) likely wintered. A Black-throated Green Warbler in Plaquemines Mar. 15 (AP) was thought to be the same bird seen in February; one at Grand Isle Mar. 1 (BMM, PW et al.) had also likely overwintered. A male Townsend's Warbler in Escambia Apr. 27-28 (RAD, DB) was the first for n.w. Florida. Remarkable were concentrations of 37+ Palm Warblers May 2 (JRW) and 25 Cerulean Warblers May 17 (MTOS) in Shelby, TN. An Am. Redstart (D. Preston) and Swainson's Warbler (MG, VBR) in Shelby Apr. 6 were earliest ever for Tennessee. An Ovenbird at Grand Isle Mar. 11 (DPM) had either overwintered or was an exceptionally early migrant.

Connecticut Warblers were in *Putnam* May 16 (SJS) and *Jefferson*, AL, May 16 (PR) & 25 (PR, GDJ). Rare spring Mourning Warblers included separate birds in *Cameron* May 9 (PW) & 10 (DPM), one in *DeSoto*, MS, May 14 (WRP, G. Beaver), and one in *Jefferson*, AL, May 17 (H. Findlay, PR, GDJ). A Com. Yellowthroat in *Washington* Apr. 4 (MM) was earliest ever for n.w. Arkansas. Wilson's Warblers in *Cameron* Apr. 10 (GB, PEC) and May 9 (DPM, PY, PW), and a Canada Warbler there May 3 (PEC) were somewhat e. of their normal migration route.

Notably late warblers were a Tennessee in *Tate* May 25 (WRP, VBR); Chestnut-sideds in *Cameron* (KF, JPK, DR) and *Claiborne* (CL, JT), LA, May 24; Blackburnian in *DeSoto* May 25 (WRP, VBR); Magnolia and three Am. Redstarts in *Cameron* May 30 (PW, CS); Swainson's Warbler in *Cameron* May 16 (JPK, DR); and N. Waterthrush in *Cameron* May 24 (KF, JPK, DR).

TANAGERS TO SPARROWS

A male Scarlet Tanager in *Grant*, LA, May 27 (K. Balkum) was late or possibly attempting to breed; 750+ at Dauphin I. Apr. 28 (GDJ) provided a new maximum for Alabama. Early and late W. Tanagers at Grand Isle Apr. 10 (ph. BMM, PW, CS, CK) and *Cameron* May 16 (C&J Barre) were upstaged by n.w. Florida's first May record, in *Escambia* May 11 (RAD et al.).

Scarce spring Clay-colored Sparrows were also unusually far east in *Lafourche* Apr. 4 (BMM, CS) and *Cleburne* May 11 (K&LN). A Lark Sparrow in *Calcasieu* Apr

24 (AS), four in Cameron May 9 (DPM, PY, PW), and one there May 10 (GG) were unusual near the coast; one in Dyer May 2 (JRW) was rare for w. Tennessee. Two in Lawrence and a nesting pair at a new site at Mooresville, Limestone, AL, May 3 (DC, GDJ et al.) were in an area where small numbers have regularly bred in recent years. Four Grasshopper Sparrows in Lafourche Apr. 10-18 (BMM, CS, PW) and individuals in Cameron Apr. 17 & 19 (SWC, DLD) were thought to represent trans-gulf migrants. A Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrow in Tallahatchie Apr. 22 (FB) provided a rare inland spring record, and a Seaside Sparrow on the L. Pontchartrain shoreline in Jefferson Mar. 20 (PY) was miles from appropriate habitat. Seventeen Lincoln's Sparrows in Shelby, TN, May 2 (JRW) was an exceptional concentration.

Additional records of late sparrows were as follows: four Am. Tree Sparrows in *Benton*, AR, Mar. 14 (MM, DC); 16 Chippings on the *Cameron* coast May 10 (DPM, PY, PW); Vesper in *Benton*, AR, Apr. 29 (MM, M. Powers); Swamp in *Oktibbeha* May 11 (TLS); White-throateds in *St. James*, LA (T Sylvest), and *Oktibbeha* (TLS) May 11, in *Lafayette*, MS, May 12 (WMD), and May 25 in *Forrest*, MS (DCi).

GROSBEAKS TO FINCHES

A Black-headed Grosbeak in *Lafayette*, LA, to Mar. 15 had been present since mid-February (L. Wilson, J. O'Neale, v.t. D Patton); one in *Escambia* Apr. 20 (T. Mc-Caskey, *fide* RAD) provided n.w. Florida's 2nd spring record. An Indigo Bunting wintering in *Prairie* was last seen Mar. 16 (T&R Singleterry), and a wintering Painted Bunting remained in *Iberville* to Mar. 14 (SWC, DLD). A Dickcissel in *Leflore* Mar. 23 (PB) and three singing in *Caddo* Mar. 25 (R Seidler) were early for migrants.

