Who is . . ? A note from W.B.B.A.'s editor

In NABB #2, fellow editor, Mickie Mutchler, began a series of "Who is...?" to introduce EBBA's officers to our readers. This seemed to be an excellent idea — reaction was enthusiastic — so WBBA will start its series herewith.

I have been WBBA's editor for about 10 years. My husband and I live in Cave Creek, Arizona about 30 miles northeast of Phoenix. But, as with the majority of people living in Arizona, I'm from somewhere else. "Somewhere else" includes California, Wyoming, Colorado, Massachusetts, and New York. (My banding began while we were living in upper New York State, and at that time — 15 years ago — I also joined EBBA.)

Here, on the northwest corner of our five acres of Sonoran desert, stands an old saguaro cactus which serves as a resting perch for Harris' Hawks — a species I am endeavoring to study. In the winter season, we have a substantial population of Gambel's race of White-crowned Sparrow, which I band for the Cooperative White-crowned Sparrow Project. Lastly, variations in the tail patterns of Black-throated Sparrows are also of interest to me.

My husband owns and manages a publishing business for which I am called upon to serve as typesetter, camera-person, pasteup artist, accountant, or whatever else is needed at the moment. This, unfortunately, interferes with banding but, hopefully, benefits NABB.

I'm not sure how a degree in Chemical Engineering ultimately led to bird banding and editing, but here I am.

A summary by species, state and highest individual total of birds banded in the Western region is given each year — for the preceding year — in the spring issue of North American Bird Bander. Because of space limitations, some of the data available cannot appear in NABB. However, anyone wishing a further breakdown of information may contact Otis D. Swisher, 1002 So. Oakdale, Medford, OR 97501.

Information available includes: yearly totals for any species reported since 1924, as well as who banded how many of a species (from 1963 to date). Information of this type may be of interest to anyone wishing to find others working with a particular species, to establish banding trends, etc.

Hummingbird recaptures

On 3 July 1976 — while banding hummingbirds at Mountain Home, California at an elevation of approximately 3,500 feet in the San Bernadino Mountains — I captured a total of 45 hummingbirds. These included 1 adult male Rufous Hummingbird (Selasphorus rufus), only 14 Anna's Hummingbirds (Calapte anna), and the rest Blackchinned Hummingbirds (Archilochus alexandri).

Of the 45 individuals captured in about 6 hours of netting time, 5 — or more than 10% — were previously banded birds. Of these 5, 2 were Anna's

Hummingbirds, both banded 11 June 1972, and the other three were Black-chinned Hummingbirds, all of which had been originally banded 24 May 1974. This full house seems to be an almost unbelievable coincidence and a record which I believe our membership would find fascinating.

Point Reyes Bird Observatory hires new director

Welcome, Jane Church!

In the spring when John Smail advised the Board of Directors of his desire to leave PRBO, the Board and staff embarked on a detailed and systematic search for his replacement. As a result of this search, on July 1, Jane Church became the new Director of the Point Reyes Bird Observatory. Jane was initially proposed to the Board by John Smail and then further recommended by Chandler S. Robbins, a member of our Advisory Board, and Dr. Philip S. Humphrey, Director of the Museum of Natural History at Lawrence, Kansas.

Jane, a member of the Observatory since its inception, brings to this position the following background and experience:

• Administrative Officer (five years) Smithsonian Institution's Pacific Ocean Biological Survey Program, performing supervisory, financial and editorial functions;

• Field Assistant on Smithsonian work in Panama, the Pribilof Islands, and in California coastal waters;

• Assistant to Dr. Thomas E. Lovejoy at the World Wildlife Fund and with the Pan-American Section of the International Council for Bird Preservation as a volunteer.

• Secretary-Treasurer of the World Nature Association;

• Vice Chairman and Chairman of the Virginia Chapter of The Nature Conservancy;

• Tour leader and escort for 12 bird-oriented tours in North America and Africa;

• Board member Virginia Society of Ornithology;


• Secretary and Membership Chairman of the Eastern Bird Banding Association (EBBA);

• Referee for the new publication (Joint EBBA-WBBA) North American Bird Bander and currently preparing The Auk's ten-year index (1971-1980);

• Bander of over 20,000 birds of about 200 species with a life list of 2,200 species.

