Information Wanted

From all who are acquainted with the following three birds: Dickcissel (Spiza Americana) and Grasshopper and Henslow's Sparrows (Ammodramus savannarum passerinus) and A. henslowi).

It is well known that Dickcissel is constantly changing his range, and that the two sparrows are rather local in their distribution, often changing their summer abodes from year to year. It has been noticed in some localities that these three birds are much more numerous this season than ever before, while other species seem to be in normal numbers. Have you noticed anything unusual about them, and if so can you account for it in any way? Word on this subject is especially desired from those studying in New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Kentucky, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin. This work applies to all, whether you know any of the birds or not. If you do not, drop a card saying so, that we may determine as nearly as possible the range of these birds for 1894.