Twenty Yellow-headed Blackbirds in Natchitoches Apr. 19 (CL, HJ) represented an excellent count for Louisiana, but paled in comparison to a new Arkansas high of 300 in Little River May 12 (DA). One in Clark May 26 was late (D&DH). A Rusty Blackbird in Shelby May 16 (GP, B&FP) was the latest record for Tennessee. Still rare outside s.w. Louisiana, a Great-tailed Grackle wandered N to Natchitoches May 18 (CL, HJ). Becoming almost expected at certain coastal sites, Shiny Cowbirds imposed themselves on Escambia Apr. 8 & 19 (RAD, B. Bremser), Lafourche Apr. 30 (RS, D. J. L'Hoste), Grand Isle May 3 & 25 (ph. BMM et al.), Baldwin Apr. 27-29 (GDJ, RAD), and Dauphin I Apr. 28 (GDJ, DGJ)



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A Baltimore Oriole in *St. Mary* Mar. 1 (GP) and a Baltimore and a male Bullock's in *St. John-the-Baptist* Mar. 8 (PW, RS) were lingering wintering birds; a migrant Bullock's was in *Cameron* Apr. 17 (DLD, SWC).

Late finches included two Evening Grosbeaks in *Marion*, AR, Apr. 1 (P&B Jones), and an Am. Goldfinch in *Forrest* May 29–31 (DCi).

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Place names that are frequently mentioned, but very long, may be abbreviated in a form such as "C.B.B.T." or "W.P.B.O." Such local abbreviations will be explained in a key at the beginning of the particular regional report in which they are used. Standard abbreviations that are used throughout *Field Notes* are keyed on page 295.

SA The Migration Over the Gulf Project, a collaborative effort of the Minerals Management Service, LSU Museum of Natural Science, Clemson University, and several oil companies, was initiated to monitor spring and fall migrant usage of man-made petroleum industry structures in combination with more "wide-angle" trans-gulf migration data from radar and mainland "ground checks." In the inaugural season of a 3-year study, 5 platforms at various locations off the Louisiana coast were monitored from Mar. 15–May 15. Preliminary (unreviewed) highlights: Red-throated Loon Mar. 23 (DGC); six Audubon's Shearwaters on 4 dates Mar. 15–Apr. 21 (JRK, RK); 14 Masked Boobies on 9 dates Mar. 21–May 13 (RWR, JRK, DPM, RK, BPG); Brown Booby Mar. 21 (RWR); 22 Cinnamon Teal Mar. 13 (JRK); eider sp. (!) Apr. 1 (RWR); nine White-winged Scoters Mar. 15 (JA); six Red-necked Phalaropes Apr. 20 (JRK); Red Phalaropes Mar. 14 &17 (DGC, JRK); 56 Pomarine Jaegers on 19 dates Mar. 13–May 9 (DGC, JRK, JA, LCB, RK); six Parasitic Jaegers on 4 dates Mar. 16–Apr. 8 (JRK, RK); Black-legged Kittiwake Mar. 16 (DGC); Bridled Terns May 6 (two; JRK) & 9 (RK); four Sooty Terns May 10 (BPG); five Lesser Nighthawks on 4 dates Apr. 3–May 4 (LCB, JRK); Ash-throated Flycatcher Apr. 17 (JRK); Browncrested Flycatchers May 9 (JRK) & 10–12 (JA); "Tropical" Kingbirds May 6 & 14 (JRK); Gray Kingbird May 3 (RK); Black-whiskered Vireo May 5 (RWR); Townsend's Warbler Apr. 8 (LCB); Connecticut Warbler Apr. 30 (JRK); W. Tanager Apr. 18 (DGC); Am. Tree Sparrow (!) Apr. 22 (JRK); Clay-colored Sparrow Apr. 1 (JA); two Lark Sparrows Apr. 1 (RWR, JA) and one May 10 (JRK); three-four Grasshopper Sparrows Mar. 31–Apr. 8 (JA); White-throated Sparrow May 5 (JRK); an early Painted Bunting Mar. 19 (RK); and Bronzed Cowbirds Mar. 31 (JA) and May 7 (JRK).

Also of interest were substantial numbers of White-winged Doves and small to modest numbers of Am. Bittern, Reddish Egret, Osprey, Mississippi Kite, Am. Kestrel, Merlin, Peregrine Falcon, Baird's Sandpiper, Franklin's Gull, Mourning Dove, Whip-poor-will, Least Flycatcher, W. Kingbird, N. Rough-winged Swallow, Bank Swallow, Cliff Swallow, N. Mockingbird, Brown Thrasher, Nashville Warbler, Orange-crowned Warbler, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Prairie Warbler, Vesper Sparrow, Savannah Sparrow, E. Meadowlark, Yellow-headed Blackbird, and Brown-headed Cowbird. Whether or not these records pertain to true trans-gulf migrants or circum-gulf migrants that are "short-cutting" or being blown offshore will be difficult to determine. During a frontal passage the night of Apr. 28–29, King and Arvin witnessed "the" event of the spring as virtual "rivers" of northbound passerines flowed past their platforms. Numbers were estimated in the hundreds of thousands. Needless to say, the fall migration results are eagerly awaited!