PRBO is at an exciting point now, and it is important to have a strong administrative Director who can establish effective procedures to aid our scientific staff in the varied research and educational programs and a Director who can broaden communication between staff, advisory board and the membership. Jane Church fits these needs perfectly, and we are happy to have her.


Worksheets for western birds

Ageing/sexing worksheets for western birds are mailed with NABB only to Western Bird Banding Association members. They are, however, available to anyone interested. The following species sheets have been issued: Scaled Quail, California Quail, Gambel's Quail, Mountain Quail, Common Snipe, key to kingbirds, Eastern Kingbird, Tropical Kingbird, Western Kingbird, Cassin's Kingbird, Myarchis flycatchers, Violet-green Swallow, Tree Swallow, Verdin, Bushtit, gnatcatchers, Orange-crowned Warbler, Louisiana Waterthrush, Oporornis warblers, Tricolored Blackbird, Western Tanager, Summer Tanager, Black-headed Grosbeak, Lazuli Bunting, Cassin's Finch, Common Redpoll, American Goldfinch, Lesser Goldfinch, towhees.

(Editor's note: These worksheets are not bound into NABB for two reasons: (1) They are easier to use in the loose-leaf format. They can be slipped into a clear plastic jacket to be taken into the field — protected against wind, rain, and other hazards. (2) The worksheets are, at this time, tentative. Everything possible is done to insure their accuracy, but it is difficult to be certain that everyone having significant data has been contacted. By issuing the worksheets as we have, they go out into the field where, hopefully, we can get critical feedback. Then, if need be, corrected sheets can be issued.)

There is a need for additional worksheets. Members are urged to submit data to the worksheet editor, Dr. Charles T. Collins, Department of Biology, California State University, Long Beach, CA 90840, who can help with the final format write-up. Data need not be original; field testing to prove its reliability is all that is required.

Wing Measure: 15cm and 30cm Stainless Steel Rule. The 15cm rule is metric/English, rigid, ³/₄" wide, graduated in 10ths and 32nds inch, .5mm, mm, and cm. The 30cm model is spring-tempered, satin-chrome finished, 12.7mm wide, .33mm thick, 30cm long. It is graduated on one edge in mm, one edge .5mm, English on the reverse side. Both rules feature a stainless steel "bend-of-wing" fixture secured at right angles to the end of the rule. The 15 cm rule is 6.30 ppd.; the 30cm rule is 15.50 ppd. within U.S.A. McCamey Chickadee Trap: \$9.00 F.O.B. Eugene.

This trap is precision made and is designed to take birds the size of jays, grosbeaks, and cardinals. It is illustrated in EBBA Workshop Manual #5, 1975, p. 22.

It is sensitive to birds the size of chickadees and a 5 gram weight will trip the door. The main features are the sensitive treadle, a door lock for feeding when not activated, and a large handle for a gloved hand in winter. The back is fastened on with clips for easier access in case the treadle gets worked over by a squirrel.

Hundreds of these traps have been sold to nature schools, universities, and individuals in the States and Canada over the past ten years.

Packed individually, they weigh about three pounds and are shipped F.O.B. Eugene, Oregon via United Parcel. Order from Donald E. Payne, 34886 Mathews Road, Eugene, Oregon 97405.

Banding Pliers: These 6¹/₂" long-nose pliers have holes bored in the jaws to fit standard band sizes, so as to make it quite easy to get a perfect fit. This avoids the danger of lapped bands, which may injure the leg if not corrected, and which are troublesome to remove even with good tools. There is a split pin on the top of the plier which enables the user to open a band evenly with one operation. A spring on the side of the plier provides tension to keep the opened band in the plier while handling the bird. While new banders may welcome such pliers to increase their confidence in attaching the band, many experienced banders have shown interest in the pliers in order to handle birds more rapidly at peak times.


