### President's Message

The 72nd annual meeting of the Eastern Bird Banding Association is history, but what nice history! The meeting was a great success held at the Grand Hotel at Cape May, New Jersey, 21-23 April. Approximately 66 members and guests enjoyed the excellent paper sessions and workshops. A huge THANK YOU! to Barbara Ross and her committee. The weather was beautiful, the facilities were fine, and Alan Schoenleber of the Grand Hotel and his personnel were helpful and accommodating.

A discussion about the need for a banders' training program to produce more and better trained bird banders was held after the annual business meeting. Betsy Brooks explained the program to all attendees. The subject was also discussed at great length at EBBA's Council Meeting the day before.

The banding display that John Tautin brought with him was impressive, informative, and beautiful. Mary Gustafson was at her best leading the field trips and some lively discussions.

On behalf of EBBA, I would like to thank the 1995 outgoing council members for their help and support they so willingly gave to this organization. They are Mary Doscher, Mark Johnson, Elaine Mease, and Sharon Schwemmer. Mary Doscher will be one of our representatives for the formation of NABC and Elaine Mease will continue to chair membership.

EBBA welcomes *Alan Gehret, Susannah K. Graedel, Brad Silfies*, and *Roy S. Slack* as council members. Their terms will expire in 1998.

Betsy Brooks, John Forness, and I attended a banders' forum meeting held in California last March. Many topics were discussed and pursued at this meeting at which 19 people attended representing several major banding organizations, the Institute for Bird Populations, and the United States and Canadian banding laboratories. To implement a training program for future banders, the decision was to establish a North American Banding Council (NABC). The Council membership would be composed of the following for a total of from 14 to 19 members:

- Members would be appointed by the Ornithological Societies of North America and the Bird Banding Associations.
- Two representatives from each of the four major ornithological organizations (Association of Field Ornithologists, American Ornithologists' Union, Cooper Ornithological Society, and Wilson Ornithological Society).
- Two representatives from each of the three North American Bird Banding Associations (Eastern, Inland, and Western).
- Up to five additional members at large will be appointed by NABC.
- It was suggested that the Bird Banding Laboratory would have representatives ex officio.

I am pleased to announce that the Eastern Bird Banding Association has appointed **Betsy Brooks** and **Mary Doscher** as our representatives to the North American Banding Council. In the event that one or both representatives cannot attend a meeting, an alternate representative(s) will attend.

Another important subject that I am very pleased to announce is that the Inland Bird Banding Association and the Eastern Bird Banding Association will have a joint annual meeting at the Patuxent National Wildlife Visitor Center, 12-14 April 1996! This is exciting news and I believe it will be a first-time event. An open invitation has been extended to the members of the Western Bird Banding and Ontario Bird Banding Associations. Mark your calendars now and reserve these important dates to attend a meeting at the beautiful facility only thirty minutes from our nation's capital. Do not miss it!

### **MEMORIAL GRANT 1995 AWARDS**

From the five applications reviewed for the 1995 grants, the two applicants selected were:

Patricia Lynne Stanko, of Swoyersville, Pennsylvania, for her project with the owl banding project at Braddock Bay. The project focuses on the use of various habitats used by migrating owls. This project will look at what habitat types are primarily used as hunting and roosting areas by migrating owls.

Hector Douglas, of Wake Forest University, Winston-Salem, North Carolina, for his study on vocalizations, behavior, and ecology of the Willett, which took place at Wallops Island, Virginia. Hector has extensive experience doing avian research in Alaska, Arizona, Antarctica, and the Galapagos Islands.

Memorial Grant Committee: (see report above)

Mist Net Committee: Chairman Gale Smith announced that the mist net log jam has been broken. He has received 499 nylon nets from

Japan and 250 Taiwan-made nets from Spidertech, Finland. The Net Committee now has for sale 12 meter, tethered, nylon 1¼ inch mesh nets and 9 meter 1¼ inch nylon and polyester nets as well as some 6 meter nets and some nets with 2-3/8 inch mesh and 4½ inch mesh. List of available nets and prices are shown in the *Banders' Marketplace* of this issue of *NABB*.

**Membership:** Elaine Mease reported that EBBA has added 53 new members this past year.
