From the President

A little over 50 years ago a group of people belonging to the Cooper Ornithological Society formed a "splinter group" consisting of those who were interested in the relatively new preoccupation of studying birds by means of bird banding. Later they formed a new and separate organization known as the Western Bird Banding Association and published a newsletter 'From the Bird Banders.' Over the years this publication metamorphosed into *Western Bird Bander* and most recently to NABB.

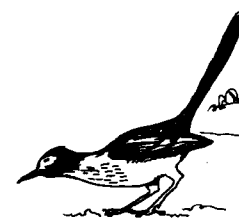
Somehow over the years there has been a tendency to separate the membership and interests of these groups as well as the journals. This is unfortunate since both groups are concerned with the study and preservation of birds. Admittedly, one group seems to have a more "academic" outlook and the other the "practical" or "functional" approach to their studies of birds. This difference is really more apparent than real and there is much to be gained from the intermixing of the two approaches. Banders can learn more about new avenues of study and data analysis which may give better direction to their banding activities. The academic researchers can well profit from the wealth of experience of the banders in capture and marking techniques.

It dismays me to see situations where one group is, through lack of communication, missing out on the expertise and established techniques of the other. Joint meetings of W.B.B.A. and its former parent

group, the Cooper Ornithological Society, have made progress in alleviating this condition of mutual isolation and actively fostering the cross-exchange of ideas. Our 1978 annual meeting will again be such a joint W.B.B.A./C.O.S. meeting. It will be from 11-14 May at Arizona State University in Tempe, Arizona. The details are presented elsewhere in this issue.

In addition to the regular papers sessions, we will have a separate meeting of W.B.B.A. on Saturday afternoon for a short business meeting and election of officers for 1978-79 and to get an update on things in Laurel from a representative of the Bird Banding Laboratory. There will be time for some informal presentations from members at this session; otherwise abstracts can be submitted for a place on the program in the regular paper sessions of the meeting. There will also be a workshop on Thursday afternoon on "Design, construction and selection of binoculars for ornithological use" which our members might find particularly interesting and useful.

It should be a stimulating meeting in a wonderful setting, so please plan to attend!



Who Is . . .? *Otis D. Swisher*

W.B.B.A.'s capable and conscientious secretary is Otis D. Swisher of Medford, Oregon.

A Junior High School math teacher since 1954, Otis also works as a resource person for elementary grade Outdoor Education classes and teaches birding classes for the Adult Education Department of Medford Public Schools.

For seven years Otis wrote a monthly birding article for the *Medford Mail Tribune*. He has compiled or co-compiled several local checklists of birds.

He began his banding in 1969 and is now guest lecturer for ornithology classes at Southern Oregon State College in Ashland. His chief banding in-

terests at present are the Black Phoebe and the Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, whose only known regular nesting areas in Oregon are near Medford.

Otis has also been a member of a select committee which developed a snag policy for Rogue River National Forest. He did a four-year study of the riparian habitat along Bear Creek, which flows through the center of Medford, and he now serves on the Park Commission which is developing a city park along the creek.

In his "spare time," he enjoys fishing and photography as well as compiling the huge amounts of data which go into the publication of W.B.B.A.'s Annual Report.

Annual meeting: 11-14 May 1978

Our 1978 Annual Meeting will be held jointly with the Cooper Ornithological Society at Arizona State University, co-hosted by the Department of Zoology, ASU, Maricopa Audubon Society, and the Arizona Game and Fish Department.

Arizona State University in Tempe is in the southeast portion of the Phoenix Metropolitan area just off Interstate 10. Located within minutes of the campus are the Phoenix Zoo with its many beautiful and interesting exhibits including a new Arizona section; the Desert Botanical Gardens, displaying desert plants of which many will be in bloom; and the open desert, which, if you have not seen an Arizona desert, is well worth the trip.

If you have the time, Arizona offers some spectacular sights such as the Grand Canyon National Park (5 hours driving time from ASU), Tombstone (4 hours), Superstition Film Studios at the foot of the famous Superstition Mountains (45 minutes), Petrified Forest and the Painted Desert (4 hours), Organ Pipe National Monument (3.5 hours), and Old Tucson Movie Studio and Arizona-Sonoran Desert Museum, a living museum (just 2.5 hours).

The mean temperature in Tempe during May is 92.4 degrees during the day and 55.1 degrees at night, so please pack accordingly.

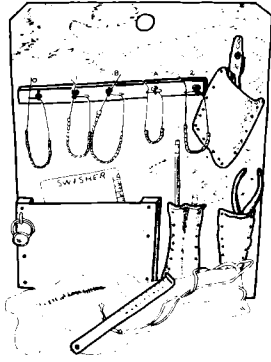
Call for papers

Papers are invited for presentation.

1. Papers should be restricted to 20 minutes including time for discussion. Participants will be held to this time limitation and should plan accordingly.
2. Titles and abstracts of proposed papers, submitted in quadruplicate, must reach the Program Chairman on or before 20 March 1978. Send to: Dr. Charles T. Collins, Program Chairman, Dept. of Biology, California State University, Long Beach, CA 90840.
3. Abstracts should not exceed 200 words and should include a succinct statement of results and conclusions—do not simply state the problem and add “results will be discussed.”
4. Abstracts of accepted papers will be reproduced as submitted and thus they should be camera-ready. Abstracts must be neatly typewritten, single-spaced, on 8½ x 11 inch plain bond paper.
5. The heading should include a title, capitalized throughout, followed by the author's (or authors') name(s) and address(es). The name and mailing address of the author making the presentation should be underlined.
6. For each abstract please specify the following information in a separate paragraph: (a) length of time desired—not to exceed 20 minutes; (b) audiovisual equipment needs; (c) special equipment needed, such as blackboard, etc.
7. Those papers to be considered for the student prizes should append to the end of the abstract the following statement: “This paper is eligible for the Howell and Roberts Awards”.

B.I.R.D. Manual. The Education Committee of EBBA has compiled the best of old workshop manuals with some new ideas for banders: Ethics, Traps, Nets, Suppliers, Ageing/Sexing Techniques, Identification, and many other aids. It has been prepared for use in a loose leaf notebook and the committee will be adding to the information occasionally with inserts in NABB. McCamey Chickadee Trap: \$9.00 F.O.B. Eugene.

This trap is precision made and is designed to take birds the size of jays, grosbeaks, and cardinals. It is illustrated in EBBA Workshop Manual #5, 1975, p. 22.

It is sensitive to birds the size of chickadees and a 5 gram weight will trip the door. The main features are the sensitive treadle, a door lock for feeding when not activated, and a large handle for a gloved hand in winter. The back is fastened on with clips for easier access in case the treadle gets worked over by a squirrel.

Hundreds of these traps have been sold to nature schools, universities, and individuals in the States and Canada over the past ten years.

Packed individually, they weigh about three pounds and are shipped F.O.B. Eugene, Oregon via United Parcel. Order from Donald E. Payne, 34886 Mathews Road, Eugene, Oregon 97405.
