International Banding/Ringing Workshop

During the 19th International Ornithological Congress to be held in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada in 1986, a special event has been arranged for banders/ringers on 26 June. The Ottawa Banding Group and the banding office of the Canadian Wildlife Service have organized a banding field trip for the morning, and Long Point Bird Observatory and the Ontario Bird Banding Association are hosting a workshop in the afternoon. The theme of the workshop will be Maximizing Effectiveness of Banding Studies. Potential topics include cooperative studies among stations, cooperative pooling of data collected, use of banding in inventory studies, band design, pros and cons of more/less general "backyard" banding, preparation of worksheets, use of banding in environmental assessments, computerization of banding data, and similar topics. Banders/ringers who wish to contribute to the workshop are asked to contact Martin K. McNicholl, Long Point Bird Observatory, P.O. Please specify the topic you wish to address and whether you are willing to do so as a presentation and/or as part of a panel discussion. Length of time devoted to each topic and format will be determined in part by the response. If content and interest warrant, a published proceedings may result.
